

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

## **Interregnum Notes**

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

For a decade we, at both St. Michael's and All Saints, have been blessed by the ministry and leadership of our well loved and respected Rector, Peter Coley and his wise, supportive and understanding wife Annie. They have both reached the age at which the government is willing to support them with a State Pension and a bus-pass, and so have taken this opportunity to retire from full-time ministry and leave the parishes that he and Annie have learned to love and cherish. We welcome them to the Senior Citizens Club!

So with their hairy, four-legged, fun loving companion, Bob, they have set off in their caravan (not unlike Abram) to pastures new. To where, they don't exactly know, but they go trusting God!



During his incumbency at Kirby, Peter had modified services in order to encourage attendance by those "on the fringe" or who find "Church" rather daunting; and had encouraged the PCC to pioneer our very successful Pre-School, introduce Mums and Toddlers - now named Noah's Ark - and started monthly children's work at Kirby Cross. Through his love and concern for families a part-time Family Outreach Worker was appointed. For the lonely and older folk a bi-weekly FIG, Friendship and Interest Group, has been established (tea, cake and board games), which has been of real benefit.

Shortly into his ministry the Chancel was reordered, and later a crèche area was established. The fabric of the church has not been forgotten with the raising of £130,000 for the underpinning of the S.W. corner and long south wall, and recently the re-building of one buttress and the renovation of the organ. At Great Holland the tower and tower-roof are undergoing major works. A new, larger and more versatile Rectory was purchased in 2007 with the long term view that it would better serve a future Rector with family, and it could house a church office, which it has done most successfully.

Peter and Annie left church buildings in better shape than when they arrived, congregations stronger in faith, and, praise God, some individuals starting out on new journeys of faith via Confirmation classes, Alpha courses, Home groups and person to person witness. Several have been encouraged to attend Courses on Christian Studies and one member has taken the bold and courageous step of applying for and being accepted as an Ordinand.

Again we say "THANK YOU PETER and ANNIE FOR YOUR LOVE AND DEVOTION IN YOUR MINISTRY TO THE PEOPLE OF KIRBY and GREAT HOLLAND."

"Interregnum": It sounds almost medieval; well it is, Latin too, and to many its meaning is lost in time. It means simply "the time between", and for us it's the time between Peters going and a new incumbent being installed (appointed); the modern term is "vacancy".

Parishioners have been asking who will be coming next and when will they arrive. Well, as is the tradition of the good old C of E. we expect to be without a Rector for between six and nine months, during which time the PCC and Church Wardens have the extra responsibility of arranging services and generally attempting to keep the churches running. It is hoped that the pattern of services will continue very much as we are familiar with, though there may be the odd times when this will not be possible. Retired clergy will provide cover, especially for presiding at Communion Services whilst lay persons will be called upon to conduct and speak at other services.

Just as Peter and Annie are beginning both a new phase in their physical journey through life and a spiritual journey of faith, we too begin our new journey. To some it may seem like venturing into the unknown, but through faith, prayer and courage we will come through and hopefully be the fitter and stronger for it.

So please support us in your thoughts, prayers and by your physical presence. This is not the time to stay away but a time of joining us: we are a family, and as such we need one another!

Christmas is coming.... As the festive season is rapidly approaching, what better idea than to get ahead with the cooking. Here is a recipe which freezes well and can be served either as a cake or pudding!

#### Mincemeat Crumble

200g unsalted butter cubed at room temp 300g plain flour 100g ground almonds 100g caster sugar

410g jar mincemeat 50g flaked almonds

icing sugar for dusting





- Pre heat oven 180/gas4.
- Put flour, butter, ground almonds, sugar and salt in food processor. Blend until it binds together.
- Pour about 3/4 of crumble mixture into tray bake tin (18x28cm) lined with baking parchment. Spread it well and press down firmly, then spread mincemeat on top.
- Mix flaked almonds into remaining mixture. Scatter on top of mincemeat, press down lightly.
- Bake in centre of oven till golden. Remove from tin and leave to cool.
- Dust with icing sugar and cut into 12 fingers

