

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

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

Rector's article

Do you know anything about a piano made by Broadwood and Sons that was in the Saffron Walden area between 1906 and 1983?

If you do, it might be worth mentioning it to Shrewsbury Coroner's Court as they seek it's history. The reason is that recently, as the piano was re-tuned and repaired, a hoard of hidden gold coins was discovered.

The collection consists of an undisclosed number of full and half sovereigns, dating from 1847 to 1915 and experts believe the coins could yield a "life-changing" sum of money, with a full sovereign worth at least £220.

It reminds you that if you've been planning to get your old piano up to speed again, maybe now's the time!


But it also reminds us of the delight of discovering hidden treasure.

Caterpillars and butterflies

How many of you have caterpillars growing in their living room? I do! My children received a kit that enables them to grow caterpillars into butterflies as a present. In fact the present consisted of a voucher entitling them to those caterpillars and a net for the butterflies.

They were so excited to receive that present and couldn't wait to send the voucher off so that they could receive the caterpillars.

But, they received that voucher in the wrong time of the year. And they had to wait for Spring to arrive, before they could send off for the caterpillars. And they waited- and that waiting paid off the caterpillars are finally here and it is amazing to watch the journey that they take in becoming butterflies.

Dear Friends,

That spring I promised you in the last letter is arriving beautifully!

To celebrate, we have finally bought a nice new PA system (jointly with the Village Hall Committee) and it will blasting your ears at the AGM on Saturday May 13th. Hopefully, our hopeless mumblings at the front will now be heard by all. I do apologise that it has taken so long to realise this problem and do something about it.

That four days of road closure down by the bridge that I mentioned in the same letter ended as planned but, within days, a contraflow appeared and it's still going strong with no end in sight as I write this. There are two possible explanations. Firstly, lots of you could have petitioned Essex County Council to obstruct the traffic flow again, as you found the extra time on the way to school, work or shops restful and a good time to catch up on your reading! Secondly, that the contractors are confident enough about Essex County Council monitoring to try again for the Guinness Book of Records, page 388, which records the longest time taken by a contractor to link a new development to services and utilities. Thus far, they have smashed the record by eight days and rising, so congratulations to them on this triumph of incompetence!

Well, it wouldn't be the same if Tendring District Council gave us nothing to complain about and they have not disappointed. It triumphantly announced that it now has over 4.8 years of building land and expected to hit the magic five year requirement shortly (if a council does not have such a supply, then, roughly speaking, it's open season for developers to do what they want). No mention, of course, of why it has taken them several years to get this far (very wise, of course, as no one is that anxious to advertise their own culpability). They did emphasise that this triumph had played a part in winning a recent appeal against a refusal of consent. Now, that was true. Even I admit it and it is better late than never.

Why therefore are Tendring planning officers still encouraging developers in secret meetings to put in inappropriate applications and then recommending approval to a lapdog Planning Committee that regards challenge and discussion of public objections as too revolutionary to contemplate? These secret meetings are perfectly lawful, because the legislation provides for a so-called 'pre-app', so that developers can get a sense of what might prove acceptable to a planning authority. Actually, that makes a lot of sense to me and the procedure has been around for decades. IF planners do their job and view the planning function as a way of achieving balance between land owners and the interests of the local community, this works fine. We

won't always agree with the outcome but, overall, it works and I have seen that in many different council areas in which I have worked or lived.

Then you come to Tendring and you find a gaggle of councillors effectively controlling the planning functions, who view the entire system as red tape restricting the legitimate desires of developers to make money. Over the years, they have recruited like minded planning officers and the consequence is what my neighbour told me on moving here. TDC means "The Developers' Council". Having engineered the lack of a local plan to create a free for all (and I do indeed believe that some councillors DID engineer it), it appears TDC has another tactic up its sleeve to keep the gate open indefinitely. Here is how it works.

