



The flower festival in All Saints in the middle weekend in July was a great success, and I hope you saw some pictures of it in the Gazette. My thanks, and that from the whole church, to those who did so much for the weekend.

At the closing service, we celebrated a good few days and also God's goodness to us. We thought about how flowers mean so much. It also gives me an excuse to put in two flower jokes...

- If April showers bring May flowers, what do May flowers bring? Pilgrims!
- What do you call a country that drives only pink cars? A pink carnation!

But we also saw that God uses flowers as reminders for us.

#### Luke 12v27-28 says:

"Consider how the lilies grow. They do not labour or spin. Yet I tell you, not even Solomon in all his splendour was dressed like one of these. If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today, and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, how much more will he clothe you..."



As usual, there will no Home Made Hour in August.


Our next Home Made Hour will take place on: Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> September from 10.00-11.00am in the Village Hall.

# Obituary for Captain John Knight Master Mariner in the Merchant Navy

John Knight died on the 7th of May 2016 at the age of 81. He was born in Nuneaton, Warwickshire on 24th June 1934. He had two brothers and a sister and grew up in the Gloucestershire village of Blockley.

John joined the Merchant Navy in 1952 at the age of 18. He obtained his Home Trade Masters Certificate in 1968 and his foreign going Masters Certificate in 1972

John met Pauline on the stairs of an office building in Aldgate East, London in 1963. Pauline was working as a shorthand typist. John was visiting a shipping office in the same building. As he went up the stairs Pauline was coming down. He asked her if there was anywhere decent to have some lunch. She said come with me I'll show you - the rest is history.

They married on 17th October 1964 and set up home in Brightlingsea with their daughter Juliet.

The family moved to Belton and then Bradwell in Norfolk when John started working for Offshore Marine in Great Yarmouth. He worked in the UK coastal waters and then captained supply boats to oil rigs working in the North Sea and further afield in Europe.

During their time in Norfolk they adopted two sons, Tim and Adam.

When John's work started to take him all over the world including West Africa, Saudi Arabia, Canada and Argentina, the family moved to Clacton-on-sea to be closer to Pauline's parents.

John then worked as a marine surveyor for Noble Denton where his job was to oversee the towing, positioning and setting down of oil rigs all over the world.

By the end of his time at Noble Denton he had been promoted to Marine Superintendant.

John left the merchant Navy in 1986 and he and Pauline bought the Great Holland post office and village stores. Due to their hard work and their genuine interest in the village and its people it became a great success. Even now, 18 years after they retired, villagers still talk with great affection about the time John and Pauline ran the village shop.

After retiring John became involved with the running of the village hall. He became a member of the committee and was also the treasurer. He did this for many years until ill health forced him to stop. He was a keen supporter of the village fête and, together with Pauline, enjoyed running various stalls or being on the gate.

John took up watercolour painting and together with Marl Allen was responsible for painting the mural in the village hall. For many years he also distributed and collected British legion poppy boxes in the local area, and was part of the team that distributes Village Voice.

John was also a member of the Tendring male voice choir. He also went along with Pauline to the village carpet bowls club.

His funeral took place at All Saints church Great Holland on the 27th May 2016.

He has been laid to rest in the churchyard, close to the sea.

John will be greatly missed by all his family and friends


## FRINTON WEA

#### Dear Friends,

After an absence of one issue, I am back. We were away at the crucial time for the last issue and in places with patchy internet coverage.

So, the appeal by the developer to build a huge estate off Halstead Road is now over. The Inspector has told us to expect his decision in about ten weeks, around the beginning of September. Keep your fingers crossed, because this decision is HUGE for this area. There are several other huge proposals just waiting the outcome. This one would make a massive impact. Add in the others and it doesn't bear thinking about. I doubt anyone reading this needs to be convinced about the insanity of the proposal, as everyone must have their tale to tell about driving down Halstead Road, except at first light on Sunday morning, which is when the developer took his photos of that road to demonstrate its wide, traffic free qualities! TDC planning officers recommended ACCEPTANCE of this proposal. It was only refused on a SINGLE VOTE at Committee after Ray Enever, Chair of Kirby Residents Association, managed to get members to look again at the impact on the general area. Ray thinks that the Chair of the Committee probably was influenced by the extent of public outrage on this occasion. This says a lot for Ray, but puts TDC to shame for its arrogant stupidity.

