Book Review


The Lido – Libby Page

This is the story of two women – 26 year old journalist Kate and 82 year old Rosemary – who come together to try to save a lido in Brixton threatened by closure. Rosemary has lived in Brixton all her life and so many of her memories are centered around the lido, including precious memories of her late husband, George. She still swims there each day in the summer and can see it from her kitchen window.

Kate is sent to interview Rosemary and they become firm friends, joined in their battle to save the lido. For Kate, who is struggling with loneliness and trying to feel a part of the local community, friendship with Rosemary helps her to find happiness and a purpose in life.

The local community is painted convincingly and there is richness and depth provided by the supporting characters, such as Frank and Jermaine who run the local café. The community is constantly struggling to fight off the developers and soon become embroiled in the battle to preserve the lido.

Inspired by the campaign to save Brockwell Lido in Lambeth in 2001, the book is now published in paperback and is the perfect summer read.

JUNE

"June damp and warm does the farmer no harm"

Summertime is here at last! It's time for strawberries and cream and barbeques. Roses are out in gardens and parks and there are lots of sunny days to look forward to.

Why is June called June?

The month of June was probably named after the Roman god Juno, the wife of Jupiter. It is considered good luck to get married in June. The Anglo-Saxons called it Sera Monath, which means "dry month".

Specials Days

June 5th – **Eid al-Fitr,** the end of Ramadan. This is an Islamic festival that is celebrated by Muslims all over the world. It is the day which ends Ramadan.

June 8th – **Trooping the Colour,** the Queen's birthday parade. This takes place on Horse Guard's Parade, with the queen attending and taking the salute. Over 1400 officers and men are on parade, together with 200 horses and 400 musicians. As the Queen's actual birthday is in April why does she have her official celebration in June? This tradition was introduced by George 2nd in 1748. As his actual birthday was in November he decided that the weather would be too cold for his annual birthday parade so he combined his birthday celebrations with the annual military parade of Trooping the Colour. Ever since then monarchs have celebrated their "official" birthday in June.

June 9th **Pentecost or Whitsun** is the seventh Sunday after Easter and ten days after Ascension Day. It is a major feast of the Christian year when Christians remember when God's Holy Spirit was given to the disciples after Jesus's ascension. The crowds gathered in Jerusalem were able to hear the disciples preaching in their own language.

June 9th – **Shavnot,** is a Jewish festival during which Jews remember the day that God gave Moses The Torah. All Jews go to the synagogue on the first day of Shavnot to hear the reading of the Ten Commandments.

June 16th – Father's Day.

June 21st – Summer Solstice.

JULY

Hot July brings cooling showers, apricots and gillyflowers

School finishes for the summer and holidays beckon! It might even be warm enough to swim in the sea. The bright lime-coloured leaves turn a deeper richer green and barley turn golden. July is also famous for thunderstorms — but they don't usually last long!

Why is July called July?

July was named in honour of Julius Caesar as it was the month he was born. Earlier the Anglo-Saxons called it Weodmonath, which means "the month of weeds" or Heymonath as it is haymaking time.

Specials Days

15TH July – **St Swithin's Day.** St Swithin was an early Saxon Bishop of Winchester who died in 861 AD, and legend says that as he lay dying he asked to be buried in the common graveyard "where the rain would fall on him and the feet of ordinary men could pas over him." Nine years later the monks of Winchester attempted to move his remains to a splendid shrine. However, they could not remove his body for 40 days and nights because of torrential rain. It was said that St Swithin was weeping in protest. In AD 963 the mausoleum was finally completed but it has become folklore that if it rains on St Swithin's Day it will rain for 40 days.

21st July – **50th Anniversary of Moon Landing.** At 02.56 GMT Neil Armstrong became the first person to walk on the moon. As he put his left foot down first Armstrong declared, "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind." He described the surface as being like powdered charcoal and the landing craft left a crater about a foot deep. He was joined by colleague, Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin, at 03.15 GMT and the two collected data and performed various exercises, including jumping across the landscape, before planting the Stars and Stripes flag. They also unveiled a plaque with an inscription reading, "Here men from the planet Earth first set foot on the moon July 1969 AD. We came in peace for all mankind."

