



OMEGONING

Plain Chocolate Truffles

Ingredients

225g Plain Chocolate, broken into chocolate button-sized pieces 175ml double or whipping cream Icing sugar, cocoa powder Icing sugar for dusting



- Put chocolate in a large mixing bowl. In a small saucepan, bring the cream to a rolling boil and immediately pour over the broken chocolate. Blend thoroughly until all the chocolate is melted.
- Allow the mixture, to cool, uncovered, completely for 1-1½ hours at room temperature until it
 is set. Cover a large, heavy chopping board or a baking tray tightly and completely with
 Clingfilm or waxed paper to place the truffles on to set.
- When mixture has set, use a teaspoon to spoon out bite-sized pieces. Dust hands lightly with icing sugar to prevent them sticking and roll the pieces into balls in the palms of your hands.
- Immediately roll the truffles in sifted cocoa powder or icing sugar and place on the prepared tray to set.

The truffles can be kept, covered in an airtight container in the fridge, for at least a week. Sprinkle them with a little extra cocoa powder from a sieve/tea strainer at the last minute if they need freshening up.

You can vary the truffles by adding numerous other flavourings of your choice. For alcoholic truffles, add 75ml rum, brandy, (or any other alcohol you fancy) or how about a little orange juice? Add to the chocolate before allowing to cool and set. **ENJOY!!!!!**




REMINDER!





Great Holland Residents' Association Annual General Meeting

John Poulten welcomed everyone and apologised for any confusion in start time, as the latest edition of the Village Voice had published a start time an hour earlier than the scheduled (& previously advertised) time of 11.30am.

Item 1 - Apologies for absence

Karen Withams, Judith & Brian Little, Sandra Mooney, Don Marven, Malcolm Graham, Sylvia Nicoll, Robert Bucke, Chris Keston, Charmian Goundry.

Item 2 - Minutes from the AGM (May 28th 2011), were approved.

Item 3 - Matters arising from the last meeting:

- An update had already been provided by John Poulten in the latest edition of Village Voice (published this week)
- · No one had any related questions to ask.

Item 4 - PCSO report:

Sgt Pete Gerrard provided a summary of activity since 1st June (to date): -

- Only 4 items in total, which he commented went to prove what a safe and pleasant place Great Holland was to live.
- 2 of the 4 items were of a domestic nature.
- Another related to a motor theft, where a wheel arch of a vehicle was stolen.

Cold Calling:

- Sgt Gerrard reminded residents to be firm with unwanted Cold Calls, adding that residents always have the option of simply closing the door should a caller / sales person persist.
- The best mantra is that "If it's too good to be true, it probably is! "
- Anything suspicious should be reported to the PCSO on 07850 631017 or if urgent, dial 999
- John Poulten advised the Group that through the efforts of Angela Graham and her daughter, Church Lane has applied to ECC to become a No Cold Calling 'zone'. This requires unanimous agreement of residents before an application can be made.

Speeding:

• Sgt Gerrard is in the process of reviewing proposed locations for Community Speed Watch—to ensure they are safe. He advised that whilst Little Clacton Road was not safe enough to allow officers to mount a speed trap (due to the need to stop vehicles), it was likely that the watch and observe nature of Community Speed Watch would be permissible.

Police Resources:

Sgt Gerrard advised that a number of resources had been stretched / re-deployed to support
Policing of the London riots and more recently to Crays Hill in Basildon.
He also advised that due to the need to reduce cost, Walton Police Station would no longer
be open to the public. It would, however, remain a base for Police and PCSO patrols.

Item 5 - Treasurers report

- Denys advised that the Village Design Statement /Parish Plan group had voted to donate the unspent budget of £516.38 to the GHRA.
- Thanks were given to the VDS / PP Group for producing not only a first class document, but for delivering it under budget.
- Funds held by the Association total £2,681.06

Item 6 - Planning

58 Bed Dementia home:

- The work undertaken to date is classified as Exploratory works (including the laying of a hard standing).
- In line with planning permission, certain road works must be completed before construction starts on site.

Local Listing / Local Development Framework:

TDC has put this on the back-burner, pending clarification of policy from central government.

