





- > Perhaps you could loan a parasol to protect stallholders from the sun!



Dear friends in Great Holland ...



Some of you reading this may be of the Parish church or the Methodist church. Some of you may not attend church at all. I always feel that when I read of the words of Jesus in the gospels it seems to have little to do with our churches in real life. I have been touched by the words of Jesus in St Matthew's gospel. The churches have been reading this a great deal in the last few months.

As Jesus walked down country paths teaching his followers and al who were interested, he would see crops in fields and relate the farmers' problems and decisions to the philosophy of life. When the disciples of Jesus wanted to believe and could not find the strength he remarked that the mustard was the smallest of all seeds. They knew each seed could produce a very sizeable plant; Jesus remarked that faith of that size could do wonderful things, even to remove mountains. How many of us have had immovable mountains and not known who to turn to?

We like to think that in church we have the resources to help any who turn to Christ's people in need. Just before that passage in the gospel, we have Jesus talking about a field in which the farmer's enemy planted the seeds of thistles under the cover of night. Jesus said to leave it till harvest time. This would go against all agricultural common sense. But he was talking about the Kingdom of God, which is the community of believers here on earth at any one time.

He reminded them that God was the farmer. We should welcome in everyone. The harvest would be at the end of time. God would reap the harvest and then he would judge right and wrong. Yet we tend not to accept those who disagree with us. We want to make the judgement. We want to dig out the bad seed. We want to say, this is the way we do things here, if you disagree there may be another place where you will fit in better. Yet no-one is perfect. We are all travellers on a journey, just like Bunyan's interpretation in "Pilgrim's Progress". A seed grows so slowly but eventually it is capable of producing both colour and fruit. May your lives be colourful and fruitful. Happy journeying.

Hedingham Omnibuses have recently been awarded the contract to continue operating the No.9 bus route - which runs between Great Holland and Walton - for another year. This bus service was reinstated some time ago, after it had been withdrawn for a while due to lack of use. It offers a vital service to our village, and it would be a shame to see it disappear again. You might like to know that:

- The No.9 runs from The Ship at Great Holland to Walton's Columbine Centre, via: Kirby Cross, Frietuna Road, Elm Tree Avenue, Frinton's 'gates', Old Road, The Esplanade, Woodberry Way and Walton Station.
- · It operates only on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.
- Fares on this service are considerably cheaper than those charged on routes 7, 7X and 8, which also serve Great Holland. Bus passes are accepted
- The No.9 is now the ONLY bus that goes from Great Holland through Frinton's gates.
- The route has a dedicated driver (Peter).

If you have not used the No.9 before, why not give it a try and perhaps make some new friends at the same time? The current timetable is shown below.

John Poulten welcomed everyone, including our visitors Deputy Mayor Mark Cossens, Cllr Robert Bucke and PCSO Michelle Pittey & Danny Patterson.

On behalf of GHRA, John presented an engraved pewter tankard to Robert Bucke for his two years of service to the Village as F&WTC Mayor.

John welcomed Chris Keston the newly elected Great Holland Councillor and in Alan's absence, asked Jeanne Large to pass on the Village's thanks to Alan for his years of support and service in that role.

Apologies for Absence: were received from:

Alan Large, Sylvia Nicoll, Malcolm Graham, John Halls (Mayor).

Minutes of the last meeting (29th January 2011) were approved - as published in Village Voice.

Matters Arising

John advised that due to problems in printing Village Voice, his usual open letter to the Village had not been received by the majority – but would be coming soon.

- Local Listing: Tendring District Counsel has still to organise a meeting to provide more
 information on proposals for the local listing of notable properties in the area.
- The Kissing Gate stolen from the footpath in Church Lane has now been reinstated.
- Queens Diamond Jubilee: John has received no replies to his letters to interest groups
 meeting within the village regarding collectively organising a celebration for next year's
 Queens Diamond Jubilee.
- 58 Bed Dementia Unit: The planning agreement was expected to be signed in June when
 planning permission for the access and revised road works would be given. Development
 would be capable of starting thereafter.

