

Many thanks to everyone who came and also to all those who helped, donated raffle prizes or made donations - the Fundraising Committee deserves a big pat on the back for all their hard work this year in organizing so many successful events.

Our fundraising campaign is now gradually winding down - we are in the process of organizing a golf competition at Frinton Golf Club in August and we shall, of course, have a stall at the Fete on 7th August selling our tea towels and the new Cook Book being produced by Karen & Paul Withams. We now have well over £60,000 in the bank and are still hopeful of a sizeable donation from one or two Trusts. LETTER TO GREAT HOLLAND RESIDENTS

Dear Neighbour,

A lot has been happening on the Planning front.

58 Bed Dementia Unit.

This is the application that was passed on Appeal. The site is the one on the south side of Kirby Bridge and you will be aware that one of the conditions imposed by the Inspector was that the footpath under the bridge be widened to 2 metres for pedestrian safety reasons and that there be single alternate line traffic under the bridge, controlled by traffic lights. Over the last 3 months the protests against that condition have mounted.

Many of you have complained. Our colleagues and neighbours in Kirby and Frinton RA's have added their weight too. Cllrs. Robert Bucke, Mark Cossens and Alan Large from FAWTC and TDC have worked very hard on TDC. Essex Cllr. Mick Page secured a visit to Kirby back in June, where representatives of Essex CC were left in no doubt as to the strength of local feeling. Our MP Douglas Carswell, has supported the cause as well.

On 8th July, I attended a meeting convened by TDC so that Councillors, Officers and local groups could meet the Developer and talk about a resolution to the problem. It is clear that the Developer and its new traffic consultant have worked hard with officers of Essex CC. It would now seem that it is agreed by Essex CC and TDC that there is no need to widen the footpath under the bridge or alter the bridge itself. The amount of pedestrian traffic to and from the site under the bridge is recognised as being minimal. The intention therefore, is to create new bus stops serving both directions, south of the bridge and to create a Green Travel Plan to control staff and patient movements to and from the site. These arrangements would be secured by a legal agreement binding the Developer and subsequent owners of the site.

There is a lot of detail to be worked out, but the principle of what was proposed was accepted by all those present. When the details have been worked out there will be a planning application lodged with TDC and all local interest groups will be contacted for their comments. FAWTC and GHRA are both on that list.

Hopefully, by the early autumn, this problem will have gone away.

Before I close on this subject, can I also thank the local farming community for their intervention and demonstrating to Essex CC the problems of getting a combine harvester under the bridge!

35 Bed Dementia Unit

This application is on the site to the north of the bridge. This application was refused on Appeal. The Inspector was broadly in favour of the development but, in the end she said that the identified harm to the living conditions of local residents was of such significance that permission should be withheld.

You should please remember that there is smaller scale application for 30 units that may still be in the pipeline. This has been refused by TDC, but could be appealed. There is also in existence a valid planning permission for 5 bungalows and 1 detached house to be built on the site.

Caravan in Pork Lane

The Owner of the caravan has been prosecuted and fined £300 with £300 costs. He has told the court that the caravan will be removed by the end of this month.

Shoreline Management Plan.

You will recall that the Environment Agency produced a document some months ago which suggested that 40/50 years from now (amongst other things) the sea-wall at Frinton would be abandoned. Great Holland is sufficiently high above sea level such that we would not be significantly affected. However there is an issue of amenity that affects the village. David Masters of Church Lane, a retired marine engineer with extensive knowledge and experience of our local waters, wrote an interesting paper, which I have lodged on behalf of GHRA with the Environment Agency, suggesting that the abandonment of the sea wall should not be a foregone conclusion and calling for a feasibility study to be carried out to consider alternatives. That paper has been endorsed by FAWTC but has not been adopted by TDC in its submissions to the Environment Agency. Needless to say, this will be a long running saga.

Christmas Cards

It is that time of year again. The Village Fete is on 7th. August and with it the Christmas Cards 2010 will be unveiled and on sale. We have two cards this year. One is for adults and one for children. They are great value and as usual the monies raised will go the Village Hall and our local churches. Please go to the stall where they will be on sale.

The Wandering Minstrels were described last month as giving an affectionate look at England in song, which is what they did with the patriotic waving of flags and musical memories of the war years.




July meeting Thursday 1st July Richard and Peter

Garden reflections.





This time of year seems so 'Action Packed', fitting in many local events and with visitors coming for a short or lengthy stay! Kerrygold manages to give me some extra time although I didn't ask for it ... Since 'Summer Time' she has greeted the morning by way of asking for her breakfast around 5.00am - a Moggie Dawn Chorus! I'm not complaining as it has been a lovely working in my garden early this lovely summer, which has changed dramatically from the gentle colourful Spring/early Summer scene to a more casual cottage and wildlife garden.

A good month for studying the displays with a view to making a few changes next year? One thing I won't be altering is allowing self-seeding of early Annuals - the Love in the Mist display, for example, was quite spectacular earlier. The sunflowers will be making their mark soon, bringing splashes of colour to round off the summer and provide welcome snacks for the bird population...