The Moon Landing was in 1969 – but what else was happening?

- A litre of petrol cost 7 old pence (£1.12 in today's money!).
- A loaf of bread cost 8 pence (£1.26 in today's money).
- Milk cost 18 pence (£2.76 in today's money)
- The average cost of a house was £4,145 (£65,642 in today's money).
- Harold Wilson was Prime Minister.
- Sugar Sugar by the Archies was the best-selling song.
- The average salary was £962 (£15,109 in today's money).
- The average cost of a car was £1,060 (£16,642 in today's money).
- The average grocery shop was £1.10 (£17.24 in today's money.)
- The musical "Oliver" won the Oscar for best picture.
- Katherine Hepburn (The Lion in Winter) and Barbara Striesand (Funny Girl) tied for Best Actress.
- The Oscars were televised globally for the first time.
- Lulu the elephant ran amok on Blue Peter.
- Lulu the singer won the Eurovision Song Contest with Boom Bang a Bang.
- New television shows premiering that year included The Liver Birds,
 Up Pompeii, On the Buses and Monty Python's Flying Circus.
- Rod Laver and Ann Jones won the Wimbledon titles.
- The RMS Queen Elizabeth 2 enters service.
- The first Concorde test flights were conducted.
- Robin Knox-Johnson became the first person to sail around the world solo without stopping.
- The Beatles released Abbey Road their last album recorded together
- The Isle of Wight Festival attracted an audience of over 150000 to watch performers including Bob Dylan, The Who and Joe Cocker.
- The second manned moon mission successfully landed on the moon on November 19th.

"A garden is a lovesome thing"

What a joy to have such beautiful weather over Easter.

However now we must all feel grateful for what rain there is, not just for our gardens but for the farmers whose crops will suffer from lack of water and the planting season which may be seriously jeopardised.

The gardens are positively burgeoning following the warmer weather and in the last couple of weeks many of my plants have come into flower; notably the sweetly scented Azalea luteum which I consider has the best scent of all the Azaleas, competing with Viburnum Burkwoodii, a relative newcomer to my garden which has taken off this year. The Cornus kousa with large white bracts tinged with pink is giving a spectacular display and is a good contrast to the fresh red leaves of the Pieris. My Japanese quince has been in flower for some time with pale pink and white flowers, the true fruiting quince has only buds as yet but promises a good crop of autumn fruits. Nearly all the bulbs are finishing now including the snakes head fritillary which have given me great pleasure as they are in my front grass and I pass them all the time going in and out of the house.

The vegetable garden is still rather dormant but my broad beans are flowering well, much to the delight of the bees, and the warm spell has brought on my asparagus rather early, which was a treat for my visiting family at Easter; in return they helped me gather seaweed from the beach on Easter Monday to encourage the plants to greater production!

The birds are generally a source of joy but I cannot help wishing the pigeons would choose another habitat away from my garden! They demolished a white sweet rocket when I transplanted it from where it had been overwintering very happily in the vegetable area into a bed where it was needed, stripping the leaves in a matter of hours. I covered it with chicken wire and it has recovered along with a few other things that got the same treatment. The sparrows, which I cherish, are inclined to peck at the petals on the primulas, I assume in search of nectar and pollen; I do wonder why they cannot be satisfied with the seeds & fat balls that I supply them with and which they eat with relish. There are less starlings about these days but we always used to say if you had starlings on the lawn they would be after the leatherjackets, and I know which I would rather have. I have occasional visits from a green woodpecker that lives in the neighbouring trees and enjoys feasting on ants.

There are the inevitable slugs and snails about and I generally hope for the intervention of hedgehogs and thrushes, although these are less plentiful than I would wish; there are also natural remedies such as introducing nematodes which can be successful. However, sometimes it is easier just to remember they are all God's creatures and hope that nature will succeed where I have failed and remember that a healthy plant will withstand the onslaught of pests and diseases much better than an unhealthy plant. The most important point is to enjoy your garden, however small or large, and never let it become a burden.