As a planning officer committed to freedom to develop, you have to be careful. You want to be helpful, but you have to look as though you are viewing each application on its merits. Developers use the pre-app system widely, but they almost always do it when they understand the proposal is likely to be controversial. Conservation areas and ribbon development are two classic cases.

Particularly in a village context, every planner I have ever known adopts a highly restrictive approach to these two and it's blindingly obvious why that is. With the first, the clue is in the title! "Conservation" doesn't mean "ossification", but it does mean a deeply conservative approach to retain the character that led to the designation in the first place.

With the second, the object is to prevent urban sprawl which, in a village context, means preventing the merger of settlement areas and defending green gaps as though life depended on it. That is how you stop a village becoming a town.

I have written plenty in previous letters about those big detached new houses out on Kirby Road; ribbon development, plain and simple and waved through on the quiet by a TDC planning officer. Then we have two consents in Church Lane in the Conservation Area, one of them (amazingly) in someone's front garden. Then we have the even more recent ribbon development consent along Pork Lane. All these followed pre-apps and all of them led to an officer recommendation for approval and all of them were unchallenged by the Planning Committee. Now we come to the latest.

Just beyond The Lion's Den and the two new bungalows very sensibly built on this eyesore of a site is an older bungalow called "Veldt". Just beyond that is a big field fronting Little Clacton Road for several hundred metres to the next dwelling. An application is in to build three bungalows in a little cul de sac on the land next to Veldt. It was preceded by a pre-app and I understand the planning officer is recommending approval. Do you need special expertise to understand that shortly after that one is granted, the process will repeat itself until the greenfield frontage is filled in! Several million pounds must be at stake here in the longer run! Once that first, 'harmless' little consent goes through, TDC is stripped of any valid argument to resist subsequent applications.

Any planning officer is in a position to effectively prevent this happening by presenting a rational argument at the pre-app and, if the application still comes in, developing that argument further to recommend refusal. With almost enough land for a five year supply, TDC is also strongly placed to win any appeal.

I believe this is not happening and planning officers with personal agendas are deliberately encouraging this process. I am not claiming corruption. Not at all, as a planning officer is legally entitled to form a view and express it. I am claiming that planning officers are effectively

making policy on the hoof, according to personal prejudice and that this must meet with the approval of the councillors, who do not challenge it. The pre-apps may take place in secret, but the officer recommendations are public and there are only three explanations. The councillors approve, the councillors simply don't care or the councillors are too spineless to raise objection. Whichever one you choose, local opinion becomes irrelevant. I shall, of course, address the lapdog committee in due course, as will Councillor Bucke. Provided the earth stops turning in the meantime, I am confident they will listen intently and respectfully to both of us and realise the error of their ways!

Enjoy the sounds, smells and colours of spring. The Church Lane peacock, Percy, is looking magnificent and preparing to 'sing' vainly for a mate, starting around 5am. The green woodpeckers have already started their raucous mating calls and the more melodious of our feathered friends are slowly gearing up for the magnificent dawn chorus in six weeks or so.

April 2017 Newsletter

Greetings from the surgery, I am sorry there was no newsletter last month. I had a skiing holiday and missed the deadline when I returned because the surgery was so busy at that time. I had never been skiing before and as I am always keen to try new things thought I would give it a go. It's fair to say I'm not a natural but after seeing so many people in wheel chairs and on crutches at the airport I think I did pretty well for an 'old girl'.

When undertaking a new type of exercise or embarking on a fitness regime it is a good idea to make sure you are not overextending your capabilities and that you have the basic equipment necessary. Walking for example needs only sensible shoes in this area and not survivalist equipment, and for this reason walking is an excellent place to start to improve health and wellbeing. We should all probably do more exercise and with the approach of spring why not get outside and make the most of what this beautiful area has to offer.

There have been a number of consultation events locally to look at the provision of health care, primarily the walk-in-centres, minor injuries units and the out-of-hours provisions are being looked at. The consultation period is now finished and we await the clinical commissioners' review of urgent care in our area. Members of the PPG have attended some of the meetings and had their voices heard. I think undoubtedly there will be some kind of change that will affect everyone in this area. I will let you know via the PPG and the newsletter of what the outcome is but undoubtedly it will be in the local press.

