### To our readers ...

February, in many ways, seems a dull month. Christmas festivities were a long time ago. New Year resolutions have been made and broken. Winter still stretches ahead, on and on. Evenings are dark, days are cold. But there are some bright moments. On 2<sup>nd</sup> February we celebrate the Presentation of Christ in the Temple - 40 days after his birth - Candlemas, when Simeon proclaimed Christ as "A light to lighten the Gentiles", a statement which brings us much joy.

On 14<sup>th</sup> February we celebrate Valentine's Day. Oh for those days when we were young. Should we send a card? Will we receive a card? Usually not, so it will always mean gladness to some and perhaps a touch of sadness to others. This year, however, when we think of young lovers, we look forward to a Royal Wedding when the Queen's grandson William marries his long-term girlfriend Kate. So, more brightness to come!


When we were on holiday last year I had the most delicious cheese soup- and although the rest of the family weren't too keen to try it they all agreed how good it was! I do not claim this soup is quite so amazing but it is now a family favourite.

### Cauliflower Cheese Soup

#### Ingredients

2 carrots
2 medium onions
2 cloves of garlic
8oz/200g strong cheddar
tsp English mustard
salt & pepper

2 sticks of celery 1 large cauliflower splash olive oil 2 vegetable stock cubes nutmeg



Crispy fried bacon as a garnish


#### Method

- Peel and roughly chop vegetables
- Put into a large pan on a medium heat
- Add a good splash of olive oil
- · Add all the vegetables and mix well
- · Cook for 10 minutes until carrots are softened
- Grate cheddar into a bowl
- Add stock cubes to 2 pints/1.8 litres of boiling water
- Add to the vegetables
- Stir well & simmer for another 10 minutes
- Add cheese and mustard
- Liquidise soup until silky smooth
- Add a little grated nutmeg
- Put back on heat to reboil

We like it with crispy bacon served on top!

### From your Methodist Minister - Rev. Ray King ...

We have had some really cold times this winter and my thoughts right now turn to skiing. It is not that I expect the Tendring area to become a winter sports resort, though some do say we might be heading for another mini ice age. However, I read a paragraph someone wrote about the new popular sport of snowboarding. A snowboard is like a skateboard without wheels, which apparently skims smoothly over snow and ice.

This short passage, being spread around the internet, begins:

The kingdom of heaven is like the brave snowboarder who enters through the narrow opening in the trees. He finds many fresh turns there, and blessings of all kinds.

It has been shown that many, many sayings come from the Authorised Version of the Bible, and the Kingdom of Heaven is like... is familiar to most of us.

The writer, of course, is saying that for him the sport of snowboarding is, with all its thrills, like heaven on earth. But perhaps Christians can take from this picture the thought that living in this world as true Christians, living as if we are in the kingdom of God on this earth, is like the thrill of the winter sportsman, with great satisfaction gained from serving Christ in the world in which we live. And like all things in Christ there is a narrow opening between the trees, reminding us of the narrow opening Jesus talked of like the eye of a needle, so hard to enter if our concerns are for the riches of this world.

She was one of the youngest swimmers in the country to complete the 1.5km challenge, after which she then swam an extra four lengths of Clacton Pool to complete a mile. It took her only 75 minutes to complete her marathon swim.

#### **CHRISTMAS**


Christmas now seems a long time ago. Hopefully we have seen the last of the snow and that Spring will soon be here.

#### SOCIAL

The report suggests that these sites are unlikely to be taken up.

I believe that the owners have still not been located. We continue to monitor the situation.

#### MEMBERSHIP



#### FROM YOUR LOCAL HISTORY RECORDER



#### Great Holland Mill Dated back to 1820

According to a local farmer of the time - Charles Hicks (1778-1865) – on Tuesday, 27 December 1836 there had been a hurricane. A Russian ship had run ashore at Little Holland. A barge from Harwich had gone to her rescue ... "with the intention of taking in part of her cargo [and] was, as the weather was boisterous, knocked to pieces on the beach. The barge was broken up and Mr. Beckworth bought it and with it made a fence round his garden at Great Holland Mill."

According to Kelly's Directory in 1908 the miller was Mrs Harriet Pyke, of both steam and windmills.

