### Easter - a time for reflection ...

I recently watched a short series of programmes entitled 'Stargazing', presented by Professor Brian Cox, which included contributions by two sometimes controversial characters, Dara O Briain and Jonathan Ross.

Being rather low on the scale of intelligence I usually find 'Space' type programmes way beyond me, but these three men presented in an interesting and light hearted manner which kept me happily focused. So when I learned that Prof. Brian Cox was presenting a further series, 'Wonders of the Universe', I was eager to view. The first programme, 'Destiny', was quite deep and it could have left some viewers a little depressed, as it was about how the universe was changing. He highlighted what was happening to our planet, how in billions of years time Earth would no longer exist, and how much further down the line the whole universe would have decayed into nothingness. Even being assured that it wouldn't happen in our or our children's children's lifetime I went to bed somberly thoughtful!

Well, as I write this I am aware that Japan has experienced one of the strongest earthquakes on record and though the movement of the tectonic plates was unseen, the consequences at the surface were just unbelievably horrific. A wall of water up to thirty feet high surging inland taking with it everything in its path; fleets of vehicles swept along as if matchboxes and houses torn from their foundations and totally destroyed. In a moment destruction and chaos only thought up for the worst-case disaster movies; and then two days later we hear of further and even more alarming consequences of this tsunami; the potential meltdown in four nuclear power plants! Our thoughts and prayers must surely be with this nation as they face such a nightmare scenario.

With natural disasters seemingly becoming more common and severe, and with the many conflicts and tensions in the world the question is again asked, are these signs of 'the end days'. Well it is true that the Bible says that in the last days there will be wars and rumours of wars, famines and eartquakes; and as we know some sects have predicted the last day and it has come and gone with no ill effect. What Jesus said was 'no one knows the day or the hour' but He also told his followers to be ready, be prepared, and to live a life in accordance with God's will. From these words of Christ it seems that we need to examine ourselves (look in the mirror of our inner being) and where we see our shortcomings come to Him in prayer, penitence, and a readiness to be forgiven, allowing Him to become part of our lives. Surely Easter is an appropriate time as we remember the purpose of His death and resurrection.

# Home Made Hour

This is more my mother's recipe than mine as it was given to her many years ago from her friend who was from Lancashire. The original recipe calls for Lancashire cheese but we often use Cheddar instead.

#### Leek and Cheese Pie

#### Ingredients

1lb (500g) short crust pastry 1lb (500g) leeks 4-6oz (100-200g) cheese (more if you like it cheesy)

#### Method

- Clean & chop leeks into small pieces
- Cook in boiling water until tender
- Line 9 inch (22cm) dish with pastry (quite thinly rolled)
- Spread cooked leeks in dish and cover with grated cheese (or sliced thinly if using Lancashire cheese)
- Season with pepper
- Cover with pastry.
- Brush top with milk.
- Cook Gas 6/200c for 25-30 mins
- Can be eaten hot or cold.



#### **Minutes**

John Poulten welcomed everyone, including our visitors Mayor Robert Bucke and PCSO Paul Brassey & PC Ian Rutherford.

#### Apologies for Absence: were received from:

Hazel & David Martin, Robin & Jackie Moulton, Eddie Forest, Malcolm Graham, Clint & Sally Strutt, David Masters, Sylvia Nicoll, Liz & Nigel Oakley.

Thanks were recorded to Rose for the hospitality of the Orchard Tea Room.

Minutes of the last meeting (30<sup>th</sup> October 2010) were approved - as published in Village Voice.

#### **Matters Arising**

John advised that his usual open letter to the Village would be available in the next edition of Village Voice (which is in the process of being printed.)

#### Land for potential Travellers site.

Tendring District Counsel has completed the exercise of identifying and inviting requests to sell land. Although two sites in Kirby had been mentioned in the report to TDC, these were considered to be marginal and, that the nearest site likely to be offered is Weeley and towards Ardleigh.