## **Update on All Saints' Tower Restoration Project**

I had hoped that by the time this edition of Village Voice came out the work on the tower would have been completed and the scaffolding down - but! as with any building work it always takes just a bit longer than anticipated. As I mentioned in the last issue, a lot more masonry repair was needed than was originally thought- this is painstaking work for the Bakers of Danbury craftsmen using specially handmade bricks and jointing them in the traditional manner. They also found considerable damage to some of the stone tracery in the windows -were rotting and have now been replaced. Over the past few years we have had a problem with jackdaws nesting in/on the tower - two of the windowsills in the bell chamber had piles of sticks over 3' high and the spiral staircase to the tower roof had become completely blocked. All this material has now been removed and all the small window slits have had wire mesh fitted securely over them.

The new roof looks quite splendid and should last for 100 years or more! As you can probably imagine, there is a wonderful view from the tower roof and I had thought it would be a good idea to open the tower to the public on completion of the work. I have been advised, however, that this will not be possible as there is no alternative 'fire escape' from the roof!

Some of you may have seen the article on the Tower in the Frinton & Walton Gazette last week, where particular mention was made regarding the generous donation of £15,000 from the Friends of Essex Churches Trust. David Lodge, the Chairman of the Trust's Grants Committee was kind enough to say that a 'bigger grant was given to All Saints' because they had put so much effort into the project.' He went on to say that "It's hard for communities to raise the sort of money needed for repairs like this. We like to help where we can, but the village also did really well on their own and we like to see that. It is important to save historic buildings like this as they are real focal points for communities."

Finally, I DO hope the scaffolding will be down in time for the Christmas services – as you will see elsewhere in the magazine, the Bishop of Colchester will be coming to take the Christmas Day service, which will be very special.



John Poulten welcomed everyone, including our visitors Mayor Robert Bucke and PCSO Peter White.

#### Apologies for Absence:

Were received from Hazel & David Martin, Margaret Turnbull, Eileen & Bill Derrick, Judith Little, Margaret & Roger Frere, Amanda & Ray Smith, Sgt Pete Gerrard.

Minutes of the last meeting (15th May 2010) were approved - as published in Village Voice.

#### **Matters Arising**

John advised that the majority of items arising from the previous minutes had been addressed via his update in the September Village Voice:

• Land for potential Travellers site.

Tendring District Counsel has completed the exercise of inviting requests to sell land, which in turn would be made available to travellers. They are now reviewing a consultant's report prior to release to District Councillors.

#### Police Update

PCSO Peter White provided a summary on the 71 Great Holland related items logged by the Police since the last meeting:

- Majority of incidents related to Road Traffic Collisions
- 1 Burglary (Pork Lane)
- 2 vehicle thefts (a Motorbike, recovered the same day, and a car).
- 3 nuisance youth calls, relating to:
  - Pork Lane (bin bags moved into the centre of the road: culprits were found and advice given).
  - o Cars reported on the nature reserve no sign when police attended.
  - o Rowdy behaviour in Rectory Road appeared to be an isolated event.
- 2 reports of travellers on the Marshes.
- 1 instance of criminal damage (Graffiti): kit was supplied to repair the wall.
- 1 theft of a wheelie bin



No update was available on the theft of the Church Lane Kissing-Gate, stolen some
weeks back, together with a metal sign.
John Poulten advised that the council representative to whom he had spoken, suggested
that it was unlikely that Essex CC would support its replacement as their policy is to
resist the installation of obstructions to free passage (such as gates) along footpaths
where there are no animals that needed to be enclosed.

#### Neighbourhood Action Panel (NAP)

A forum set up by Essex Police to address issues and concerns raised by members of the local community – the venue changes to encourage maximum participation. #### Speeding

With excess speeding remaining the biggest concern within the village, the meeting discussed a number of speed related topics:

#### Speed Camera Training

PCSO Peter White advised of a scheme that was available to help address the matter. Community Speed Watch is a Police backed initiative that offers to train members of a local community in the operation of a speed camera. Cameras can then be made available for residents to operate.