Item 10 - AOB

Kirby Residents Association:

John advised that the Chairman of the Kirby Residents Association had contacted him
asking whether GHRA would support them in their campaign to retain the footpath if /when
the sea wall is breached.

The meeting voted in favour of support – with a point made that Footpaths should be preserved wherever possible.

Village Hall: Cleaning. October 29th (from 10am)

- The meeting was reminded that the annual Village Hall clean-up would be taking place on October 29th
- It is a community supported Wash & Brush up for the hall. Even an hour would be appreciated and excellent refreshments will be made available (free of charge).

Hedge Trimming:

- John advised that through Robert Bucke's hard work the hedges bordering footpaths in Main Road had been trimmed. Whilst this is felt to be the responsibility of ECC, the work was undertaken by TDC.
- Robert is in the process of confirming who is responsible for the work making request / escalation simpler next year.
- A resident made the point that whilst appreciated, TDC rarely clear away cuttings from work completed (whether it is hedge or grass cuttings.)
- Robert has also arranged for the lay-by in Holland Marshes to be cleared of rubbish / fly-tipping.
- If any resident spots a fly-tipper at weekends they are encouraged to contact the Police should they witness fly-tipping. The police can then contact TDC / ECC as appropriate

New GHRA Chairman & Secretary required:

- John advised the meeting that neither he nor Paul Withams would be standing for re-election in May 2012.
- Residents were requested to offer their services in readiness for the transition lest the GHRA be left in a period of interregnum.

Christmas Social:

After last year's successful Christmas function at the Fruit Farm, a volunteer has yet to step forward to organise this year's event. Volunteers should contact John Poulten.

Diamond Jubilee:

Despite requests for volunteers, no one has stepped forward to organise events or (in the case of 'interest groups' using the Village Hall) respond to John Poulten's letters of invitation.

- The only exception to this was Sue Jenkins, who volunteered to align an intended Village Hall fund raising quiz to coincide with the Jubilee.
- John Poulten observed that the 1953 Queen's Coronation Booklet he had been leant by Mr J Wright, (price 6d) featured events lasting an entire week and in Great Holland included bonfires, fireworks and Coronation Day Sports events on the Rectory green.
- John added that unless volunteers came forward soon (and with the lead times required to organise such events), the occasion would pass un-marked by the Village.

LETTER TO GREAT HOLLAND RESIDENTS December 2011

Dear Neighbour,



WINTER

At the time of writing it is and has been unseasonably mild. However everyone expects a hard winter. The red berries are in profusion on the trees and Doctor's surgeries were full of flu vaccines early this season. Make of that what you will. Whatever weather we have, on behalf of the residents Association, I wish everyone in the Village a very Happy Christmas and a thoroughly good New Year.

PLANNING and PROPERTY MATTERS

58 Bed Dementia Unit.

Development has officially commenced on site under the terms of the new planning permission. That means the old "traffic light" condition under the Appeal Decision can never be revived.

Lanpro, the owners' planning agents have been canvassing local opinion as the owners want to increase the density of the site to 74 beds from 58. But reducing the number of close care units from 15 to 10. It is a net increase of 11. F&WTC are opposed to it. It remains to be seen what TDC say.

30 Bed Dementia Unit

I have no more information at present.

Possible New Houses in Tendring

Further to my circular letter of 17th October a lot of residents wrote to TDC objecting to the proposals in general and to the 4 sites suggested for Gt. Holland. The Committee wrote to TDC objecting the principle of a 15 year development plan in the manner suggested by the Council. We also objected to all 4 sites on policy grounds and to individual sites on specific grounds. This saga will rumble on for at least another two years before a final position emerges, if at all.

POLICE

When the GHRA last met Sgt. Pete Gerrard said, in all good faith, that the Station at Walton would remain open, if not to the public, then for the PCSO Team. By the time he spoke to residents of Frinton, the word had come down that the station would be closed and the PCSO Team would be based at Thorpe.

Shortly after that it was said that the PCSO Team would be located in Harwich. CHRISTMAS IN GT. HOLLAND ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO


An article from Clacton Graphic (30/12/1911) reporting on the village Christmas party.