Police Update

PCSO Michelle Pittey provided a summary on the 15 Great Holland related incidents logged by the Police since the last meeting:

- 6 Road Traffic incidents: Including 2 Road Traffic Collisions, Drink Driver, Broken down vehicle, Diesel spill in Pork Lane.
- · 9 Crime related incidents : Including -

Theft of a vehicle from Rectory Road - found burnt out in Colchester

ABH with an Axe (person arrested and charged)

Attempted burglary in Laxton Grove,

Theft in Pork Lane of apples & horse feed.

Concern for welfare call

Suspicious vehicle (registered to Hereford, but owner not traced)

Trespass

Petrol syphoned from a vehicle - positive evidence has been collected.

General Police advice given:

- Be sure to secure Garden sheds / outbuildings after gardening to avoid theft of tools, mowers etc.
- When leaving your vehicle, NEVER leave SatNavs + Cradles, handbags or valuables on display in cars.
- Be on watch for Prowlers an increasing number of Oil / Fuel thefts have occurred in Tendring area, following the sharp increase in fuel prices.

- In an emergency, 999

Speed Camera Training.

PCSO Danny Patterson invited residents to play their part in catching speeding cars:

- Use of a speed gun has been shown to have a definite impact on speed reduction.
- Training is Free
- Residents will be accompanied by a PC or PCSO (therefore no personal risk)
- Going out with Police once a week will enable them to cover far more roads within the Village.

A number of residents expressed an interest in having their road monitored.

Summary:

The more people that volunteer to accompany the Police - the more roads that can be covered.

Treasurer's update- provided by Denys & Lindy Strich

- Audited accounts were presented.
- Figures represented a loss, generated by reduced sales of Christmas Cards however considerable stock remains and can be sold for this year.

- Aside from subscriptions, funds were increased by Social events (Christmas social & beetle drive – for which thanks was given to Sandra Mooney for organising.)
- Denys presented a graph demonstrating the number of households, road by road, who supported the Residents Association.
 Of the circa 500 houses in Great Holland, only 85 had paid the fee of £2 per person (£4 per family).

Planning Matters

• Local Development Framework (Five Year Plan) :

Document is soon to be published by TDC.

John explained that the Plan and associated designated Village Envelope is key.

Any change in the current Village Envelope will be reviewed and if required, challenged on behalf of GHRA members.

Application to build a house in The Paddock (Off Main Rd):

F&WTC approved the application to build a substantial single dwelling. However TDC have refused permission, given the property would be built on land designated in the Coastal Protection Zone.

Traveller Site – Halstead Rd, Kirby.

Land next to Willow Farm House, nr Kirby School, has been sold. The land does not have planning permission, however trees have been removed and an access way created.

F&WTC have reasons to believe the land has been sold to an individual who has in the past permitted Travellers to set up a permanent base – therefore F&WTC are watching closely.

Cllr Mark Cossens noted that unlike trespass, it is far harder to control the arrival of travellers who have purchased land (albeit without planning permission). Based on Kirby's experience, his advice was:

a) For Land Owners to be certain who they were really selling the land to.

b) To ensure residents value and support a strong Residents association – rather than reacting after an event.

Delegated Powers.

The members voted that in instances where a planning application was contrary to Planning Policy and/or contrary to the GHRA Parish Plan and Design Statement, the committee should object to the proposal on behalf of the GHRA.

Footpath to Sea Wall at Kirby:

Robert Bucke explained that whilst the breach of the sea wall in Kirby has been agreed, the movement of the Footpath had not. The breach would render the current Quay Lane to Island Lane circular walk impossible, instead creating 2 disjointed J shaped routes.

He encouraged residents to join Kirby on a planned walk of that country walk around 10th or 17th July (Details to be published in the F&W Gazette.)

Submissions supporting the retention of the circular walk should be made to local councillors (contact details available in Village Voice).

AOB

Thanks were given to Karen Withams for donating the tea / coffee and home-made cakes for the meeting.

Dog nuisance.

Sandra Mooney received a phone call requesting the topic of anti-social dog behaviour be raised at the AGM. The person commented of dog mess and noise in their road, however refused to leave a name, or a road in which the problem had occurred.


John reminded the members that a Dog Warden was available to address such concerns – contact details can be found in Village Voice.