By 1937 it was owned by Mr. Smith & Son, who produced animal and poultry food such as middlen meal, and kos-lach

for goats. There were four employees; the deliveryman delivered the products in a long wheel base Morris Leader which was painted yellow with red letters. The miller and his mate worked the Mill. Although the Mill stood in all its glory, the sails were unsafe and therefore locked into position. Instead it was worked by a donkey engine based on the ground floor, with working belts on the parts that had been previously driven by the sails. Work started at 7 a.m. – the miller at his grinding stones; the deliveryman checking and loading his orders, to deliver within a 25 mile radius.

Disaster struck on Christmas Eve 1985 at about 1 a.m. Mr Brian Smith was awoken to the sight of flames roaring through the storage buildings. Things were well alight and eventually the stump of the windmill was destroyed.

### Apologies from The Fat Goose for New Year's Eve 2010



Well what can we say except sorry, for the disruption caused on New Year's Eve to the village of Tendring and to everyone who had their plans to celebrate New Year with us ruined.

The problem came to light at about 5.30p.m., when it became obvious that we had no gas supply to the kitchens. Investigations revealed that our LPG tank was venting gas into the air through a valve.

The fire brigade were called who then notified the police. An exclusion zone of 1000 metres was put in place and the restaurant and surrounding area was evacuated and the roads closed. We did our best to notify and inform our guests of the situation as it unfolded but it became increasingly obvious that a decision had to be made to enable everyone to make some kind of alternative plans, as we had no idea how long the emergency restrictions would remain in place. So at 8.45p.m we cancelled our gourmet dinner and dance.

Chemical and LPG specialists revealed later that the tank had been wrenched open by vandals which resulted in the gas escape which caused the problems. The tank was made safe and secured just after 9.00p.m., but we were left with very little gas remaining in the tank. This was a very disappointing event following on from a December which had been disrupted due to a prolonged period of extremely bad weather.

However we now look forward to the New Year and trust that you will all have a happy and peaceful 2011.

The police are treating this incident as a criminal case and investigations continue.





#### NEWS .....

Due to unforeseen circumstances advice regarding local incidents is not available for publication in this edition, but the following information regarding the digital rollout in our area may prove of interest.

The following information has been provided by Paul Teague in his role as Neighbourhood Watch Administrator.

### Television is changing very soon!!

So what is changing with TV? Well from July this year in our region the old analogue television transmitters will be turned off and so unless you have a digital TV or a Freeview digital box connected to your television you will not get a television picture if you live in the Anglia region (London region in 2012). The switchover will be carried out for the government by a company called Digital UK.

- When ?- Parts of Suffolk and Essex from 6<sup>th</sup> July 20<sup>th</sup> July 2011, Cambridge, Northamptonshire and Bedfordshire 30<sup>th</sup> March 13<sup>th</sup> April 2011. At this time you will need to retune digital TV's and digital boxes to ensure you receive the full range of channels available.
- Do I need a new TV? No, almost any TV with a Scart or aerial socket can be converted, just needs a digital box with right connections for that set, or if it's a fairly modern set it may already be digital.
- <u>Do I need a new aerial?</u> No, if you get a good reception now then there is no reason why you should not remain getting a good signal after the switch over, indeed as the transmission strength will be stronger after switchover it should improve.
- Will my video or DVD still work? It will only record what you are watching via the TV's digital connection, so you cannot watch one channel and record another. A digital TV recorder will allow you to watch one channel while recording another and could convert your TV to digital as well.
- What about my radio? It does not affect radios.
- Some average prices Rooftop aerial between £60 and £180, Additional aerial sockets around the house around £45, Indoor aerial from £10. \*Prices supplied by Digital UK.
- Need more info or help Call 08456 50 50 50 or visit http://www.digitaluk.co.uk/

So why is a Crime Reduction Advisor telling you all the details about this? Well at times of confusion you may get some unsavoury individuals who may try to take advantage of people either; a) rouge traders trying to sell perhaps something that is not needed at an exorbitant price or; b) bogus caller telling a tale so they can get in the house and steal. Giving you the correct information prepares you to recognise something that may not be right. You may well have understood what is going on but perhaps an elderly or less able relative, client or friend may not so be aware and available to guide the less able in the right direction.

The Switchover Help Scheme has been set up to support the most vulnerable during the process.

The Help Scheme will convert one television to digital, check and replace the aerial if necessary, and offers a year's after care for a one-off cost of £40 (or free if you are in receipt of certain benefits). Eligibility criteria are:-

- aged 75; or
- get or could get Disability Living Allowance, Attendance Allowance, Constant Attendance Allowance or mobility supplement: or
- · have lived in a care home for six months or more: or
- are registered blind or partially sighted.


