

Rector's article ...

There is an old Chinese proverb "If you're going to go for revenge, you'd better dig two graves."

There is no better illustration of this than the recent case of Vicky Pryce and Chris Huhne. Ms Pryce, furious at her cheating husband, Chris Huhne MP, planned revenge. She certainly got it, bringing down his career, but dragging herself down in the process.

Contrast that with Jesus on the cross. As part of the Easter story, we hear of Jesus on the cross as he suffers terribly at the hands of those around him "Father, forgive them" he prays.

That's the wonder of Easter. We know the story but how often do we stop and ponder what is actually going on?

When we stop and think, we can realise that the events and words in the story are shocking, terrible, remarkable and unexpected. There's murder and forgiveness, regret and joy, death defeated, friends become enemies and enemies become friends.



THANK YOU to everyone who supported our March Home Made Hour, which raised funds for All Saints' Church. Our next Home Made Hours are on Saturday 6th April and Saturday 4th May from 10.00-11.00am in the Village Hall. Please come and join us for tea, coffee, friendly company, and the sale of home made cakes, marmalade, trifles, savouries, scones etc, occasional plants/garden produce and hand crafted greetings cards. We also have a raffle.



Ingredients

250g self-raising flour

2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

400g caster sugar

350ml vegetable oil

4 eggs

350g grated carrots

120g chopped walnuts



Cream cheese icing:

225g cream cheese

110g margarine, softened

450g icing sugar

120g chopped walnuts

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

- Preheat the oven to 180 C / Gas 4. Grease two 23cm round cake tins.
- In a medium bowl, stir together the flour, cinnamon and sugar.
- Add the oil and eggs, mix until blended, then stir in the carrots and nuts.
- Divide the cake mixture evenly between the two prepared tins.
- Bake for 25 to 30 minutes in the preheated oven. A skewer inserted into the cake should come out clean
- Cool cakes on wire racks before removing from tins.

To make the icing

- In a medium bowl, cream together the butter and cream cheese, add the sugar and cream well.
- Stir in the nuts and vanilla.
- Use to fill and ice the cooled cake layers.


Produce competition



The journey to Easter Sunday has finished! But our journey with God continues. So, how do we continue this journey now? I have just come back from a retreat from Northumbria Community and in that retreat I was reminded that in our journey, we are called to stop and rest with God and we are called to go out into the world and find God there. The ethos of this way of life is the ebb and flow of a 'mixed life', of both the contemplative and of the active, of withdrawal and of engagement, of solitude and of community. The best way that journey can be described is through the tides. Sometimes the tides are in and sometimes the tides are out. This was made even more relevant when we visited the Holy Island of Lindisfarne. I suppose it is the same thing with Mersea Island. The getting in and out of the islands depends on the tides. The nature itself has given the island communities a rhythm of life. And it is the same with our journey with God. We need to find a rhythm of life, in which we are alone, and we are together, in which we rest and in which we participate in God's mission in the world. But our journeys sometimes take different forms and shapes. And it is ok, I think, as long as we find some time to regain some of that rhythm of life in our everyday life.

The Northumbria Community is directed by trying to answer the following questions: 'Who is it that you seek?' 'How then shall we live?' and 'How can we sing the Lord's song in a strange land?'

It seems to me, that these are the questions that we ought to live by as we continue our journey with the risen Christ. We journey with our eyes focused on Jesus, we journey in deep and intimate relationship with Christ, we journey living out our lives as his disciples and we journey trying to make sense of the world and bring into it God's hope and love.

And amongst it all, our journey is a journey of companionship, of peace and of power in the name of


Two new buses for Great Holland!

SLADBURYS SOLAR FARM

This proposal for blighting a 17 hectare field of good agricultural land adjoining the Holland Haven SSSI at the bottom of Little Clacton Road, with solar panels, was the subject of an article in the December/January edition of the Village Voice. A public display of the scheme, by the developers, Push Energy, took place in the Village Hall on 14th November when it was mooted that a planning application would be submitted in the New Year.

To date there has been no planning application but it is still anticipated and we should remain vigilant and ready to object strongly to this proposal which, if approved, would be contrary to the wishes we expressed in our Parish Plan & Village Design Statement, to preserve our scenic surroundings. It would despoil the SSSI valley and set a disturbing precedent.

The attractions of easy money via government subsidies offered for "green" energy schemes has promoted an avalanche of schemes which are already exacting a heavy toll on the country's environment and blighting peoples' lives. It is disturbing that landowners and developers are able to cash in because schemes are only viable due to the premiums we are paying on our energy bills and the employment of cheap imported equipment manufactured outside the UK. Ironically solar panels invariably come from China where it is doubtful that manufacturing is very green!

The National Planning Policy Framework includes a presumption in favour of renewable energy development making it harder for planning authorities to resist. The organisation of a concerted rebuttal will not be so easy without the vehicle of the Great Holland Residents Association, which will be disbanded in May unless volunteers take on the roles of Chairman and Secretary. A similarly controversial planning application some years ago was the spur to the foundation of the GHRA.

