



Rector's letter ...

Not many parents expect their daughter to become queen. The same was true of the parents of Elizabeth, born on April 21, 1926. She was third in line to the throne, but it wasn't expected that either her father would become King or that she would become Queen.

She became Queen 60 years ago and, whatever your view of the monarchy, you will acknowledge that she has been a faithful servant, has shown amazing commitment and demonstrated great loyalty.

She has over 600 patronages of organisations and charities. She is Head of State, the Fount of Justice, Head of the Armed Forces, and Defender of the Faith.

She has all the honour and all the titles, but again and again she points away from herself. In her Christmas Message last year she said,

"Although we are capable of great acts of kindness, history teaches us that we sometimes need saving from ourselves – from our recklessness or our greed. God sent into the world a unique person – neither a philosopher nor a general (important though they are) – but a Saviour, with the power to forgive.

Forgiveness lies at the heart of the Christian faith. It can heal broken families, it can restore friendships and it can reconcile divided communities. It is in forgiveness that we feel the power of God's love.

In the last verse of this beautiful carol, O Little Town of Bethlehem, there's a prayer:
O Holy Child of Bethlehem
Descend to us we pray
Cast out our sin
And enter in
Be born in us today

It is my prayer that on this Christmas day we might all find room in our lives for the message of the angels and for the love of God through Christ our Lord."

In all our celebrations it is absolutely right to thank and honour the Queen for a life of wonderful service. But I'm sure she would be sad if we didn't remember the one who has lead a far more perfect life, who can deal with sin, is the real Fount of Justice and is the one in whom we are to put our faith.

Enjoy the celebrations in Great Holland. Why not start the day at our Jubilee Service at All Saints' Church. 11am on Sunday 3 June.

Coronation Chicken

The original Coronation chicken was invented for foreign guests who were being entertained after the Coronation ceremony for Queen Elizabeth II in 1953. Constance Spry, (a florist who also helped with floral arrangements on the day of the Coronation) proposed a recipe that used cold chicken pieces in a curry cream sauce with a salad of rice, green peas and mixed herbs.

Shredded Chicken from a medium sized pre roasted chicken 3 tbsp Mayonnaise
Mild curry powder to taste
1/2 tsp Cinnamon
Ground Black Pepper
1 tbsp Mango chutney
Suitanas - as many as you fancy

- Mix the mayonnaise, curry powder, cinnamon, black pepper, chutney and sultanas together, altering quantities to your preferred taste
- Mix the combined ingredients with the shredded chicken.
- Serve with baked potatoes, wraps, sandwiches etc

Dear friends in Great Holland ...

Later this summer, if summer ever comes, I shall be off to the Isles of Scilly, for what will be predominantly a working holiday. The Reverend Charlie Gibbs, who was my minister in Norfolk way back in 1993, is now minister to the Isles. (He appeared briefly in the BBC series "An Island Parish" prior to his move there from Thetford.) Rosemary and I were able to spend a week with him two years ago when we visited Scilly for the first time. And then in July of that year Charlie reciprocated by visiting us at Brightlingsea, just before the formation of the Tendring circuit, to give an illustrated talk about life and ministry on Scilly, and to preach the sermon at our farewell service.

Previously I've travelled to Scilly by boat from Penzance. The crossing can be choppy however, and can take in the region of three hours, so this time I'm going by helicopter. Having arrived I shall have just a few hours to recover before addressing the church Fellowship meeting who've asked me to speak about our situation on the Tendring, and how circuit amalgamation has impacted on us. The irony is that the Isles of Scilly will never experience amalgamation, simply because there is no-one for them to amalgamate with! Indeed it is likely that within a few years they will be the only single-minister circuit left within Methodism.

I'm sure you would all want me to wish Charlie well on your behalf. If you were avid viewers of "The Island Parish" you'd realize that it wasn't the easiest of appointments to be sent to. It's certainly a very different ministry to that which I'm used to, not least because everything is governed by the tides, and the availability of boats.