#### Police Update

PCSO Paul Brassey provided a summary on the few Great Holland related items logged by the Police since the last meeting:

- 1 suspicious caller
- 1 Nuisance Noise at Village Hall (related to a Christmas Party).
- 1 Concern for the welfare of an elderly neighbour.
- 2 Road Traffic Collisions on the Marshes
- Criminal Damage in Pork Lane
- Suspicious vehicle with Police style lights on roof (transpired to be an off duty Soldier, visiting family).



#### General Police advice given:

- When leaving your vehicle, NEVER leave SatNavs + Cradles, handbags or valuables on display in cars.
- Be on watch for Prowlers an increasing number of Oil / Fuel thefts have occurred in Tendring area, following the sharp increase in fuel prices.

#### Speed Camera Training.

PC Rob Willmott can provide the requisite 2 hour training to anyone interested in operating the speed gun. Users are provided with all equipment, together with guidance on dealing with any interaction with drivers. The index numbers recorded of offending drivers are passed to the Police central bureau and a warning letter issued. Police will take further action against repeat offenders. This is an ideal opportunity to address local speeding concerns.

The Mayor confirmed that F&WTC are seeking to arrange a combined training session and in doing so, avoid the need to pay the £200 training fee charged to Residents Associations.

A resident remarked that a high proportion of drivers in Main road can regularly be found driving whilst talking on hand held mobile phones.

#### Treasurer's update- provided by Denys & Lindy Strich

- Only 30 Households have renewed their 2011 subscription to the Association (vs. a 2010 year end membership of 96).
- Current bank balance is £1,803.38

The Gt Holland Christmas card sales were disappointing and created a loss, however with funds raised at the Beetle Drive and Christmas Social, the Association finished the year breaking even.

John Poulten has plenty of Cards remaining and said that a new card would not be produced for Christmas 2011, but rather, the existing stock would be re-offered for sale. Because of the poor responses in 2009 and 2010 it would be unlikely that the Association would produce new cards for 2012 and beyond.

The Christmas Social event was reported as a great success, which hopefully will be repeated in 2011. Thanks were given to Sandra Mooney for orchestrating this and the previous Beetle



drive event. The Christmas social raised £46 for the charity Crisis. Anyone with ideas for future events should contact Sandra Mooney on 672453. Anyone who could help should also contact Sandra.

Alan Large suggested that the association should hold a greater balance (near to a figure of £10,000) in the event that expert advice was required to represent the village. John Poulten felt the existing balance to be adequate and added that additional funds could be sought at the time they were needed.

#### Planning Matters -

Kirby Secure Dementia Unit :

A Planning Agreement has still yet to be completed regarding the timing of the Highway alterations vs the completion of development work. As advised in October, F&WTC require the pavement and street work around the bridge and the creation of 2 new bus stops to be completed before the work on site commences (rather than the developer's preference for completing the work before the first resident is admitted). It was suggested that TDC appear content to allow the Highway work to follow after the first resident has taken occupation – with the risk that the developer might not then carry out the works, for whatever reason.

#### AOB

#### Junction of Little Clacton Rd and Sladbury's Lane / Holland Rd.

A number of residents felt that the junction towards Clacton was too narrow and created a risk of accident. John Poulten agreed to make enquiries with Essex CC Highways as to options surrounding changing the layout (widening/mini-round about etc).

Pork Lane dropped kerb

John Poulten advised that the junction of Pork lane with Main Road would soon have the benefit of a dropped kerb – making crossing the junction with a wheel chair/push chair considerably easier. Installation estimated for March 2011.

Pot Holes – Essex CC Highways have advised that potholes will be repaired as part of on-going maintenance, however it was suggested that those who submit requests for repairs via the Essex County Council website are getting greater success than those writing/phoning. #### Queen's Diamond Jubilee

John asked whether the residents would like to hold a Village event to celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of the Queen's coronation (similar to that arranged for the Silver Jubilee in 1977.) The general feeling being that this would be a good idea, John said it would need appropriate planning/organising and that the various interest Groups around the Village should come together.



Action: JP to approach local interest groups to gauge interest and form a steering group.