#### • Little Clacton Road & Pork Lane

Alan Large advised that physical traffic calming measures are being considered as a result of the review earlier this year. This will be the topic of discussion at a meeting of the East Area Forum in Venture Hall, Lawford (1.30pm for 2pm start) on 2<sup>nd</sup> November 2010.

Alan requested that anyone with anecdotal information relating to accidents, near misses or similar incidents in Little Clacton road should contact him or Mick Page (our County representative), to add weight to the campaign.

Alan confirmed that the inappropriate use of Pork Lane by over-sized vehicles would also be discussed. Malcolm Graham suggested that signs should be erected similar to those used for roads in other parts of the UK, advising that Sat.Nav. advice to use Pork Lane was wrong.



- There will be a public Meeting at Clacton Town Hall on 10<sup>th</sup> November at 7.30pm to
  discuss policing matters. It is being convened by Essex Police Authority in conjunction
  with Tendring Community Safety Partnership. It will be a discussion with Police
  Independent member Linda Belgrove, Essex Police officers and Tendring CSP
  members and Neighbourhood Policing Teams. All are welcome.
- 20 MPH Speed Limit across Frinton, Walton & surrounding area.
   Mayor Robert Bucke advised that it is unlikely that a universal 20MPH would be imposed on the area however consideration was being given to reducing speed limits in specific areas (such as those close to Schools etc.)

#### • Kirby Secure Dementia Unit:

F&WTC require the pavement and streetwork around the bridge and the creation of 2 new bus stops to be completed before the work on site commences (rather than the developer's preference for completing the work before the first resident is admitted). A Green Travel Plan as part of a Unilateral Undertaking is also required to satisfy Essex CC and FAWTC.

#### · Local Plan:

The plan for the next 20 years is currently being reviewed across the area – details have been publicised in the Gazette and can be obtained from F&WTC and TDC.

#### Remembrance Sunday :

The names of those from Great Holland who gave their lives in the two World wars will be read out by John Poulten at a service held at the War Memorial in Rectory Road on 14<sup>th</sup> November. Wreaths will be laid.

The Service will commence at 10.45am and will be followed by a Church service at All Saints, Great Holland.

#### Google:

A template letter will be published in the next Village Voice for anyone who wishes details relating to their property be removed from Google.

Denys Strich gave a summary of the need for securing home PC wireless networks. Anyone requiring advice / assistance should contact Denys.



• No Cold Calling Zone:

A reminder that anyone wishing to introduce a No Cold Calling zone to their street – requires consent from all of the residents of that street. It was proposed that the reverse of a future GHRA Agenda could advertise the opportunity.

#### • Civil Enforcement Officers:

TDC had reported that 4 officers currently dealing with parking matters had been trained and empowered to levy on the spot fines. The intention was that additional officers would be appointed for the area, bringing the number to seven. Duties include addressing, dog fouling, littering and graffiti

#### Tesco at Walton on Naze :

- Mayor Robert Bucke advised that TDC would shortly be considering the application for a Supermarket on the existing Martello Caravan Park and whether to arrange a public consultation.
- o The development would not reduce the number of existing caravan pitches.
- The site is believed to be on Flood Zone 3 land and is likely to be in need of being raised before building could commence.
- The estimated turnover required for such a store would be £300,000 per week (£15.6m per annum). With this income being derived from existing local expenditure, it was the Mayor's opinion that most businesses would be against the development and residents evenly split, as had been seen at Sheringham.
- Tesco are planning a public relations event at the Frinton Triangle.