ENTERTAINMENT - On Thursday evening, the old people of the parish were entertained to a very substantial tea and entertainment at the Village Hall, which had been provided from the proceeds of recent successful entertainments, organised by Mrs. Overton, Mr. & Mrs. Barton, and Mrs. Lott, and a very enjoyable time was spent. The Hall was very prettily decorated with holly, evergreens, flags and bunting, and the tables were heavily laden with good things which had been bountifully supplied. Mrs Hodgkins, of Woodcot, kindly gave a donation to the fund. Mr. Crampin also gave the fruit, and Miss Barron supplied milk, besides giving a donation. The old people, who were unable to walk, were conveyed to and from the Hall. After the tables had been cleared, and the room re-arranged, a musical programme was provided, consisting of songs, recitations etc. A special item of the programme was a children's play, entitled "Tommy Stout and Curly locks", which was very cleverly enacted in two scenes by Lily and Elsie Overton and Coy Overton, Lily, Bertha, and Harry Crampin, Mabel Walton, Connie Fairbrother, Amy Marshall, and F. Barton. Several tableaux were also presented. A sketch entitled "Old Maids' Matches" created much amusement, the characters being well brought up as follows:- Mr. Lott as "Jeremiah Pefkins", Mrs. Overton (the servant), Mrs. Barton, Miss Crampin and Miss Eade (old maids), Miss Long (Dudley), Miss Ransome (Dora), Mr. Barton (police constable), and Mr. Morris (detective). Songs were contributed by Mrs. Barton, Miss Lily Crampin, Miss Stowe, Miss Ransome, and others. Recitations were given by Mr. Lott, Miss Long, Miss Lott, and a dialogue by Misses Lily and Elsie Overton. Miss Stowe ably presided at the piano. A hearty vote of thanks to all those who had contributed to the programme were recorded and the singing of the National Anthem brought a very enjoyable evening to a close.

APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

No apologies for absence were received.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING:-

The Minutes of the previous meeting held on 23rd July 2011 were approved and signed.

MATTERS ARISING

There were no matters arising from the minutes.

THE CUPOLA

A letter had been received from the Insurance company who stated that we were not covered for any damage to the outside of the hall, i.e. Cupola. They have confirmed that they will pay for any damage caused to the inside of the hall, i.e. ceiling damage.

Much discussion was had around the Cupola and the possible options open to the committee at this time.

Below are two quotes which had been forwarded to the committee, following on from the invitation in Village Voice:-

1) 'It is to be regretted that the village hall, donated and subscribed for nearly a hundred years ago, is in danger of being altered from its original design.

In institutions like this I always consider that the generations that come after should make it a paramount aim to retain this class of building as they were intended to be.' (Jamie WRIGHT)

- 2) My comments related to the incremental costs or re-instating the original design (it being a land mark and all that} though I do realise it would be a significant project in its own right. I guess the options are:
- A} Remove the cupola 'stub' and patch (tile) over the remaining hole
- B] Make good the existing stub
- C] Make good the stub and re-instate the cupola

Clearly each option has merit (financially and economically) but it would be useful to see the costs and associated pros and cons of each

I know there have been previous comments about money being better spent on other areas of the hall, however I do wonder whether it would be worth putting together a full 'Programme' of works (together with associated budget). That way you could launch a fund raising campaign (similar to the church tower campaign) and have cash to cover a variety of hall projects. (Paul WITHAMS)

Therefore it was agreed that the committee would move the matter forward as follows:

Obtain two quotes at least for each of the below options:-

- A] Repair the cupola
- B] Remove the cupola and repair the roof
- C] Restore the cupola to its original state

We are also to see two quotes for the Insurance company about getting the repair done to the ceiling as it has been water marked by the damage that the leaking Cupola caused earlier this year.

As it is the wish of the committee to have the whole ceiling repainted (possibly covered by the insurance), as the committee felt the Hall could do with a lick of paint, people asked to supply a quote for this work to place a separate one for painting the hall, this would have to be paid for by the VH funds.

Tom SANDY whilst at the VH clean went up into the loft area of the hall and was pleasantly surprised at how sound it was inside (layman's view) the loft area; Tom has kindly agreed to take over the role of liaising with the builders/roofers from John Knight.