Rubbish / Littering

Comments were made regarding litter seen in ditches when walking along Little Clacton road and Pork Lane.

Wendy Drake mentioned that like her, residents could collect litter when / if seen.

A suggestion was made that the problem is contributed by open top lorries collecting waste (where the rubbish can then blow away.) It was suggested that if seen, TDC will ensure that the matter is addressed (Sandra Mooney gave an example to illustrate).

Robert Bucke further emailed to thank the Residents for his gift, saying:

I cannot say how overwhelmed and grateful I am to have received from GHRA such a generous gift in acknowledgement of my efforts in support of Great Holland village and residents, particularly during my 2-year term as Town Mayor.

I need hardly say how much I admire all the work which so many village residents contribute in making it such a great community to live in, and the village has become very special to me during my 12-year period of service through election as your district councillor.

In doing so, I gladly commit myself to continuing to respond to the needs and wishes of Great Holland, and working with Great Holland Residents' Association, which so effectively represents the village.

I pay tribute also to the works of Alan Large during his term as town councillor, and feel sure that Chris Keston will commit himself equally to the future of the village, with a younger perspective on all matters. Please convey my very grateful thanks to the committee and members of GHRA, and I shall look forward to seeing you all at regular meetings, as usual.

LETTER TO GREAT HOLLAND RESIDENTS August 2011

SUMMER

The Summer Fete is nearly here. This is another massive effort by a few volunteers. Please support the Fete on Saturday 6th August. Remember also that there will be a Hog Roast at the Ship Inn. You could combine the two.

PLANNING and PROPERTY MATTERS

58 Bed Dementia Unit.

You will all have seen that there is a lot of activity on site. TDC Planners are aware of this and (at the time of writing) say that Development has not yet commenced inasmuch as various surveys are being undertaken together with site preparation works. The final documentation relating the current application (which as you recall is to get rid of the so-called "traffic light" condition in the original appeal permission) is still being finalised. Obviously we hope the paperwork will be finished soon as the Developers are clearly preparing to get underway.

In the meantime Cllr. Robert Bucke has expressed concern about the highway problems that are even now appearing with heavy lorries manoeuvring to get into the site. He is concerned that this is a problem and a potential hazard to vehicles and pedestrians alike and is raising it not only with TDC, but also Essex CC and the Police.

30 Bed Dementia Unit

I have no more information at present.

Local Listings

We were waiting for news of the reconvened meeting promised when we last met at TDC Weeley. What has happened now is that TDC is dealing with the matter by electronic consultation. I set out below an email sent to me by TDC on 14th July.

LOCAL HERITAGE LIST FOR TENDRING

As you will be aware the Council organised a workshop in March on preparing a Local Heritage List. Such a List will include buildings and historic features which do not meet the national criteria for formal "listing".

Since the workshop further discussions have been held with local partners and with County Council officers and the English Heritage consultation on Local Lists has now finished. In order to move this project forward the Council is publishing a new section on its website devoted to the creation of a Local Heritage List. This can be found in the "Planning" section webpage under "Heritage and Conservation"

All interested groups are now invited to comment on the Local List process and especially the nomination forms, selection criteria, and guidance notes. All comments should be submitted by 30 August preferably online. If this is not possible please contact me. Following the consultation period the documents may be amended and will be published with an invitation for local groups to

submit their Local List nominations. All nominations will be submitted direct to the County Council for inclusion on the Historic Environment Record. I do hope that you will be able to comment on our proposals and I look forward to working with you in preparing the Tendring Local Heritage List.

I do strongly urge you to go onto TDC 's website and follow the links indicated. You will see that nothing has changed since the meeting we (Alan Large, Denys Strich and I) attended. What TDC are saying is that they are following the procedures and forms recommended by Essex CC. You will recall it was Essex CC who told TDC it was OK to put traffic lights under Kirby Bridge!

What is proposed is that local people and organisations can fill in forms to recommend to TDC that properties, views, monuments etc to be known as "assets" should be included in a Local Heritage List. A selection panel (chosen by whom?) will then recommend the proposed assets to the Planning Portfolio Holder for TDC who will then sign off the list and pass it to Essex CC, and that's it! Nowhere is there provision for the owner of the asset to be notified or consulted, let alone object to the inclusion of the asset on the list.