#### PLANNING and PROPERTY MATTERS

#### 58 Bed Dementia Unit.

The application to vary Condition 9 of the original appeal decision continues to be considered by TDC, FAWTC and ECC. The draft Unilateral Undertaking has gone to the applicants from TDC and appears to contain the relevant information about the transport arrangement and the Green Travel Plan. There are two matters that remain unresolved at the moment. The first is when the work should be done. As I reported in the last issue of Village Voice, the developers want to delay the work until the first occupant moves in. It is the view of GHRA and FAWTC that the work should be done before development commences. We continue to press TDC on this point. The second matter is a technical one. We are pressing to ensure that the Undertaking also contains a provision that Condition 9 can never be implemented. Under no circumstances do we ever want to go back to where we were when the Appeal decision was made and the threat existed of reducing the carriageway under Kirby Bridge and introducing permanent traffic lights.

#### 30 Bed Dementia Unit

An appeal has been lodged to be dealt with by an informal hearing i.e. one which the public may not attend. The details are as follows:

At the time of writing the exact details have not appeared on the Planning Inspectorate web-site. The previous application/appeal for a 35 bed scheme was rejected on appeal on amenity grounds. GHRA oppose this new scheme on the same basis as for the previous scheme and on Highway grounds as well. Please add your voice by contacting the Planning Inspectorate at Bristol.

#### Gypsy and Travellers Sites

The consultant's report referred to in my last letter has still not been seen by Councillors.

#### Land adjoining 2 Tudor Cottages

I believe that the owners have still not been located. We continue to monitor the situation.

#### Traffic in Pork Lane

Since my last letter a lot of residents in Pork Lane have reported the use of that road by inappropriate vehicles. Any photographic evidence would be greatly appreciated, particularly if it could be emailed to Robert Bucke (Cllr.r.bucke@tendringdc.gov.uk).

#### GOOGLE STREET VIEW

Google Street View is an extension of the mapping facility on the internet which enables anybody with internet access (many modern mobile phones have this) to look at an aerial map of Europe and zoom down not just to street names level, but to show the birdbath or bench seat in your back garden. Street View takes it even further and enables anyone to look at your street as though they were 12 foot tall and walking down it, looking all around, left or right and over any garden fence, zooming in where ever you wish. Your property is clearly identifiable to the extent that you can, in many cases, see people through the windows in their houses. You can search using town and street names and even post codes.

The Residents Association has been trying unsuccessfully to remove the houses of Great Holland from Google Maps Street View. Many people consider it is a gross invasion of privacy, others think it is wonderful. Not surprisingly it is now nicknamed the burglars' research tool!

Google claim that they respect people's privacy and will remove houses or blur out identifying images on Street View if specifically requested. They have provided a facility to enable you to inform them of your concerns. If you are happy with what is displayed of your property on Street View do nothing. Otherwise:

- 1. Use Google Street View and find the image of your house / garden etc that you want removed and then
- 2. Click "Report a problem" in the bottom-left of the image window.
- 3. Complete the form and click "Submit".

Google promise to review and remove the offending pictures. For further information see web page <a href="http://maps.google.co.uk/help/maps/streetview/privacy.html">http://maps.google.co.uk/help/maps/streetview/privacy.html</a>. Anyone who is concerned and wants images of their property removed but does not have access to a computer could go along to the local library where free use of a computer and access to the internet is available. Library staff tend to be very helpful especially at quiet times of the day.

## Great Holland Pits Nature Reserve:

#### **CLIMATE**



The mild month of October gave rise to a pleasing show of reds and golds in the trees. Dogwoods were red, maples yellow, while some oaks still retained their green leaves. Now the strong winds of autumn have visited, the temperature has dropped, and the colour of autumn is decaying into shades of brown amongst the vegetation on the ground. The weather changes with the seasons, but does the climate?

I have been following the science since the 1960's. There is no doubt in those years that the hawthorn, which used to be called 'may', has usually flowered in April and other heralds of spring have likewise been earlier than before. Superimposed on this trend has been variations, place to place, year to year, which is always to be expected. Last winter Great Holland was colder and spring was later than we have been accustomed to, but nevertheless it is difficult to deny the general warmer trend. It is also possible that while our own locality has become warmer another may have become cooler. In fact in January 2010 when we were gripped by cold weather, some of the students I teach were returning from North Africa and central Asia with amazing hot winter weather.