TREASURERS REPORT

Shelia WATTS (taken over as treasurer) gave us her report which shows a credit balance of £13,539.74 as at 4^{th} November 2011.

Tim Reynolds who is an independent adviser to the committee requested that to retain his impartiality, Tim requested he was voted off the committee, with thanks for his support this was done. Tim wished still to attend the meetings but as stated above purely as an advisor.

CHARITIES COMMISSION

This report has been submitted by Tim Reynolds who advised us that the password for its submission is Y8F1BU9F.

HIRE AGREEMENT

A new hire agreement was proposed and copies were given to each member attending. Tim Reynolds was to research the various authorities we hold to cover the hall's uses. We are to discuss its implementation at the next meeting.

REQUEST FOR SIGN AT REAR OF THE HALL

It has been alleged that items were thrown at the horses in the field behind the hall. We have been asked to erect a sign to try to stop this practice. However we did not think that this was our responsibility but we have spoken to one of our users in this connection.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

A punch bag has fallen down/ been knocked down in the hall but we do not propose replacing it.

A discussion took place on the hiring fee and methods of payment. It was decided that, in future, all hirers will pay at least on a monthly basis. A discussion was had about raising the fees to £10.00 in 2012 (for non village users). This is to be discussed further in the next meeting.


Many thanks to everyone made cleaning an enjoyable task.

Great Holland Pits Nature Reserve:

A season of mists and mellow fruitfulness



The autumn leaves this year have been colourful. The trees along the upper end of the Holland Mill plantation have been particularly striking with the shining yellows of the maples and vivid reds of the wild cherry, which contrast the still deep green canopies of the larger oaks. The dogwoods, while bearing deep red leaves a few weeks ago have largely shed their leaves, the thin stems remaining their characteristic red.

Cold autumn nights make trees stop producing the green chlorophyll which normally dominates the other pigments in the leaves, causing the vivid colours to appear before the leaves are shed altogether.

The year has so far brought us a very dry spring, which advanced the season for many animals and plants, followed by a cool damp mid summer and then a very warm and dry autumn. As I write my heating has only spluttered into life for the odd hour or so, and it looks as though my bonfire for once will be dry, not its usual soggy mass.


The forage harvester has cut the rougher grass and scrub at Holland Pits, while the Shetland sheep have munched their way through the autumn pasture on our heath and meadow, and have now returned to the marshes of Tollesbury Wick.

Several tree species have set very large quantities of fruit. Fruiting of acorns has been prolific, despite the large number of spangle and oak-apple galls. These are small growths each caused by the larvae of different parasitic wasps. These insects neither threaten us with stings nor indeed cause much of a problem to the oak trees. Other trees with prolific fruit this year include the hawthorn and maple. Hopefully these will attract some of our thrushes. Numbers of blackbirds, redwings and starlings, have already joined us from Scandinavia and they will be interested in the berries.

The Elder is an unusual tree, which in some years carries leaves through most of the winter, but can frequently lose nearly all of them in the summer if there is a drought. It can therefore almost be regarded as a reverse deciduous tree.

One of the last flowering plants of the year, the Ivy is currently attracting a few Red Admiral butterflies, while a few Speckled Woods are still flying. There are still a number of little Ginger coloured moths called Vapourers whizzing around the tops of the trees seldom stopping long enough for anyone to steal a close look.

We have suffered severe problems with fly tipping and noise in the car park, but work is underway to close the night time access. More details will follow.

This proved deeply unattractive in appearance, but fascinating in the buzz of activity along the river with traders selling everything, including hundreds of stalls selling goldfish in tiny bags. Apparently much of the worlds' aquarium fish originate here.

Several days later, and many miles further south, was the much anticipated port of Rio de Janeiro, and sailing into this lovely port flanked by twin mountains, as the sun rose was truly memorable. We headed first to the beaches of Ipenema and CopaCabana,

where all human life was laid bare. Quite literally, as beaches were solid with local folk getting darker and darker in the fierce sun, in the briefest of costumes and enjoying their weekend picnics. Exotic hotels and apartments lined the beaches, but several blocks behind were the *favellas* housing the less fortunate in depressing tenements. Very much no-go areas for tourists

Back in the air conditioned comfort of the ship we planned our evening which was normally drinks and dinner, in one of the splendid dining rooms, followed by a visit to the theatre, and then some dancing in one of the many lounges. And some late night disco for the more energetic!