What moves below the surface?

The burgeoning life in ponds

More than a year ago I recounted in Village Life that I had moved home. In the new garden with few existing features, I started to plan the shrubs, the meadow and the borders with various nectar plants to satisfy the bees and butterflies, and placed in direct line from my favoured chair in the conservatory, a pond. As the winter progressed I dug the pond in two parts, and surrounded it with rocks and slabs. I acquired pond plants chosen to be in scale with the small size of the pond.

Friends expressed an interest and asked about which fish I would introduce. Readers will recall that I am very fond of fish, but I said no, I am hoping to attract other life. Where would I get such from? I would wait for them to fly in on their own. While we are familiar with dragonflies being flying insects that can get there under their own steam, it is surprising that little water boatman, beetles, and bugs also regularly leave their ponds and fly to other places. Some years ago at Holland Pits I was talking to someone by a puddle in a rut, when there was a strong plop which I assumed had been caused by someone hurling something towards us. It was however a Great Diving Beetle, the diameter of a 10 pence piece and in the water the last thing you would expect to be capable of flight. However below the light brown wing cases across its back are wings making it a strong flier, despite its un-aerodynamic shape.




I did however put some water fleas in because new ponds are inclined to get taken over by algae, while there are no plant eaters to consume it. Already peering into the clear water, which is fed from my roof by a long pipe, there are already many water fleas and several water boatmen. I sometimes get these fly in to my moth trap in the night, so it is no surprise that some of them have already colonised by my pond, perhaps drawn to it by reflection of the moon or stars.

In June we will have our regular open day at Great Holland Pits. While we provide refreshments and we have conducted walks, one of the main attractions is pond dipping, an experience for the young and all those young at heart such as me who love these things. We provide nets and observation trays and we usually survey three ponds. Sessions start soon after 11:00am and 2:00 pm. We expect amongst other finds to include Great Crested newts, described by some as water dragons.

The last 3 years we have continually experienced lower than normal rainfall. We may be forced to dip in different places because the water levels are lower than I have ever experienced in some of the ponds.

There will be a second opportunity to do some pond dipping a few weeks later at Cockaynes Wood, situated off the road between Alresford and Wivenhoe. Other activities will also be going on there.

Since there were no nominations for Chair, it was proposed and agreed that three nominations should be sought so that the Co-Chairs took one meeting each during the year.

Accordingly, Jane Kurzweil, Myrna Lyles and Paul Fletcher-Tomenius were elected Co-Chairs unopposed.

Vanessa Giles was elected Secretary unopposed.

Alan Rusbridge was elected Planning Officer unopposed.

It was decided that an election for Vice Chair was unnecessary.

PCSO Report

Michele stated that a full report would appear in the forthcoming Village Voice but that there had been no serious incidents in the last period.

David Masters reported a group of people trying to persuade householders in Church Lane to pay excessive sums for drive and roof cleaning. He approached them and explained that this was a no cold calling area and that he knew other residents had asked police officers to attend. David said that they were perfectly polite and left hastily.

Michele, supported by Councillor Chris Keston, requested that direct approaches are not made. The PCSOs can be contacted quickly by phoning either Chris or Councillor Daniel Land, both of whom can make direct contact.

Planning Report

The Chair read Eddie Forrest's written report, which is as follows:

Decisions:

The Willows, Little Clacton Road. Proposed two bungalows REFUSED. An appeal is expected.

Sea View, opposite The Manor Pub. Demolish and replace with new extended dwelling APPROVED.

Pork Lane development of two custom built/self-build dwellings. APPEAL DISMISSED.

Pork Lane. Up to five bungalows rear of The Paddocks. APPEAL ALLOWED. This is a significant and disturbing decision in that it is land outside the settlement boundary and sets the scene for approval of another five bungalows on adjoining land for which an application was refused by the planning committee against the recommendation of planning officers. An appeal against this decision is predicted.