If you happen to be holidaying on Scilly this summer, do be sure to look him up.




COFFEE MORNINGS







FROM THE GT. HOLLAND LOCAL HISTORY RECORDER


History of Gt. Holland Methodist Church

I have been very fortunate to receive the history of The Great Holland Methodist Church into the archives, and hope that you find it as interesting as I have.

Around the year 1881 the Methodist Mission Band (eager for more conquests for Christ) decided to hold open-air services at a very picturesque, but out-of-the-way spot, at Gt. Holland Common. They were very well received by the people and so great were the success of these meetings that come the winter somewhere indoors was sought. By 1885, during the ministry of the Rev. A E Gregory, the Mission Band had formed a committee with the consent of the Quarterly Meeting. A cottage was secured for services and used for five years. Forty years later it was still standing, although in 1885 it had been described as "the worst cottage on the whole of the Common". A photograph taken at the time suggested that this description was not unwarranted, "for it looks a poor little place, with thatched roof and wooden walls". However some were proud of it for it had written along the front under the eaves "Wesleyan Mission Cottage".

An appeal was made to the Circuit in 1886 for "a real chapel". A resolution was passed to erect a brick chapel at Holland Common to accommodate about 100 people, providing the cost did not exceed £150 and that before commencement of building 75% of that sum had been guaranteed. The scheme matured five years later and the memorial stone was laid on 11th June 1891 by a distinguished visitor, Mrs W F Moulton. The chapel was ready and opened entirely free of debt on Monday, 14th September 1891 by Mrs A R Chamberlayne.

The cost of building was £184, of which £10 was spent on the purchase of the land, and not including the value of the free labour given. The original names on the Trust Deed were Arthur Fitch, John H Harman, Robert J Kittle, Stephen H Newing, **Edward Sully and Thomas** Benjamin Lubbock. Thomas Lubbock was affectionately known as "The Bishop of Holland Common" since he was an acceptable local preacher with powers of arresting incisive speech and a generous nature.




HOLLAND COMMON - OPENED SEPT., 1891.

Wesleyan Chapel 1891

The present Wesleyan Church was built in 1928 at a cost of £3000. It was needed to replace the original one at the Common which could no longer accommodate the growing congregation. A

foundation stone was laid by Miss Peggy Wolton. For many years it had a thriving Sunday School until diminishing numbers of village children did not make it viable to continue.



The two workers in the photo are Billy Cann and Billy Darnal


Chapel under construction 1928

For the Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977 the Methodist Chapel kindly gave permission for the Jubilee Committee to site a Commemorative Garden on their ground. They planted 35 rose bushes; a Village sign was painted and erected and two teak garden seats installed. The unveiling of the sign and the opening of the Jubilee Garden took place at 2.30 p.m. on Monday, 6th June 1977 by Miss Lily Clissett, who was presented with an orchid and a silver and Wedgwood brooch from the Jubilee Committee.

In 1998 the chapel was altered to encompass a day retreat centre and a rededication took place on 6th September. A bouquet was presented to Mrs Peggy Glading (nee Wolton).

ANY MATTERS ARISING FROM THE LAST MINUTES

There being no matters arising the minutes were agreed and signed.

ELECTION OF COMMITTEE MEMBERS

All current members agreed to stand and were duly elected.

UPDATE ON ROOFING MATTERS BY TOM

A planning application for the cupola went in on 5th April and was approved b F&W T C on 20th April and we expect approval by 31st May. On obtaining planning approval the builders, BTI, will install the cupola at no cost to us. This should see this area of the roof watertight for up to 30 years. The remainder of the roof is to be refurbished at no cost to us by the builders of the Care Home. This refurbishment should stop the leaks but the roof will need to be replaced within the next 10 to 20 years. It was noted during an inspection that the roof over the gable will not be fully repaired and we will need to look into doing this work. Tom also advised us that, during a recent hiring, he discovered water on the floor and had to mop it up as best he could. He approached the Care Home builders who advised him that they could not put a man on the roof until the scaffolding was in place. The builders also indicated that the owners of the care home may make an annual donation to the hall and we are to arrange a meeting with them to discuss this offer and see if we can bring it to fruition. The committee thanked Tom for his sterling work in the matter.