What we need is a wider understanding of how such a manifestly lunatic proposal can even get off the ground, let alone have a fighting chance of actual approval on appeal. Well, it all started just a few years ago when planning law was changed. If a local authority does not have a current local plan, it created a free for all in which there is a so-called "presumption of sustainable development". This beautiful phrase means something pretty simple. Development goes ahead unless there are really exceptional circumstances.

What was Tendring District Council's reaction? Well, in its role of The Developers' Council, it made sure by a faultless display of designer incompetence that it did not have a local plan in force. It still doesn't. Well, to everyone's enormous

surprise, every local developer and his dog has jumped on the bandwagon and piled in applications for planning permission that simply would not have had a prayer if TDC had done its job properly and if the Government hadn't decided to dismantle part of the planning system.

Oh yes, I almost forgot! While they were about to deal with 'red tape', they gave developers a right to ask for costs if they win an appeal against a planning refusal. Cash strapped councils are therefore under pressure to say yes, because saying no can be expensive. Surely, the councils can ask for costs too, if a developer loses? Oh no they can't! You don't get it, do you! Keep the planning system, because we all know we need protection from mindless development and we would get pretty annoyed if we lost it altogether. So do it by the back door and skew the whole system in favour of the developer and provide every incentive for councils to be pliant.

So, we need a few reforms to even this game out.

- Developers can and do spend months or years fine tuning proposals. We get
   21 days to lodge comments! Make it three months.
- Developers can appeal against a refusal. No one can appeal against a GRANT of planning permission. Give local residents the right of appeal.
- Abolish the developers' right to ask for costs on appeal.
- 4. Make it compulsory for councils to list and specifically deal with objections to applications.

Unfortunately, even these reforms would not protect local residents from incompetent councils or simply arrogant ones that choose to ignore local opinion. Getting rid of party hacks and replacing them with independent councillors is the only way to do that. Politicians under threat of losing elections listen; the others don't.

#### TENDRING HUNDRED RAILWAYS 150 YEARS

Railways have transformed the economic fortunes of Great Britain's trade and industry as we are no longer reliant on ships ferrying heavy loads around this island coast of ours. Our railway history started with the opening of the Steam hauled Stockton & Darlington Railway in 1825 and was then quickly followed by lines such as the Liverpool & Manchester Railway in 1830, the Grand Junction Railway, the London & Birmingham Railway, the Gt. Western Railway and the Eastern Counties, Eastern Union and subsequently the Gt. Eastern Railway. The High Speed 2 Line Project (HS2) underlines the importance of rail in the 21st Century. The railways made a big impact on Tendring enabling its agricultural produce to reach the cities and they still continue to play a vital economic role today.

To mark the TENDRING HUNDRED RAILWAY'S (THR)150 Years at Kirby Cross Station a short ceremony took place at Kirby Cross Station on Saturday 30th, July 2016 2.30-4 p.m. A plaque was unveiled and refreshments provided. It is anticipated that there will be another civic commemoration during May 2017 to mark the completion of the THR lines construction through to the end of the line at Walton on The Naze.

The "Railway Revolution" came to Tendring when on Saturday July 28th. 1866 the first train steamed down from Colchester to Kirby Cross Station. The Tendring Hundred Railway (THR) Company had been formed in 1859 to extend the line from Colchester (Hythe), initially to Wivenhoe, opening on 8th. May 1863. The construction of the Tendring Hundred Railway (THR) line progressed as far as Weeley by January 8th. 1866, finally reaching Walton on the Naze on May 17th, 1867. However, even then financial problems and other issues made life difficult for these Victorian pioneers.