The next few days at sea were pleasant, but getting hotter, as we arrived at the River Plate and **Montevideo** in Uruguay. The city exhibited all the faded elegance of colonial occupation, but charming nevertheless, with more recent history in evidence from the last war when the German battleship Graf Spee was trapped and sunk there, leaving sad relicts of guns and anchors on the shore.

Another 100 miles up the River Plate we docked at the fabulous city of **Buenos Aires.** We swiftly docked and travelled into the centre intent on finding our first glimpse of the exotic Argentinian tango.

Much as we searched it eluded us, so we




Graf Spee Anchor

contented ourselves with a walk through the wide, elegant boulevards to the city's cemetery and the tomb of Evita, who is still idolised some 40 years after her death. Our persistence was rewarded later when the local tango school gave a special performance on board in the theatre.

We had 2 days in this vibrant city before we set sail again heading south to colder climes, and the islands the Argentines call the Malvinas, and we call **Falklands**.

Two days later, and 10 degrees cooler, we arrived in **Port Stanley** to an enthusiastic greeting from the locals. They are more British than the British, and are still so grateful for our intervention in their invasion, as witnessed by the many memorials to the British dead. They had planted a lovely wood, overlooking the harbour, with a tree for everyone of the fallen, with his name inscribed upon it. The 2000 passengers on our ship totally overwhelmed the little island, and the town's only pub ran out of beer in the first 2 hours!



We reluctantly left the port (in tenders as the port could not dock such a large vessel) and reboarded for the long and chilly trip south, and around **Cape Horn**, at the southernmost tip of South America. We were expecting high winds and raging seas, but in the event it was a lovely day and we rounded the Horn in some comfort, as we gazed at the bleak promontory which had witnessed such drama and wrecks in the past.

The next day saw us in **Ushuaia**, a real frontier town of fishing folk and corrugated iron roofed houses. Here you get the first glimpse of the fabulous high Andes, whose snow topped peaks dominate the landscape.

Fleets of ships from here service the outposts in Antarctica, not far to the south, which underlines the remoteness of the area. Many of the young Argentineans on the Belgrano, and others who perished in forcing their claim to the Malvinas, came from this area, and their sad and neglected monument in the town centre was a marked contrast to those we witnessed in Port Stanley.

The next day, after an overnight sail, saw us in **Punta Arenas**, our first port in **Chile** and gateway to the remote and lovely areas of **Patagonia**. This charming, and remote town has a long history of British migration and the Victorian cemetery bears many familiar names. From here we were to explore the fjords and glaciers of southern Chile, and our vessel navigating the Magellan straits came to the **Amalia Glacier**. This immense ice structure, surrounded by floating pack ice was breathtaking, glistening in the morning sun. The captain steered the vessel close up to the ice mountain whilst cameras clicked, then steered us away for the next glacier **Brujo**, which was equally impressive. We sailed through the scenic fjords for several days, in the shadow of the snow capped Andes, accompanied by condors and eagles, and came to the last glacier **PioXI**, before leaving this lovely and remote area for **Puerto Montt** further up the coast of Chile. This tiny settlement, with wood buildings and corrugated iron roofs, is a main stopping off point for overland journeys into the wonderful mountain area of Chile, and boasts a fascinating wooden cathedral.

Back on board we pass the time in the well equipped gym, or reading in the library, and Jean has time to take part in the daily line dancing classes, whilst we head north to **Valparaiso**. This large, sprawling city on the coast is the stepping off point for the capital **Santiago**. Very Spanish in character, as are many of the South American cities, with wide avenues and impressive architecture, but having seen better times.

From here we left South America behind and turned west over the broad Pacific, sailing for 5 days before sight of land. Our floating hotel had all the facilities needed to keep passengers occupied, from deck quoits, net golf, gymnasium, 5 swimming pools, during the day, and theatre, dancing and casino for the night owls. And of course an endless supply of food, which was available 24 hours a day should you want it!