UPDATE ON HEATING BY TOM

Because of the number of times that the heating and the hot water have been left on by the users Tom has suggested that we install a new boiler with a seven day programme so that we could better monitor its use, as the present system is reaching the end of its life and is not very efficient. To improve the heating in the hall he also suggested that we replace four of the current radiators with double radiators with thermostatic controls with screw caps to discourage people from changing the settings. The new Combi boiler is also to be placed high on the wall for the same reason; it continues to be a problem where the heating is being left on after meetings and the heating costs represent almost 30% of our running costs. He has obtained a number of quotes and the cost is likely to be approximately £3,000. It was decided that Tom would get a further two quotes and he would go with whoever he feels is appropriate. It was also agreed that there would be a 10% contingency and that we would upgrade the system this year.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

Our treasurer, Sheila Watts, gave us an update on our financial position. Income this year is down on previous years. This is largely due to an extra hiring last year; excluding this, income is about average. We have invested £10,000 to obtain a higher rate of interest - £5,000 in a One Year Bond and £5,000 in a savings account. The latter sum is immediately available in an emergency. We are to look into the cost of our utility bills and see if we can get a better deal by merging our gas and electricity with one supplier. Our water supply is metered and as a charity we pay 10% of the council tax. There was also a sum of £400 received from the village fete which will reflect in next years figures. Finally, we are to ascertain our tax position in respect of interest earned to ensure we are not paying tax on it.

HIRING AGREEMENT/LICENSING AGREEMENT

We have decided to postpone this until the autumn when it is hoped the proposed work will be completed and we will be in a better position to discuss the above.

RECYCLING BINS

We received an offer from the council to place recycling bins in the car park but, as we know that one is to be placed at the Ship Inn, we decided this not to be a good idea because of the inconvenience and the additional noise.

CONSTITUTION

A draft of a new constitution was produced by Tim and we are to discuss it at the next meeting. This will give everybody a chance to read it and, again, our thanks go to Tim for all his hard work.

EXPENSES

It was decided that, where committee members incurred expenses in connection with their work on the hall, they would be reimbursed on production of receipts up to a figure of, say, £50. Any figure above this would have to be approved by the committee.

CHRISTMAS FUND RAISING EVENT

We are to arrange a Christmas fund raising event in cooperation with the Residents Association and divide the proceeds equally. The date has been provisionally set for 8th December next. It is to comprise of a quiz and Sue Jenkins has agreed to do the catering.

BOOKING CLERK

John Knight is stepping down from this position and from the committee. We would like to extend our grateful thanks for his sterling work both as Chairman and Booking Clerk. We will look for a volunteer to take over this task at our A.G.M.

VILLAGE VOICE MAGAZINE

We decided to continue to publish our minutes in The Village Voice as every house gets a copy and people can see how the hall is been run. It may even encourage more people to get involved.

ANY CORRESPONDENCE

Mr Masters, who had painted a picture of the village hall for the village Christmas cards, has offered us the use of this as a letter header if we felt it was appropriate. The committee liked the painting but it was felt that it would incur a cost for the person printing it off. Mr Masters to be thanked for the offer

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

There were no further matters to discuss.

The next meeting is to be held on 23rd June 2012 in the hall at 10.00 am.

SUMMARY OF BUILDING WORKS- 3 YEAR PLAN

The Chairperson gave an outline of the proposed building works which was a restatement of our discussions in the previous meeting which are reproduced below.