Inclusion on the List is meant to be a factor to be taken into account if a planning application is subsequently made to carry out development on the asset, in addition to any other criteria that may already exist, such as location within a Conservation Area.

That would be bad enough, but enshrined in the legislation PPS 5 and the Guidance Notes that go with it, is reference to a planning authority's ability to use what is called an Article 4 Direction to help preserve the asset. That Direction takes away Permitted Development rights, i.e. those things one can normally do without having to apply for planning permission. These rights range from construction of small extensions, erecting fences to certain heights, to painting ones walls and doors any colour one chooses.

You may have gathered that I am strongly opposed to what I regard as a thoroughly unnecessary and undemocratic process, imposing another planning burden which is simply not necessary. We have our excellent and up-to-date Parish Plan and Village Design Statement which TDC has previously accepted as the appropriate planning guidance for Great Holland. I would ask you all to read what the Council say and if you agree with me, please write to TDC or send an email before 30th August saying that we do not want any asset nominated in Great Holland, and certainly not without the relevant owner being able to object.

Local Development Framework

You will probably have read in the local press that the Council have put the review into the LDF on hold while it reviews its Housing Strategy. The reason for that is that the previously imposed national targets have been abolished and TDC is no longer obliged to look to find 6300 new homes in the next 15 years. Having said that the key is to continue to insist that no change is made to housing policy in so far as it affects villages like ours, and in particular to insist that no change is made to the Settlement Boundary Map which would encourage infill development. We will continue to monitor the situation.

Joan Hammond has lived in Frinton for many years, but spent her childhood in Great Holland. Readers may remember the interesting articles about village life that she provided for some of the early editions of Village Voice. Mrs Hammond has recently written this article about her grandfather's early life...

The story of Henry Ratcliffe...

Henry, born in 1846, was a Yorkshire man who came down from Yorkshire to plough our land.

He had two steam tractor engines which he may have brought with him - a very slow journey - a long length of steel cable and a 'back to back' plough that would cut at least four furrows at a time. In a farmer's field he would position each steam engine either side, with the cable taut between the two, and the plough attached at one end. By winding the cable from one engine to the other, he was able to draw the plough along, cutting four or more furrows as it went. When reaching the other end the plough would be turned over, the engines moved along, the plough lowered and pulled back by the other engine, cutting another set of furrows. This was a much quicker process than the exhausting job previously done by a man and horse who could only cut one furrow at a time.

From time to time the plough needed repairs and the ploughshares which cut into the ground frequently got blunted and worn away and needed replacing. Where to go for this but to the nearest Blacksmith? It is possible that at such a place Henry met his future wife Matilda Thorrington at the Blacksmith's shop in Little Clacton.

Henry and Matilda lived at first at Great Yeldham, where their first son, called Telford, was born. There followed three more sons and daughter, by which time Henry must have decided to give up ploughing and he installed his family in a little cottage in Great Holland, almost opposite the entrance to the Old Rectory. It must have been a squeeze, and the youngest son 'Archie' (my father) was born there.

In 1889, having disposed of the steam engines and plough, Henry started to build a foundry on the land from the back of the row of cottages to Manor Road, where he made the main entrance. It was a very comprehensive building for those days, with foundry and blast furnace, workshops, Blacksmith's shop with two forges and 'travis' where two horses at a time could be shod.

When this was completed and running making mainly, of course, ploughshares, Henry started on his house - quite a large red brick house on the rising ground beside the foundry and which included a white balcony running along the whole of the front, from which they could get a view over the fields down to the sea. Matilda had at last got her family home, with this beautiful view to enjoy.


Remembering his roots, Henry called his house 'Hunslet'. BUT, soon after, the Village Hall was built right opposite!

Village Hall update...


CUPOLA

I am sure you will be aware if you have seen the Village Hall roof recently that, with the deluge of rain we have been having, we suffered a leak through the Cupola. This has caused damage to the ceiling inside the hall. Stan who has been carrying out our extension kindly made the Cupola waterproof, which is only a temporary fix.