To get a clear view on the true picture of climate, clearly measurements have to be taken over extended periods of time over the whole world. For the first time in 1978, it became possible to measure global atmospheric temperature by satellite, and this has indicated rising trends. Similar results have been noted in the oceans. These measurements are questioned by many, but not so much as the temperatures calculated indirectly from evidence of tree rings, and coral growth, which suggest the temperatures earlier in time.

It may be that any changes in climate may be purely unrelated to human activity in any case. Indeed there is evidence of climate swinging from ice ages to warm periods, long before humans had the capacity to affect the trends. There are people who argue that whether or not climate-change is happening, or whether it is caused by human activities, it would be a good thing in any case.

So how would a warming climate affect people in Great Holland, and the nature reserve? Scientific models indicate a range of possibilities, from manageable to drastic. The modest rise of average temperatures of a fraction of a degree we have recorded has coincided with early flowering of hawthorn trees, but anything approaching the two degrees that is the average scientific prediction for this century would be much more challenging for all of us, let alone for animals and plants.

We have already seen the near extinction of the Garden Tiger Moth in southern England along with the Wall Brown butterfly, both of which are doing well and extending their range in the north. We have at the same time become colonized by various new southern species such as the spectacular Wasp Spider, which was recorded for the first time this year at Great Holland.

The science has become more convincing over the last few years, though it is always developing, and much of the press has made muddled attacks on it. I would choose the view of science over vested interests?

#### GT. HOLLAND SCHOOL

According to the "Essex County Standard" on Thursday, 11<sup>th</sup> September 1862, the "New Village School was formally opened in the presence of a large number of the Clergy & laity of the neighbourhood"; so the Village was full of visitors.

The school was situated on part of the Glebe in Rectory Road, opposite the War Memorial. It was a Public Elementary School for boys and girls. The school had 2 classrooms and a barn at the rear in which to store school equipment. The building was enlarged in 1900 to accommodate 120 children, but had an average attendance of 70. Considering the population of Gt. Holland in 1901 was 413 that was quite a high percentage of children. The master was Frederick Cottrell.

During W.W.11 the school was badly damaged by a bomb; after which a makeshift classroom was improvised at 11 Manor Road un til the end of the War when the children were transferred to Kirby School.

The school was left abandoned and in ruins until 26th July 1954 when it was demolished.

1<sup>st</sup> Gt. Holland Guides for a time was held in the School and organised by the schoolmistress, Miss Grandjean, who was the Captain of the Guides. The accompanying photo shows the girls who were Guides in 1940. As World War 11 was on they could not go camping but still worked towards obtaining various badges such as Homecraft, etc.

#### Is your purse safe?

#### What are the benefits?

The chance to increase road safety; cut fatalities; increase road safety awareness by and for all road users; enhance the role of community members as volunteers; raise awareness of anti-social road use and increase Essex Police links with the wider community.

#### Resources

- A minimum of 6 unpaid volunteers with a commitment to monitor for a minimum of one hour a week.
- Volunteers to be 18 years of age or over with no upper age limit.
- Monitoring may take place during daylight hours subject to risk assessments at each location.
- Training session to be provided free by Essex Police.

#### AOTEAROA



We set off for "the land of the long white cloud", New Zealand, in February 2009 to see for ourselves this paradise that so many people, including our globe-trotting gap year children, had enthused over. For several years we had been planning to go and had set aside almost seven weeks for our stay.

Arriving in Auckland via Bangkok and Sydney we were slightly ahead of a couple of our bags which turned up the next day having been loaded onto a different flight from Sydney! We had been warned to ensure that our footwear, especially walking boots, were clean because the NZ authorities

are much concerned with keeping harmful pathogens out. Although scrupulously clean, (we thought), our boots were nevertheless taken away and returned to us after "proper" treatment!

We then bussed from the airport through the very busy city to our hotel which we had booked for three days. This was the only accommodation that we had pre booked from home and, for the rest of our time we merely arranged accommodation one day ahead. On only one occasion did we have difficulty finding somewhere to stay and this was principally due to our visit to the town of Napier coinciding with the popular Art Deco festival and our arriving on spec.