From the outset the line was operated by the neighbouring Gt. Eastern (Mainline) Railway Company, which had taken over the THR completely by 1888, along with the various connecting branch lines. Branch lines were built by various companies to link Colchester Town (St Botolphs) by March 1866, and to Brightlingsea by April 1866 (the latter station closed under Beeching in 1964). However, the construction of a line linking Thorpe Le Soken with Mistley, as part of an ambitious strategic trunk route linking up with "The Midlands", was started but never finished due to financial and legal disputes. The uncompleted works for this aborted line were abandoned in 1869, with the long siding at Thorpe Le Soken Station remaining as a legacy. Only later was a single track line to Clacton opened in 1882. As Frinton developed, the current "new" station for Frinton was opened in 1888 replacing earlier primitive facilities.

The Gt Eastern Railway was absorbed into the London & North Eastern Railway (LNER) upon the "Grouping" of the nation's railways into four large companies on 1st January 1923 under the terms of the 1921 "Grouping Act". The LNER realigned a section of the line in 1929 between Frinton Station and Walton-on-Naze due to a landslip at the end of Woodberry Way endangering the original route earlier in the 1920's. The LNER was then nationalised as part of British Railways Eastern Region January 1st. 1948. A franchising system, created by the Railways Act 1993, once again has involved the private sector, in the guise of First Great Eastern, then National Express ("One Railway") and currently Abellio Greater Anglia Railways, a subsidiary of Dutch National Railways operating passenger trains on behalf of the Department of Transport's Rail Executive.


The line was the first in the country to be electrified using the ground breaking, for the UK, 25 KV AC system, pioneering the use of overhead wires taking power on 13th April 1959 virtually direct from the National Grid. Through electrified services to London, Liverpool Street, were introduced on 7th. January 1963 and, until 1992, the London services on the line were largely operated by a fleet of British Rail (BR) Class 309 "Inter City standard" 100mph express electric multiple units (EMU). These were then replaced in the 1990s by BR Network South East commuter air-door EMU stock (Class 321) and also by some BR "slam door" open saloon outer suburban EMU stock (Class 312) which had several years earlier been "cascaded" down from elsewhere on British Railways network. The small fleet the of slam door stock had to be eventually replaced by the Siemens built DESIRO EMU Class 360 EMU Trains from August 2003. These were the only completely brand new trains the local lines have seen for many years. The DESIRO trains again introduced innovative technology in the type of "traction motor" used. The last major local capital project was the replacement of a

50 year old life expired signalling system with a new one using colour LED lights, with computerised systems controlled in Colchester's Signal Control Centre completed in 2009.

In the 21st Century the THR still plays a vital role enabling our residents to travel to jobs and educational opportunities in London and other Essex Towns and bringing in visitors, tourists and new businesses. Once again new technologies are making railways a key part of our nation's economic landscape with national passenger traffic at its highest level since the Second World War and with hoped for improvements in infrastructure and services coming as part of the new franchising arrangement. Will Tendring, Clacton, Walton and Harwich also start to reap the benefits? Watch this space!





# River Watch

I have long been interested in rivers, and since I have lived in this area I have always celebrated the Holland Brook that forms much of the parish boundary of Great Holland. There is now a countywide scheme called Essex River Hub, which brings together many groups such as the Essex Wildlife Trust, Environment Agency, Fishermen, Canoeists and interested stakeholders to deal with issues related to the European Union 'Water Framework Directive', which aims to push for improved management of rivers.

Now we are set to leave the EU it will mean I believe that concerned people will have to fight harder to see that our own government does not degrade efforts such as this.