A planning application went in on 5th April and was approved by F&W T C on 20th April and we expect approval by 31st May in respect of the cupola. This should see the cupola watertight for up to 30 years. The roof is to be refurbished at no cost to us by the builders of the Dementia Home. This refurbishment should stop the leaks but the roof will need to be replaced within the next 10 to 20 years. It was noted during an inspection that the roof over the gable will not be fully repaired and we will need to look into doing this work. Tom also advised us that, during a recent hiring, he discovered water on the floor and had to mop it up as best he could. He approached the Dementia Home builders who advised him that they could not put a man on the roof until the scaffolding was in place. The builders also indicated that the may make an annual donation to the hall and we are to arrange a meeting with then to discuss this offer and see if we can bring it to fruition. The committee thanked Tom for his sterling work in the matter.

Because of the number of times that the heating and the hot water have been left on by the users [also the age of the current boiler (over 30 years)] Tom has suggested that we install a new boiler with a seven day programme so that we could better monitor its use, as the present system is reaching the end of its life and is not very efficient. To improve the heating in the hall he also suggested that we replace four of the current radiators with double radiators with thermostatic controls with screw caps to discourage people from changing the settings. The new Combi boiler is also to be placed high on the wall for the same reason. It continues to be a problem where the heating is being left on after meetings and the heating costs represent almost 30% of our running costs. He has obtained a number of quotes and the cost is likely to be approximately £3,000. It was decided that Tom would get a further two quotes and he would go with whoever he feels is appropriate. It was also agreed that there would be a 10% contingency and that we would upgrade the system this year.

NEW HALL USERS

We have lost one of the day classes but gained an exercise class in Tai Chi and a Zumba class. We are aware that the hall is not yet appropriate for weddings etc but this is taken into account in our renovation plans.

FINANCIAL REPORT AND APPROVAL OF ACCOUNTS

Tim Reynolds gave an overview on the years income and expenditure which, taking out an exceptional booking last year, is roughly in line with previous years. We are aware that the roof will need to be replaced sometime in the next 10-20 years and we will have to build up sufficient funds to cover this expenditure.

The accounts were duly approved.

ANNUAL CLEAN

It was decided to postpone the clean until after the proposed building works have been completed. We will discuss this again at the next meeting.

CHARITIES COMMISSION RETURNS

These have been done.

ANY CORRESPONDENCE

There was no correspondence to review

ANY OTHER BUSINESS.

The committee was introduced to the audience. We also had a volunteer to replace John as our booking clerk being Mrs F Harris and her husband Paul Harris has agreed to join the committee

We requested input from those present. The main problem was the heating but this in under active consideration and the proposed new system should alleviate the situation.

It was also pointed out that the acoustics in the hall were not great but there is little we can do about that. The possibility of installing a Loop system was mooted but the cost would be a consideration.

Great Holland Pits Nature Reserve:

Hushed Wings



Last week I was about to get in my car in Great Holland Village, at a little before midnight, and happened to observe the strangely relaxed flight of a bird passing over some gardens at roof-top level. Street lights provided sufficient illumination to identify the light-toned bird as a Barn Owl.

Despite the fact that the bird can be seen in most of the world apart from polar regions and deserts, around twenty years ago it was very rare to see it here. When farms had more livestock and regulations were not so strict concerning storage of grains, there was often a problem with mice and rats, and older farm buildings provided good nest sites for barn owls. These birds were welcomed and effective. Modern farms are quite different and for some time these popular birds declined.

A farmer in the parish of Little Clacton was convinced that all was not lost for the barn owl. Pastures and rough grassland provides a good habitat for Field voles and these have always been an important food source. He believed that the main problem for Barn Owls was the lack of nesting sites.

In other parts of the world Barn Owls use all sorts of sites other than barns and in particular boxes placed on the top of poles were used in parts of Asia, as control of rats was important there. Despite scepticism from many others, the farmer, David Wilkin, started to get some of these built and erected, and they were immediately very successful. Boxes were placed in various positions, often in twos, and quite quickly Barn Owls were regularly observed using them.