Frinton Film Festival

The Mayor reminded residents of the forthcoming Film Festival, 12<sup>th</sup> March 2011. Residents are encouraged to vote for their favourite film at Caxton books (Connaught Ave.). The list from which to choose is quite extensive, however anyone hoping to see the 2011 Oscar nominated "The Kings Speech" are more likely to end up seeing the original 1930's version! The winning Films will be shown at Afternoon and Evening performances. Tickets priced at £4 (afternoon) and £8 (evening) with profits going to charity.

**Local Library** 

In an effort to reduce costs, Essex CC is reviewing the benefits associated with the County's library services. Residents are encouraged to give their views during the consultation period  $(14^{th} \text{ Feb} - 27^{th} \text{ March})$ .

If you value the Gt Holland Mobile Library, Frinton Library or Clacton Library services – now is the time to tell them: else they may be considered dispensable.

#### Thanks to Robin Moulton

A letter was received from Sally Strutt, thanking Robin Moulton for the hard work he had put into both removing a fallen tree from the footpath in Church Lane and in replacing the Kissing Gate at the footpath next to the Old Gt Holland Nurseries.

Alan Large informed the meeting that Robin had worked persistently to install a replacement, given the Essex CC contact advised that she felt the path was better without it. The semi-circular frame has already been re-instated and Robin is currently working with the forge in Lower Kirby to produce a gate which will close in the manner required.

Ditch by Pork Lane Bridleway.

Judith Little mentioned that the ditch by the bridle way (at the top of Pork Lane) was full of rubbish. John Poulten was asked to contact the local magistrates office and enquire whether it would be possible for offenders undertaking community services could clear the ditches. However it was acknowledged that this ditch belonged to the land owner and suggested that emptying it was his responsibility.

Footnote. Judith rang John on Monday morning to say that the ditch was now clear. It appears that Judith had not walked along that bridleway for a week or two. GHRA cannot claim credit for the clearance of the ditch

#### EASTER AND THE ROYAL WEDDING

Easter will be here eventually, with Easter Saturday falling on St George's Day. Not only will that be a long weekend but also the Royal Wedding will be on the following Friday which will be another public holiday. GHRA are not organising anything but Elaine and Mick at The Ship Inn have plans.

In addition to Mick's normal Easter Monday Barbeque there will be more festivities on the Friday. The Wedding itself will at 11am followed by a procession down The Mall to Buckingham Palace where at about 1.30pm William and Kate and other members of the Royal family will appear on the Balcony before the crowds.

Television coverage will be extensive throughout the day but what is planned is that Elaine and Mick will be hosting a Garden Party. Full details appear elsewhere in this edition of Village Voice.

#### PLANNING and PROPERTY MATTERS

#### 58 Bed Dementia Unit.

Planning permission for the revised road works should be granted soon. The Highway Conditions proposed by Essex CC will be included. Most if not all of the highway works will be carried out before the first occupancy. Only certain preliminary works need to be carried out before any other development starts. Once the preliminary works are started then the old appeal condition 9 (permitting traffic lights and widening the footpath under the bridge) will be extinguished. The permission will be issued at the same time as a formal agreement is entered into with the developers which will bind them and their successors. That plan will require the provision of mini bus transport for staff and others living within a two mile radius of the property and also for a Green Travel Plan to be introduced to positively encourage travel to and from the property other than by car. The last piece of the jigsaw will be when the developer enters into various highway agreements with Essex CC regulating the carrying out of the highway and pavement works South of Kirby Bridge. These will be dealt with as development proceeds.

#### 30 Bed Dementia Unit

The Appeal has been allowed. At the moment I do not know when or if the development will proceed. This is the site to the immediate North of Kirby Bridge 1-4 Holland Road.

#### **Local Listings**

Alan Large, Denys Strich and I attended a meeting at TDC on 7<sup>th</sup> March to hear about the Council's plans to introduce Local Listings of Building and areas which, although not of national significance, might be considered to be worthy of "protection" locally. This arises out of national Policy set out in Planning Policy Statement PPS 5. The meeting raised as many questions as it answered and the plan is to reconvene in about four months time to consider it further. We will monitor the situation carefully and I will pass on more information as and when we get it.