I feel it would be an improvement to transfer my two Peony plants to the back of the garden as they seem to overshadow other smaller plants. This fact applies to several species - hedging or shrubs which seem an ideal size when placed but one forgets how they will look in a few years!

A difficult year for ponds, blanket weed dominating after an extra cold winter. However, with the arrival of the water lilies and a gentle trickle of water into the pond, the picture is quite different - especially as damsel and dragon flies enhance the scene.


A few moments spent dead-heading will ensure a succession of late summer colour, also regular feeding...

NEWS

As you will appreciate, not all incidents can be reported in the magazine due to confidentiality. However, I can advise that the following incidents have been reported between 7 May and 10 July.

Travellers were reported to be setting up on the marshes, but have now moved on; abandoned vehicle (details passed onto Tendring District Council); theft of 4 vehicle tyres; concern for welfare (all was in order) and one burglary. We also had a report of nuisance youths gathering at the Nature Reserve car park in Little Clacton Road. I patrolled this location a few times on one shift and around 10 pm located 3 vehicles with youths hanging around. Names and index numbers of vehicles were taken and stern words of advice given before sending them on their way. To date, no further calls have been taken for this location.

Police have become aware of bogus callers in the area recently (Frinton, Kirby Cross and Brightlingsea). This involves males carrying out door to door enquiries and asking the occupant if they would like some work carried out on their property, such as gutter clearing and trimming trees. They provide an extortionate quote for work, then attempt to enter the premises for payment. On one occasion they took several hundred pounds from a vulnerable elderly male, and then failed to carry out the work on the agreed date. These people prey on the elderly and vulnerable and we would ask residents in the area to take care when answering the door to these types of traders. If you need repair work carried out to your property please do so by contacting a reputable firm.

Police have been resolving low-level crime and anti-social behaviour as part of a new neighbourhood resolution process. Sometimes called a return to "old fashioned policing", this project is an alternative way of dealing with adult and youth offenders to ensure that they are made to face up to the consequences of their actions. A resolution can include a written or verbal apology, payment for damage or return of goods, donation to charity, cleaning, voluntary work or a face-to-face meeting between the victim and offender. As long as the victim is fully supportive and the offence is appropriate, a neighbourhood resolution may be applied as a proportionate response for first-time offenders. Essex Police are only one of three police forces in the country to use restorative approaches for both adults and children.

One most recent example was of a youth who took an item from a Frinton store. It was his first offence and he had been egged on by his friends. Officers witnessed the offence and the youth displayed remorse for the theft. He apologised to the store and returned the goods. The store was happy with this action although the youth was banned from the store. He was brought home to his parents and given strong words of advice. The parents were very supportive of the Police and issued their own punishment to the youth. This saved many hours of police time dealing with a low level offence and, given the events of the day, it was unlikely he would offend again.

Neighbourhood resolutions will only be used for low level crime and anti-social behaviour offences, and steps will be taken to ensure that the person responsible completes the agreed resolution. Full victim support will still be available, and safeguards will be in process in cases when a neighbourhood resolution is passed. This means officers will still offer complete support to victims that may be reluctant to engage with police, and protect them if they are at risk.

This month we have been concentrating on inconsiderate parking. Recently local PCSOs visited Halstead Road in Kirby Cross to monitor traffic at school closing time. While we understand this is a narrow road that gets very busy during this period, parents and other drivers passing through must exercise patience and be aware of the dangers of driving on the pavement. We would also advise the parents of small children to ensure they have a responsible adult with them going to and leaving the school. This will continue to be monitored by Police and tickets will be issued if necessary.



Great Holland Pits Nature Reserve:

Source for the goose, source for the gander





Many of us strain our eyes and ears to look out for little beasties, there are not so many big ones after all. Most animals in the UK are fairly drab and many are also quiet. Bigger ones usually hide or keep their distance. Greylag Geese may be mostly grey, but they are neither small, shy nor quiet.

For at least ten years villagers at Great Holland may have noticed the cackling call, similar to that of domestic geese, as they fly over in groups of around ten. Indeed domestic geese were originally derived from Greylags.

Shouldn't I be writing about these birds in winter? Well they used to be geese which would visit Essex in winter, very wild, highly respected by wildfowlers, breeding in North West Scotland and further north in Europe but not here. The 'lag' part of their name is said to be because they were usually later to fly north each spring than other wild geese.

In the 1970's there are records of feral or escaped domestic geese, along with some pure wild birds, being released in Hamford Water. They were introduced in similar ways in other parts of Essex and southern England and now the resulting progeny are far from scarce!

For several years now, the geese have moved on to our pond at Holland Pits. I observed one pair this year, sitting on the island opposite the hide, and one day I took a photograph of the families with their young. I was surprised to note that there were five adults along with eight goslings. I had assumed there were just four adults. It seems surprising that these geese should choose to nest on our pond, surrounded by trees, because their more usual choice in the wild is on open lakes and rivers. It is likely that the adults marched their progeny to the river by foot. They probably had no room to take off in the enclosed pond.

Our regular water fowl, the Mallard, Coots, Moorhens and Little Grebes were probably not sorry to see the departure of the geese because of their tendency to strut around as though they are in charge.