When the box placed on the boundary of the reserve was being put up in 1999, we could see a bird watching us from the other box across the river, while it was bringing in food for its chicks. Within a very short time the pair had started a second brood in the new box. When food is abundant barn owls can be very prolific and this explains their resurgence. Recent reports in the newspaper suggest that the recent flooding may have made life difficult for them by drowning the voles, but it may be, at least in the short term, that they were able to catch displaced voles more easily. Voles too are very prolific.

Barn Owls are noted for their eerily quiet flight. They are able to fly extremely slowly with limited beating of their wings, resulting from the fine feathery edges of their wings which reduce turbulence, and the high curvature of their wings, which increases the effectiveness of each beat. Friction between feathers is reduced by their leathery surface also reducing sound.

The reason for this advanced aeronautical efficiency is two-fold, voles do not ear the approach, and the owl can locate the voles by their tiny sounds as they move through the vegetation or eat seeds. Barn Owls can hunt purely by sound, in total darkness, and their distinctive face mask is actually shaped to channel sound to their ears, in the same way that ear lobes do in mammals. A further feature is that each ear is not identical. They are set slightly differently in shape and position to enable greater precision in locating sounds.

One of my childhood reading books was called Hushwing, but when a Barn Owl is arguing about territory he can be quite shrill, which also earns him the name screech owl in some parts.



Thanks again to all residents for their help in keeping crime down and for their continued vigilance.



Tales of a Reiki Master

The countryside has always held a special kind of inspiration to me, and after living and breathing the Cornish way of life for over eight years, it was a hard decision to move back to Essex. After the arrival of two beautiful girls and no family living close by, it was inevitable that I came home. We found a stop gap home in the middle of Clacton where we stayed for almost three years. This was longer than I'd hoped, but believing that all things come to those who wait, I stuck it out; and so it did. We are now residents of this beautiful village Great Holland and although we have only lived here for four months, it already feels like home.

One of the things that drew me to this village was the spiritual feeling of the place. I have been a Reiki Practitioner/Teacher since 2003 and an Animal Communicator nearly all of my life, so sensing energy comes second nature to me. I have worked with animals predominately in my practice, specialising in treating horses and have spent the last two years dedicating myself to teaching. Reiki is a non religious spiritual practice which; whilst holding the belief that we are all one, assists the body and mind in balancing itself energetically using hands on techniques and meditation.

We are all made up of energy. Every cell that makes up the human body is energy. When we go through the stresses and strains of everyday life our energy can become depleted. Our energy stores, (chakras) can become like muddy water. When a person or animal experiences a reiki treatment, that muddy water is cleaned, enabling the river to flow freely once more. The experience of having reiki can be deeply relaxing, leaving you with a sense of completeness and wellbeing. During a treatment the Practitioner allows their body to become like an open vessel. Animals can not physically cry. Their only release of built up negative energy is to for us to help them. If you have ever spent time with a person that is going through an ordeal like depression or grief, you will understand how draining this can feel, and how relieved you might feel when you leave. Our animals cannot get away from us. They cannot simply get up and walk out of our lives.

Reiki helps to re-balance the energetic system, leaving a sense of wellbeing behind. It helps us to feel the world differently. Reiki can aid the healing process and rekindle a sense of calm and comfort.

I have seen changes occur rapidly and sometimes it can take a while for deep routed issues to be released. It is always the animal's (or person's) choice to accept the healing. The subconscious mind knows when it is ready to let go. I like to use a saying by a very well known American Natural Horsemanship expert, Pat Parelli: "Take the time it takes, and it will take less time,"

The one thing that I can be sure of however, is that once a person has experienced reiki, it is an experience they are unlikely to forget; for all the right reasons. Although I am a teacher of Reiki, I will forever remain a student to the energy and the animals. They are our greatest teachers and friends. Reiki gives them a little back for all that they give to us.