In the 1970's Holland Brook was full of fish, mostly roach and eels. The sluice gate which controlled the drainage into the sea was operated by an Essex River Board employee who lived nearby. Regularly freshwater fish were washed out to sea to perish, but those remaining possibly consisted of the fittest, and certainly grew to good size and were numerous. The sluice gate was adapted and automated in the 1980's, which largely prevented the direct fish losses, but water quality was compromised by an inadequate sewage works at Thorpe Le Soken, and fish declined drastically. Eventually a pipeline was installed to carry the raw sewage directly to the modern sewage treatment facility at Holland Haven, and water quality once again improved. However the water flow was reduced and agricultural run-off caused excessive growth of algae. I recently obtained some water testing kits from the Freshwater Habitats Trust, and recorded a pH of 7.05, nitrates of 1->2 ppm and phosphate at 0.02 -> 0.05 ppm. This means that we should aim for lower nitrate and phosphate levels.

More recently I have been trying to change the Environment Agency policy of the last three years, which maintains a greatly reduced depth during the winter, in an unsuccessful effort to prevent flooding of the marsh. This means that fish are exposed to much more predation in the shallow water, and the fleets which should be teeming with life are exposed to frost action. I have made multiple approaches to the Environment Agency to discuss this problem, and though my concerns were noted and responses were planned, nothing has yet been resolved.

There is now a small group of volunteers who are monitoring sections of the river whose source is some miles away in Great Bromley, and between them they are checking out accessible sections of the river. I have promised to do some monitoring along the river with permission from one of the local landowners, though as with many things I have little time to get anything done. Several other volunteers have been monitoring insects, bird life and signs of mammals such as Otters and Water voles. Courses are available known as 'River Fly' and these can be checked out on the Essex Rivers Hub web site. (http://essexrivershub.org.uk/). An experienced freshwater biologist provides training to recognise the various species present in the water and their significance to water quality.

If you wish to monitor part of the brook or indeed any other local rivers there are details on the web site mentioned in the previous paragraph. In addition note that there is now a Facebook page for the Tendring area of Essex Wildlife Trust (facebook.com/EWTTendringLG/), and if you have local stories or photos of wildlife you are invited to send them to me to include with acknowledgement (rjseago@gmail.com).



#### FROM THE ARCHIVES .....

Firstly, I would like to thank the kind lady who answered my query in the last magazine regarding the reference to "Tom" in the poem. Apparently he was Mr Tom Rouse and resided in Pork Lane.

This time we are looking at street lighting in Great Holland.....

The East Essex Gazette issues of 1952 relate to the Frinton & Walton Council's struggle for the installation of street lighting in Kirby and Great Holland, and the long year's struggle to get it installed:

It was reported in January 1952, 'that parts of Great Holland and Kirby seem to be fated to be left in the dark for some time to come in spite of the efforts of Frinton & Walton Council to hurry up the installation of street lighting by the Eastern Electricity Board'. At the Council's meeting it was reported that the Clerk had written to the Board expressing concern regarding the installation of lighting and requesting that completion of the contract might be speeded up. The reply from the district manager stated that though the matter had again been considered by a higher authority, there seemed no prospect of including the schemes in their immediate programme of work. Councillor R L Mann had been sorry to hear that the electricity authority was not able to carry out their contract as the schemes were very necessary. He felt that, had the Board been in competition with private enterprise, they would have completed the contract.

The Council made a very strong representation about the matter, and had felt that if satisfaction was not received locally the matter should be taken higher, perhaps to the Member of Parliament. Chairman of the Estates and Works Committee, Councillor W J Oxley, stated the Council were in a very difficult position with the Electricity Board who had said the reason for the delay was a shortage of materials and money.

In April that year, concern and strong criticism had been expressed at the Frinton & Walton Council meeting because of the non-completion by the Electricity Board of street lighting schemes at Halstead Road, Kirby Cross, and at Great Holland. The Eastern Electricity Consultative Council had written that, having considered the Board's observation as to scarcity of cable, they were unable to recommend that the schemes should have priority over lighting to new homes. With the cost being borne by the Council and the offer made regarding the cable, which he felt sure could have been obtained with a little effort, this had seemed procrastination in its worst form. It was a matter of public safety. The Council is to continue to press for completion of the scheme.