## **Great Holland Pits Nature Reserve:**

# The Trust Open Day – Sunday 5th June





Once every year we have an Open Day. The reserve is open throughout the year, but on this occasion the local group of the Essex Wildlife Trust provide some extra facilities.

As warden I arrive early on these occasions, as there is much to prepare, but I am joined soon after by Barbara who coordinates refreshments, her cakes being legendary. Tents are erected, a primitive toilet is installed and equipment is prepared for other events during the day.

Officially the event starts at 11:00am, though teas will be available for early comers. Typically at 11:00 am, I use my tall stature and teacher's voice to rally the assembled children, and others who are young at heart, to start the pond dipping. Other members from the village and I lead the dippers to the first pool. Depending on the state of the ponds we visit three or four of them with nets and white enamel trays. Typically the children are excited to see a range of small creepy crawlies from the start, but their enthusiasm is enhanced with their first stickleback or newt. The Great Crested Newt is for some the highlight, but the sinister looking, though completely harmless Water Scorpion and the dragonfly larvae also stir considerable excitement. We filter back to the refreshment area by 1:00pm, to get cleaned up, ready to repeat the exercise at 2:00pm.

Morning and afternoon there are also guided walks provided by several local members, knowledgeable about all sorts of wildlife. The event is held in the season when we can usually expect to hear some Nightingales singing, along with sightings of summer birds and butterflies. Last year the breathtaking Brimstone Butterfly and the delicate Green Hairstreak were noted.

#### Life around the Village Green

In this issue I am writing about living 'On the Green'. Around the Green were clusters of little cottages. On the Pork Lane side there was a certain house named 'Fairlight Glen, which was owned by a Mr Alfred Drinkwater. He advertised in the local directory:

"Why not go to 'FAIRLIGHT GLEN' Tea and Pleasure Gardens, Great Holland Green (easy walk from Frinton Golf Links)



On the corner of Kirby Road opposite the Green were a row of houses named "Plantation Cottages". The end one, on the right, was the Post Office and Village Stores (where you could buy practically anything). There were three other houses in the row. The Post Office and stores was later rebuilt on the other side of the road. It was opened by the actor Gerald Harper. Plantation Cottages have since been demolished. Pork Lane was originally called Park Lane and the Green was much larger, extending beyond Plantation Cottages along the Kirby Road as far as 'Green End Lane', as is shown on the Ordinance map of 1820.

Leading up to every November the fifth, the villagers would get together and build a huge bonfire on the Green. Then on the night all would bring their families, guys and fireworks and have a lovely Guy Fawkes night.

Other events happened on the Green: There was a brass band who performed there, a fair was held there; donkeys were grazed there. It was certainly the hub of village life.



### From Great Holland to Chelsea ...

In January, we were enjoying lunch in the Park Fruit Farm tearoom when we were distracted by some young men in the orchards. They were busy carrying trees that had been cut into pieces and marked with tape, and laying them in front of a large transporter. After a while, the men came into the tea room. When we overheard them talking about window displays, we had to find out more!

They told us that they were part of the Conran design team and had travelled all the way to the Farm to buy plum trees to use in window displays at their stores in Chelsea and Marylebone.



They had chosen the trees specifically for their shape and because of their size, had to cut them into pieces before taking them to London, where they were to be reassembled once they were in the stores.

In February a piece about the design project, entitled 'Think Pink', was posted on the Conran blog. It included photos of the trees which, by then, had become the focal point of spectacular Spring window displays at the two stores. The trees had been decorated with pink 'blossom' that was man-made using fabric petals. Evidently, each piece of blossom was added to the trees by hand, which was rather more labour-intensive than had been anticipated, and more blossom would be added as the weeks went by, to mirror what was happening outside. Including the 'blossom' decorating the floor, it was anticipated that there would eventually be almost two million pieces of blossom by the time the team had finished!