Awaiting decision:

Larges Farm Cottage. Second application for a house at rear. (First application was REFUSED). Decision is overdue, delay seems to be related to proof of title.

Greenways, Church Lane. Removal of existing bungalow and erection of two dwellings. Objection will be lodged.

Adjacent to The Veldt, Little Clacton Road. Three bungalows. APPEAL IN PROGRESS.

Alan Rusbridge agreed to produce future reports in written format for publication. He was not yet in a position to comment on recent changes to the National Planning Policy Framework.

Treasurer's Report

The balance is £4021 with £161 in cash. The current membership before today is 56.

Speedwatch

The organiser, Mick Carter, explained his own background as a retired Detective Sergeant from London after ten years working on vehicle fraud. He had lost close friends in traffic accidents involving excessive speed and believed that was his initial motivation to become involved with Speedwatch. He reminded people of the consequences of a speeding ticket, a fixed penalty of £80, three penalty points followed by a supplement for four years on the insurance premium. He gave examples of how he believed Speedwatch has had an impact in reducing the frequency of speeding. For example, in Little Clacton Road, 80 offenders in a two-hour session on a

previous occasion has now been reduced to 40. He acknowledges the unfortunate inability to prosecute in the absence of a police officer but still believes reductions like this make the exercise worthwhile. Mick asked for more volunteers which will permit more sessions.

Village Fête

Jane and Vic Kurzweil kindly volunteered to run GHRA's stall. Paul Withams asked for more volunteers to help set up and clear away the fête as there are insufficient people at present.

Date, Time and Venue of next Meeting SATURDAY, 19 OCTOBER, 10.30 AM IN THE VILLAGE HALL.

New Councillors

Chris Keston and Daniel Lang introduced themselves and emphasised their availability to all residents. Both have public telephone numbers and they intend to hold regular 'surgeries' the first of which will be in the Village Hall on Sunday, 23 June starting at 14.00 pm.

Any Other Business

There is a problem with parking near the playground in Pork Lane. Chris Keston explained that discussions were taking place with Essex County Council. His own preferred solution is additional parking, but some of the local residents opposed this.

The defibrillator has now been fitted outside the village hall. When a call is put through for an ambulance, they will provide the pass code to open it.

The Chair closed the meeting at 11.30 am.

Memories of Great Holland 1943 – 1953 By Victor Spencer Wilson

I lived in Great Holland between 1943 and 1953. My parents and I resided in one of only two houses in Station Fields that led through Farmer Lott's fields to the Kirby Cross railway station.

Although our postal address was in Great Holland, locals often made it clear that as far as they were concerned we lived in Kirby Cross.

The pathway that went through the railway station was the boundary between the two villages and because our house, "Meadows", was on the side nearest to Kirby cemetery we therefore lived in Kirby and not Great Holland.

I have never found out who was right. I do remember that, as a boy, I was not welcome on Great Holland Green, where I liked to play on the swings. Several times I was chased away by gangs of Great Holland boys who called me a Kirbyite.

Of course, it was no better on the Kirby Cross side because when I used to try and play on the small green at the corner of Frinton Road and Hadleigh Road I was chased away by Kirby boys who called me a "Hollandite!"

In the end my parents confined me to barracks and I spent a rather lonely childhood, except when I was at school. I well remember the barrage balloon behind our house in Farmer Lott's field.

I also remember seeing Captain Phillip May MC of Blue House Farm, Kirby, in full uniform walking his girlfriend through Station Fields when he was on leave. He sadly lost his life in action in the last month of the Second World War.

I also remember Mr and Mrs Elvish, who delivered groceries and old Mr Bareham who came to clear our cesspit and do odd gardening jobs.

Ah, memories!

Surgery Newsletter May 2019

Greetings all, some things are consistent and some things are consistently changing, the NHS falls into the latter category. The latest directive as you know from Dr Carla's recent newsletter is that GP surgeries are to be linked in Networks covering a geographical area with a patient list size of 30,000 to 50,000. The idea behind it is that surgeries will be able to share staff across the surgeries in the Network and work together better. On the face of this seems like a good idea but as the project moves forward over the next 5 years there is likely to be a much closer alignment of staff, resources and surgeries.