Throughout our visit we stayed in youth hostels, (where youths were in a minority), Backpackers, motels and hotels. The accommodation was always adequate and mostly very good and we catered for ourselves most of the time. Whilst we did not live off them, New Zealand fish and chips are thoroughly recommended being excellent in both quality and value!

Most towns have an information centre, referred to as the i-Site, where staff are very helpful and will phone and book accommodation for you. In the hostels and Backpackers we met many people of a similar age to ourselves, and of different nationalities, making our time far more interesting than had we stayed in hotels or motels the entire time. We joined the Scottish YHA before leaving home as the subscription is less than the English YHA but the benefits are the same! And Youth Hostels have a range of accommodation including en suite rooms so, the single sex dormitory days are over! Kitchens are communal but a good venue for meeting people and learning from their experiences.

Car hire was booked in UK and the details sorted by e-mail with the hire company in NZ. We were careful to ensure that our hire agreement covered us for travelling on the gravel roads that are common off the main routes. Without this we would have missed some extremely interesting drives. Driving is a pleasure with very little traffic outside the principal cities but journeys should be considered in time rather than miles due to the twisting nature of most of the roads. Road maps often show tables of distances with journey times. The main hire companies do not allow their vehicles to be ferried across the Cook Strait between North and South Islands but require you to leave your car at the ferry and pick up another the other side.

We had worked out a rough itinerary before arriving; taking in the places that we thought we might like to visit and the things we thought we might like to do. This was based on what we had been told by family and friends and what we had read. The Lonely Planet Guide is well worth studying for anyone planning a visit. Our "tour" included both North and South islands taking in

many of the popular tourist destinations and some walks and wildlife experiences that particularly appealed to us. There are always plenty of folk who have, "been there and done that", and are pleased to make recommendations.

Altogether we drove some 5,000 miles but the travelling was not tiring and was an enjoyable part of our adventure. The scenery everywhere is magnificent and there are countless attractions along the way. We particularly enjoyed many short trails that are so well signed and maintained and in many instances lead to something of interest, a waterfall for example, or simply provide a close encounter with the amazing flora of the country.


Friends had warned us of two drawbacks that detract from this otherwise perfect land, the Sandfly and the Kea. The first is a biting insect, akin to the Scottish midge, and possessing the same ability to drive grown men mad! The antidote is expensive insect repellent, a tube of which we bought in NZ but never used! On only one occasion were we mildly inconvenienced by these creatures. However that they constitute a real nuisance is witnessed by the fact that workers on the Manipouri hydro scheme were paid an extra \$2 per shift for having to "cope with sandflies and humidity".

The Kea is a large wild bird, a member of the parrot family, which has a very inquisitive and apparently, destructive nature, and a huge sharp and powerful beak. It delights in dismantling the cars of tourists and is particularly adept at pulling the rubbers from windscreens! We were very concerned that our car might fall victim to this bird but in fact only encountered them once, at Arthur's Pass, where four of them, on a roof, were engaged in a



raucous exchange with a group of children, the latter goading the birds into a highly charged and excited state. But we saw no "Kealised" vehicles and understand that the authorities have discouraged tourists from feeding the birds thus enticing them back to their natural haunts rather than hanging around car parks.

The talk of paradise was not unreasonable, depending on one's definition of course! We loved the



space – about 5million people in a country approximately the size of the UK, and the natural beauty. The range from rain forest to high mountains and glaciers was amazing. Active volcanic areas, thermal springs, the Southern Alps and Fiordland, where the annual rainfall exceeds 5 metres, the Maori history and culture, the fantastic museums the wildlife and the Kauri trees; so much of interest. Not forgetting the place with the longest name in the world! Where no one seemed to live!

We particularly enjoyed the wonderful walks and an overnight cruise on Doubtful Sound, but it is hard to point to any one thing that makes New Zealand such an attractive destination. The Country is indeed beautiful and our seven weeks was not really long enough to fully take it in.

What a pity it is so far away!