Eligible individuals will be written to direct well in advance of their region switching over to digital.

No-one from Digital UK or the Switchover Help Scheme will come to your house unless you have contacted them and asked for help. If you contact the Help Scheme and arrange an appointment you can use a password facility to recognise the installer when they call, and you of course you can arrange for a friend or family member to be there at the appointment time. All Help Scheme workers have ID badges and a recognisable uniform – if in doubt keep them out and call Help Scheme on 0800 40 85 900

#### SHOEBOXES UPDATE

Barbara and Iain (Rosery Mews) have now sent over 1900 shoeboxes to the troops in Afghanistan. The boxes are addressed to specific individuals and as a result they receive many letters and emails in return. The following is a text received from one such serviceman .....

"Hello again,

I apologise for the delay in writing to you, this month has been an especially busy one for the Battalion. I allowed my one assistant to return home for Christmas and the New Year. She is Fijian (her sister is visiting her this year) and a very good Christian – so I thought it would be nice to send her back home to her family in Wattisham.

You may or may not be aware that the vehicles this Battalion keep running are called 'Protective Mobility'. These vehicles are heavily armoured to provide a great deal of protection against one of the main threats – Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs). They have already saved the lives of many of our servicemen and women and will continue to do so.

There are various types of vehicles within the fleet, varying from what look basically like heavily armoured trucks to specialist troop carrying vehicles. The Battalion are working hard both night and day to keep them on the road throughout the whole of Helmand that is under the command of British Forces. The unit also repairs rifles and weapon systems.

We had an extremely busy Christmas but had a few hours off during the lunch time to celebrate. The Armed Forces have tried to make a great deal about Christmas, with decorations, turkey and brussel sprouts, but it is never the same as being back home.

I understand that currently the weather in the UK is very unpleasant with lots of snow and ice and very low temperatures. We have had no rain since we arrived in late-September, but the temperature is about 10 Celsius during the day, going down to about -3 at night.

Thank you for all of your efforts – all your hard work is greatly appreciated and it makes us all feel proud to be serving. Your parcels are sent from Bastion to the Forward Operating Bases and Patrol Bases, where the conditions are a great deal less comfortable than they are here.

Please can you extend our thanks to all of those who are donating gifts to our servicemen and women."

# **Great Holland Pits Nature Reserve:**



### **Bonfires**

Winter coppicing and scrub clearance is well underway. Each year we cut down a considerable amount of wood, some of which is used and some is tucked away to provide habitat piles, which shelter a range of creepy-crawlies. There are in places however, no suitable spots to stack the brash so we need to burn it. When a fire is established any number of volunteers can feed it, and it is not critical about whether the fuel is damp or not, or whether branches are reduced to a shorter length or not. The problematic part of constructing a bonfire is in its early stages. I have never attempted to light fires by rubbing sticks together, nor by using such natural tinder as the outer skin of birch bark, there is no need to when matches and newspaper are available.


As Holland Pits volunteers will agree there is usually a time of frustration for the first hour or so of a fire. Here are some suggestions which I sometimes overlook and go on to regret:

- Choose a flat and if possible dry place to start. While I have built a fire on a platform of logs
  over a frozen pond margin, and though I often choose to build a fire over a stump which I
  want to kill, these practices often cause problems.
- Gather a lot of dead twigs, preferably those still standing and which will snap off easily.
- Make a wigwam shaped frame of thin twigs over a few sheets of screwed up dry paper. A
  frequent error is to use twigs which are too chunky. Keep these nearby to strategically place
  in the flames in their turn, but use the thin ones first, and don't put so many on that the heat
  is not really burning through them.
- Build slowly. The original wigwam should collapse, so put on a few more pieces of deadwood, but still not too many. Put each on in the same direction. It can help to have them lined up with the wind direction. It is best to keep to the same principle as the fire is developed. Crossed branches tend to tangle and therefore don't burn through and fall in to the hot base of the fire.
- Even when the fire is well established there will still be issues to sort out if branches are put on, very much bigger than the hot base of the fire.

The lifestyle of our ancestors was greatly enhanced when they discovered how to harness fire. It opened out new areas which were habitable and gave rise to their ability to cook, and ultimately to produce bronze and iron.

The ash produced by burning top-wood and bramble is rich in potassium, so when possible I like to collect it and bring it to the allotment. Removal of this nutriment also reduces the rankness of the vegetation of the reserve, allowing more delicate plants to compete.