July brought a promise of lights within the year, 'street lighting schemes for Kirby Cross and Great Holland will be carried out within the present financial year'; it was announced at the

Council's monthly meeting. This followed representations to the Eastern Electricity Board by Sir Stanley Holmes, J. P. In the report of the Estates and Works Committee it had stated that the clerk had been in touch with Sir Stanley asking him to make representations to the Eastern Electricity Board for the start of street lighting schemes at Great Holland and Halstead Road, Kirby Cross. Sir Stanley had forwarded a copy of a letter he had received from the chairman of the Eastern Electricity Board indicating that the work would be carried out during the present financial year.

By December 1952 street lamps illuminated the road at Kirby Cross and at that moment lamps were being installed at Great Holland; but the road between had no street lighting and 57 residents had signed a petition asking that they too might have lighting. The petition had been handed in to the Frinton & Walton Council offices by Mr W Spencer Wilson, one of the residents in the unlighted area. The Council had informed the 'East Essex Gazette' that the petition would be considered by the appropriate committee. Mr Spencer Wilson told a reporter that he thought the question of lighting was vital.

Accompanying the petition was a letter which stated:

"No doubt the Council will recall my letter, published a few weeks ago, protesting that the portion of the roadway from Kirby Cross to The Green at Great Holland was not included in the scheme for lighting. I recommended this to be reconsidered and adjustments be made: we would suggest that all members of this Council who live in areas where there are no lights should investigate themselves. We would recommend that they come to Kirby Cross and walk from there to The Green, Great Holland on a dark, stormy night and see how they proceed. There is no shadow of doubt that after the inspection as suggested this would convince them this is necessary and vital."

Eventually lighting was installed, but not until after much hard work by the Council.

Hello again from all at Thorpe and Kirby surgery. We are now mid-summer season which means that our university students are home, the local traffic has increased but sadly the weather hasn't improved very much. With the wettest June on record behind us let's hope we have a glorious August!

Summer is traditionally a quieter time in general practice however in recent years the demand for services dips less than it used to, in this area we do get a number of visitors that need our services whilst on holiday, usually because they have forgotten their medication-l hope I have reminded our own patients enough to be better prepared for their holidays!

We have had loss of telephone services a couple of times in the last few weeks; this has not been caused by a problem in the surgery but with outside cabling and power networks. This is obviously a great worry to us and as a result we will be having some upgrading of our telephone system at our Kirby Branch which will mean that our receptionists can switch sites if this happens again, there will be no change to our telephone number or procedure but will mean that we can re-locate staff if necessary.

The recording service for ordering prescriptions is continuing to cause some patients worry although the system is working as it should. Patients using this service should have all the information to hand as there is a set time for leaving the message and must state their name clearly. We would prefer patients to use one of the other ways of ordering medication for example on-line or using the repeat slip but as some of our patients live in out-lying areas we have decided not to withdraw telephone ordering as other surgeries have but to have the recording service installed.

With the recent brexit vote we don't know what the future funding situation is likely to be for the NHS and indeed if the electorate had voted to remain in the EU things would still not be certain so as always it is important to use NHS resources wisely, not stockpile medication and only have tests when necessary. It may be of interest to you that there were 155 appointments not attended in the month of June, these appointments were spread across all our clinician's and would certainly have meant some patients attended the walk in centre when they might otherwise have been seen in the surgery. We are continuing to re-educate our patients and are removing some from our list if they repeatedly waste appointments.

The next PPG meeting is 10<sup>th</sup> August, 7pm, Thorpe Sports and Social Club. If you would like to know more about what goes on in the surgery or would like to have your say on any NHS topic this is the meeting for you.