The Cupola has been an issue for some time. We have been led to believe that to restore it to its former glory (as shown in photograph below) we are looking in the region of £15,000.00. The Village Hall Committee feels that due to the serious amount it would cost to restore, money which we do not have, the cheaper option is to remove what is left of the Cupola and restore the roof to a normal roof. We intend to use the tiles which were saved off the part of the Village Hall that has been removed to gain access to the car park.

However, the Village Hall Committee felt that we should ask the villagers for their opinion about the Cupola being removed, as there may be some people who would be strongly opposed to this, and perhaps consider having it repaired and raising the money for that project.


AUTUMN CLEAN:

Great Holland Pits Nature Reserve:

Bats



At the Holland Pits reserve this April, I was more fortunate to have a Brown Long Eared Bat pointed out to me, at first hanging on to the outside of one of the bird hides, eating occasional caddis flies. It was a very hot morning and possibly the temperature had obliged the animal to leave a tree cavity where it had spent the winter. Certainly not injured it flew on to the ground where it looked most ungainly, though its wings had been slightly damaged. It took off with no trouble to straighten itself out on a tree trunk where I could observe the surprisingly long ears and the wing span of about 250 mm.


The commonest bats, seen in many gardens in Great Holland are the Pipistrelles. These are regular visitors to our moth monitoring sessions at the reserve, sometimes swooping down low over the lamps, taking moths from the air. This year we observed the wings of moths floating quietly down into the light of the lamp, the nutritious bodies being consumed some way above.

Efforts have been made over the years to improve the conditions for bats in an ex-world war two air raid shelter, but with little evidence of success though it is used by hibernating butterflies and a lot of spiders. Noctule bats though quite scarce are sometimes seen, noted by their slower wing beats and a wing span of more than a foot. Daubentons are most usually encountered flying over water courses picking off insects from just above the surface.

Bats are quiet creatures, which don't leave a discernible mess, and live on flying insects. They choose to roost in roofs of buildings accessible to them, particularly those which are clean. They definitely don't get tangled in peoples hair or cause other damage, though because they are protected by law they sometimes hold up renovation work. They tend to feed over unimproved grassland which is the source of plentiful insect food.

This brings me back to my visit to the church tower. From the top, the marshes can be followed in a broad crescent from the borders of Frinton and Kirby to the foot of Great Holland Pits, and then under the railway line to Thorpe Le Soken. This low lying grassland combined with some woods and suitable loft space in local homes makes Great Holland a good place to observe them.

The idea of planting climbing Sweet Peas and Nasturtiums on the 'carcase' of my old Bottle Brush Tree, which perished last Winter, is being very successful and adding welcome natural colour by the side of the Herb Garden. Hellebores gave a lovely long display, but will now benefit from pruning away the old foliage ready for fresh growth...

Alpines and Rock Roses have also flourished this year and it is worth taking cuttings or adding to from the displays offered from Garden Centres.

Always looking ahead - perhaps those of you, like me, who planted pansies in the Spring have been delighted with their long lasting displays, encouraged by regular dead heading and some feeding.

The very welcome rain after an exceptionally dry Spring has perked up our plantings of flowers and vegetables. A relief to those entering exhibits for the Garden Club Show on 7th August and providing welcome contributions to the popular fêtes at Great Holland and Kirby.

Numerous gardens have been open to the public in our area. My past recollection of, for example, Kentwell Hall, is remembered with affection, taking one back to the attractive Elizabethan eragardens set off by an attractively designed large Manor House. Also, those who have visited the Sussex area will recall Christopher Lloyd's old home at Great Dixter, also depicting this era.

The Summer Season gradually slides on to Autumn with the Rowan Trees proudly displaying their berries, the cereal harvests gathered and ploughing for a new season on the horizon, a time fast approaching for flower arrangers to be busy decorating our churches for the Harvest celebrations, with special music adding to the beauty of this gentle, mellow time of the year.

Although my Cat Friends are no longer with me, I remember with much affection their contributions to my pleasure over the years and the welcome they gave, in their different ways, to visitors, especially during the 23 years of my involvement with Kirby Open Gardens...