The building of new homes in the Tendring area is a big topic at present and this will obviously have an effect on what health provisions are made, population growth has a direct effect on health, schools and infrastructure. The community must take advantage of any consultation events that are held in order to get the best deal on the table. To hear of meetings and events that affect health I would suggest that everyone is a member of a PPG. This is the most reliable way to keep informed of surgery news and local hospital issues. 

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


Some of you know that besides being warden at Great Holland Pits, I also look after Colne Point nature reserve, a large area of sand, gravel and mud just to the west of St Osyth. Much of the beach material there migrated westwards by the parish of Great Holland to get deposited at Colne Point. A quick look at the aerial photographs on Google illustrate a very smooth mostly south facing aspect to the coastline, and further investigation on the ground show man-made defences all the way from the crag walk at the Naze to the higher ground at Point Clear.

Before the influence of people the coast was irregular. Erosion at the Naze is said to have taken the coast back nine miles since medieval times, Walton with its church then being well inland. Imagine the volume of aggregate crumbling into the sea as the cliffs of Walton, Frinton, Holland On Sea and Clacton were steadily planed back. Flood tides and wave action have the tendency to roll pebbles up the beach and usually along to the west, and as the wave subsides they roll down again, still edging towards Colne Point. There was plenty of material to build up a sand ridge west of Clacton all the way to Colne Point, and the sheltered conditions behind this enormous ridge gathered silt to form the marshes behind. There was enough gravel at Colne Point for a quarrying operation to operate for many years and some of the remains of the equipment can still be seen there. Barges transported much of it to Bow Creeks in East London for building.

The situation in the parish of Great Holland was more complicated. The site of Holland Brook which almost surrounds the village was then a tidal creek, known as the Gunfleet. The large volume of water pushed in and out by tidal action would not allow a continuous ridge to form, and the vast volumes of gravel being transported are likely to have built up in a series of spits in the area of Frinton Golf course.

The Gunfleet included the 'Haven', in medieval times a massive tidal channel used as a harbour. Historic documents record that eventually it started to silt up and it shipping became problematic. A seawall was built towards the end of the 17th century thus reclaiming the area as pasture, and the smooth line of the present coast evolved.



Erosion is still an issue, despite the provision of groynes and breakwaters to hinder the movement of sand and gravel westwards. The current most cost effective way of slowing the erosion has involved building stone structures known as fishtail groynes using huge rocks from Norway. Thirty eight of these have recently been installed between Holland Sluice and Clacton Pier at about £1 million each, with sand being pumped to the beaches from off shore.

However sea defence is very expensive and attempts are being made to rationalise what is done. Money spent should not exceed the value of the land protected. A series of Shoreline Management Plans were published, which propose to maintain the line until 2025 or 2050, but afterwards the cost of sea defence would not be met by taxes. Landowners would be responsible. I expect politicians to modify these plans as things happen.

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VILLAGE FOOTPATHS

Alan Nash has lived in Great Holland for almost 70 years having occupied homes in Little Clacton Road, Church Lane, Pork Lane and Manor Road. He is particularly concerned regarding the footpath that runs from the end of Church Lane to Frinton.

"Newer residents in the village might not be aware that this footpath was, until recently, a concrete paved area approximately four feet wide; going from the farm located on the left hand side of what is now a farm track with a concrete area. It then turns left and became a paved and tarmac surface before it turns right heading downhill to cross Kirby Brook at the tennis courts at the bottom.

My mother and grandmother, as well as other villagers, used to push prams and pushchairs along this path to get to Frinton where they collected their NHS milks, etc.

Many other people from the village used this path on a daily basis to get to and from their work places in Frinton and Walton or just to go shopping as Frinton then had shops like Woolworth, The Co-op, together with many privately owned shops that sold things like records, radios and electrical appliances.