Thorpe-le-Soken Surgery along with the Branch at Kirby is in talks with other surgeries in the locality with a view to forming a Network, not to do so would mean missing out on a large chunk of money coming into General Practice to pay for things like Social Prescribing and a Pharmacist. This is not something that we have entered into lightly but we are being heavily led by the CCG and NHSE in this direction. The talks are not yet concluded but rest assured I will update you all with the final details as soon as they become clear. **The PPG meeting on Monday 3rd June, 7.30pm at Thorpe Sports and Social Club** is where the conclusion of the talks will be shared in full. If you would like to know what's going on this a meeting not to be missed! The Social Club provide their venue free of charge for these friendly meetings so if you are able to support the club by buying a drink at the meeting they would very much appreciate it.

Other news in the surgery is that Leighanne our Practice Nurse is taking maternity leave in June, 2 part-time nurses have been appointed to cover for her and Dr Hannah is returning from maternity leave in May, she will be working 2 days per week. Dr Fadaly is joining us in May and he will be working 1 day per week. Dr Michelle is not returning from maternity leave until September but she will be increasing from her previous 2 days to 3 days per week. All in all we are very fortunate to have a full complement of GP's by September despite the crisis in GP recruitment locally and nationally.

Our staff training and improvement programme is progressing with haste, HCA Michelle is progressing with her nursing training and we are releasing her to attend university part-time. To fill the gap created by her university days Gemma and Hazel from reception are undertaking HCA training and they are getting on nicely, they have already completed the Phlebotomy module and passed with flying colours so congratulations to both of them.

Thorpe-Le-Soken Surgery Newsletter June 2019

Hi Folks, Doctor Carla here again!

You will all know that I've been warning about the changes that are afoot in General Practice and in the NHS generally for the last 10 years. What I originally started to tell you about 10 years or so ago, when we had the meetings in the WI hall are now being evidenced. I've no doubt that you have all seen and experienced the changes.

We now have triage to try to fit you to the right clinician at the right time. There will less GP's and a greater reliance on Advanced Nurse Prescribers and Emergency Care Practitioners. This the solution advised by NHSE to fill gaps due to lack of GP's. The promise of 5000 extra GP's by 2020 (Jeremy Hunt 2015) is never going to materialise. There are even less GP's now than 5 years ago.

Thorpe Surgery's main aim at the moment is to try to avoid the pressure to 'Network'-because then, instead of in-house triage call will be received via a 'hub' and all personal service that hasn't been currently eroded, will ultimately be obliterated. I have put on the PPG Facebook page various videos from the BMA explaining Networks and ICP's in the recent past.

The staff at the surgery are battling to keep your service as personal and consistent as possible-despite the ever increasing constraints. They do take all your comments- both positive and negative to heart. Most of the comments lift our hearts and are very encouraging and we are extremely grateful for this, it's what we come to work for. Unfortunately I do sometimes receive calls from receptionists/nurses/GP's in the evening because of unwarranted criticism they have received from patients. Really folks we are all in this together. I'm writing to try to encourage you all to work with us and understand the difficulties from our side of the problem too-as we try to understand yours and as we try to defend your service-even though you may not always see it that way or may not feel that way to you.

We are trying to protect Thorpe Surgery and yourselves from being subsumed into a large private, nameless and faceless private Network. We might get things wrong, give you the wrong impression but fundamentally our objectives are to keep General Practice as local, safe and accessible.

Going forward the CCG may have the powers to force us to join a Network, the clock is ticking. The Networks are due to be announced at the end of May. I would encourage the local population to debate these issues, maybe via local meetings or the PPG. Thorpe and Kirby PPG meeting is 3rd June, 7.30pm at Thorpe Sports and Social Club, Station Road.

The changes are NHSE driven, they are not the ethos of Thorpe Surgery or its staff and we are making the best of what we have. We have no powers to changes it, NHSE is more likely to listen to the public voice-not ours.

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




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
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
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