Is the grass greener?

Surprisingly perhaps many of us think it is, and surprisingly too we attempt to make it less so.

Many of the best flowery fields surviving in the countryside, owe their beauty to the past action of folding livestock on arable land at night, to deposit their dung, before being put back on to the pasture in the day. Thus the pastures became more barren, while fertility was restored to arable fields. But barren resulted in beautiful! The flowers benefitted from reduced competition with grasses and other nutrient hungry plants.

Growers have long been aware of the value of wood ash for their plants to induce flowering. Potassium is concentrated in it, brought up from deeper sub soils. Likewise phosphates are imported from all over the world, and can even render very poor heathlands, such as the Sandling soils of Suffolk fertile. Clovers and related plants in crops cycles could take the essential element nitrogen from the atmosphere and make it into a compound usable by plants. Just over a hundred years ago the energy hungry Haber process produced nitrate fertilisers and revolutionised the growing of plants, making vast areas fertile and productive, which were previously sparse but full of their own life.

The people of the world depend on these soil fertilisation processes which are very successful, but they can also have bad side effects. When excess nutrients enter water they tend to change the types of algae that survive there, tipping the balance of life. In some rivers and seas this has caused considerable problems with toxic effects.

Soils seem to have become enriched even without application of fertiliser. This is my observation over forty years at the Pits. Airborne compounds from transport or industry could be a cause.

The celebrated wild flower meadows I talk about are now very rare, so we do what we can on our reserves to create better conditions to for them to thrive.

At Great Holland Pits we have dabbled with grazing by animals in an attempt to deplete the nutrients, and restore the flowers that so many of our invertebrates, animals and birds depend on. After three years of spring and autumn grazing by the Trust's flying flock, I think our sward has improved, though the wet summer of 2012 was not helpful in this respect.





There being no matters arising the minutes were agreed and signed.

KEY LOCK

A discussion took place of the insurance implications of the current procedures in respect of the keys to the hall. This sum included the fixtures and fitting.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The treasurer reported that the balance standing to the credit of the hall's various accounts stood at £12,595.64p as at 28th February last. £5,000 is held on a bond and the remaining funds are on instant access accounts.



BUILDING PROJECTS

Last years projects were, a new boiler and heating system, the cupola to be reinstated, the main roof to be made watertight and the hall to be painted both inside and out. These have all been completed. However the building is now in excess of one hundred years old and will need a lot of maintenance in the near future. Of immediate concern are the windows and the roof over the kitchen and toilets. Sue is to contact the builders at the Dementia project to see if any further assistance is forthcoming. Bearing in mind the funds currently held it was decided that £5,000 would have to be kept in reserve for emergencies and the remainder, together with any outside assistance, could be used in the current round of maintenance.

GAS AND ELECTRICITY SUPPLY

We now have a more efficient boiler and more users yet the cost of gas has remained static and the electricity bills have fallen since we switched both supplies to the same supplier.

CHAIRS AND TABLES

The current supply is sufficient for the moment but will need to be added to in the near future.

CLEANING AND MAINTENANCE

A lengthy discussion took place in the above respect and Tom Sandy was offered expenses for his visits to the hall in respect of maintenance but he declined the offer. It was also felt that where the hall was hires as a 'one off' a member of the committee should be on hand to welcome and explain the workings of the various facilities. They would then come back to lock up when the function was finished. Sheila Watts has kindly offered to do this when she is available. We are to purchase an outdoor rubbish bin to assist in rubbish collection. We are also to obtain a quote from a window cleaner to do the hall every six weeks

SPRING CLEAN

The date of the spring clean has been set for April 13th between 10.30am and 3.00pm and all assistance will be gratefully received.

OTHER BUSINESS

Tom Sandy has finally managed to persuade someone to take away the gas cylinder left behind by one of our users. We have also received a thank you from John Knight for the voucher given to him as a thank you for his long service to the hall. We discussed whether we might try and get the post office to use the hall but it was decided that it would cause more disruption than it was worth. It was also decided that there was no call for a Wi-Fi hot spot at the hall at present but this could be addressed at a late date if required.

NEXT MEETING

The next meeting will be held at the hall on 11th May at 10.30am.

Superfast Broadband in Great Holland

As explained on Great Holland's web site: www.greatholland.com, you can now order Superfast Broadband from your Internet Service Provider (ISP). It will cost a little more. However, in return you could receive download speeds of up to 40 Meg!

What should you do?

- 1) Start by calling your current ISP and ask for a price to deliver you Superfast Broadband.
- 2) Make sure they offer you an FTTC service (Fibre To The Cabinet)
- 3) Go on line and check the price of other suppliers to make sure you're getting the best deal/package.
- 4) Place the order
- 5) They'll need to come and change the BT box inside your home for one with a new face panel (typically two weeks from ordering)
- 6) Hold on to your seat and prepare for Super Fast Internet speeds!