As young lads we would 'head across the fields to Frinton' as it was often referred to, so we could spend our hard earned pocket money (Yes, earned!) in one of the shops, using the well-known footpath on our bikes be it legal or not to ride on a footpath at that time.

This footpath was originally maintained on a regular basis by Tendring Council and I have watched council workmen (some villagers) carry out concrete and tarmac repairs on the entire length from Great Holland to Frinton."

Alan has been in touch with Essex County Council regarding who should be responsible for reinstating this footpath and he would be grateful to hear from anyone offering support for this. He would also like to hear from any long-term residents in the form of memories or photographs of the footpath as it originally was (anonymously if preferred).

Frinton Festival 2017

26th - 29th May inclusive



The annual concert in All Saints' Church in Great Holland, featuring music for strings by Mozart and Dvorak, will be on **Saturday 27th May** at 7.00pm, followed by a post-concert meal with performers and audience (those who want to come!) at The Manor. As always, the church will be filled to the brim with candles and flowers and there will be a celebratory peal of bells from 6.15-6.45pm to welcome everyone.

Back in 2011 local resident Joan Ellis suggested that my Barbican Piano Trio give a concert in Voysey's remarkable "Homestead" and tickets for the concert sold out very quickly. The following year there was a waiting list for tickets and a year later this waiting list had as many names as there had been tickets available. "Well, you will just have to start a Festival" she said, so I did.

Frinton has many interesting and unusual places which could host beautiful music-making, but I noticed that there is very little going on during the year. A highlight is the series of Thursday lunchtime concerts at St. Mary's Church. With the purchase of a reconditioned grand piano and Duncan Archard's efforts as the Church's Musical Director, the future there is bright.

What the Frinton Festival does is bring a quality of music-making that would otherwise only be available by travelling to London right to the doorstep of local residents. The choice of music is carefully matched to the character of the space in which it is to be performed and has included bold explorations of music by the little known Russian composer Sergei Taneyev, the surprisingly underappreciated Camille Saint-Saens and the rather better known Ludwig van Beethoven. The acoustic perfection of the Old Church and All Saints' Church across the fields in Great Holland has been readily enjoyed, and this year concert-goers will benefit from the extensive reconditioning of the elegant Steinway piano in the "Homestead". The new flexible seating in St. Mary's Parish Church proved to be a huge plus in 2016 as it allows for an "in-the-round" setting that means that all the audience are seated excitingly close to the performers.

We have found that the Festival Audience is fearlessly curious! So each concert in the 2017 Festival, which runs from 26th-29th May, features not only beautiful music by Mozart and Dvorak, but also a piece by a living composer. The audience will have the opportunity to meet and chat to them about their music and why they wrote what they wrote.

The Festival attracts visitors from beyond the gates to Frinton and we already have 2017 bookings from France, Denmark, Yorkshire and Sussex. We are keen that the local area should benefit as widely as possible and have established links with local restaurants, B&Bs and especially with the unique Naze Gallery.

There are several innovations this year. The Red Lion in Kirby is hosting an acoustic showcase where pub-goers can enjoy live bite-sized classical string quartet music while sipping a pint and meeting friends. The same group will perform this beautiful music for residents and visitors to Read House and Mid-Meadows care homes, who would otherwise probably not be able to enjoy what the Festival has to offer, supported by Frinton Rotary Club. And this year anyone can take part by singing in a special Festival Evensong at St. Mary's on Sunday 28th May - there are rehearsals before the service and on the preceding Thursday evening.

Those purchasing tickets for a Festival event somewhat uniquely buy into the whole experience then and there. Programmes are included in the ticket price, as are interval refreshments, a selection of wines generously provided by the Festival's sponsors - locally based wine-merchant Mr. Wheeler. There are free tickets for the Friday and Saturday concerts for those aged 8-25 thanks to the CAVATINA Chamber Music Trust. Full details are at www.frintonfestival.com
