



Can you help, please?







Dear Friends,

The first thing to do is give a plug for the Village Fete. Please support this important event, even for an hour or so. It is the product of huge amounts of work and deserves everyone's support.

It was pointed out to me that some of my comments on planning problems could be misinterpreted. In particular, I strongly criticised the process by which the large new houses out on the main road were approved. This was done under powers delegated to planning officers, allegedly on the basis of "the emerging local plan", which was dumped soon afterwards. I consider those decisions to have been wrong and not discussed openly and properly, since they had wider planning implications. They are ribbon development which impinges on existing green gaps and set precedents for future applications. However, it seems my wording could have been interpreted to mean there some skulduggery involving the planning officers or even the owners themselves. That was not my meaning and I must apologise profusely if my words were capable of such an interpretation.

It is very important to accept that criticism of a planning decision is not a criticism of individuals and certainly not the owners of the property concerned. We have to view all planning applications in the light of planning principles that protect the long term character of the village. We must support those principles, even if that means opposing applications by officers of the Residents Association. If I make an application which conflicts with these policies, then GHRA must oppose it and I have no basis to get upset because MY plans are obstructed.

It might get boring, but let me repeat those cardinal principles. NO RIBBON DEVELOPMENT, NO BACKLAND DEVELOPMENT, NO DEVELOPMENT OUTSIDE THE AGREED SETTLEMENT BOUNDARY AND EXTREME CONSERVATISM FOR ANY PROPOSAL AT ALL WITHIN THE CONSERVATION AREA.

The reasons for these principles in a village environment are just too obvious to elaborate. What we demand is that Tendring District Council, which nominally has a policy that accords with this, actually applies it, not when it suits them, but consistently, over decades. It doesn't do that and has behaved with blatant inconsistency and blatant disregard for local opinion. Allowing ribbon development out on the main road and now again in Pork Lane has created precedents that every other application in the future will refer to. Now, that is not rocket science and planning officers have understood that since they completed their first months of training. So, it was deliberate, wasn't it? Am I criticising the owners of these properties? Of course I am not. Am I accusing anyone of skulduggery? Of course I am not. This is public, open, bad planning, without regard to local opinion or the long term implications for the village. The planning system balances public and private interests in land ownership and it does not work if it is operated locally by people who simply view it as an obstacle to enterprise. That's the culture of planning in Tendring and they need to address it.

Our beloved local councillor, Robert Bucke, has become the mayor of Frinton and Walton Town Council for the second time. Congratulations, Robert, on a fitting reward for genuine involvement in the community and dogged pursuit of councils and councillors who do not deliver. Hats off to FWTC for electing someone who is NOT afraid to annoy people if that's what it takes! Robert is as far as you can get from a time-serving, sycophantic, party hack and we need more like him.

One little matter that Robert has been helping out on is road closures. It is pretty clear that these are very badly managed. I have in mind the Kirby Road debacle near the bridge, currently Kirby Cross and Manor Road plus umpteen developers digging up local roads. All these closures or obstructions have to be approved by Essex County Council and we are trying to find out on what basis. You would assume there is a piece of paper somewhere that states clearly how long the closure can remain and imposes obligations on contractors to expedite works in an efficient manner, if necessary in the case of heavily used roads, with night time or weekend working. What is obvious is that this does not happen and days go by with no work taking place. I thought the advanced notice for Manor Road, for example, stated it would be closed for a week. So far, it has been two weeks.

I will report when we eventually find out the facts and learn ECC excuses for not monitoring properly (no excuses for pre-judging ECC, the reputation of which is very well established!).

of the ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING on

SATURDAY 13th May, 2017 at 10.30am in the Village Hall

Apologies for Absence

Apologies for absence were received from Hazel Martin, John Poulton, Sylvia Nicoll, Ruth Hoskins, Clint and Sally Strutt, Sue Jenkins, Linda O'Reilly, Sandra Mooney, Robert Caines, Judith and Brian Little, Anne Jones.

Election of Officers

The existing officers were willing to stand again and no further nominations were received for any posts.

Accordingly, -the following were elected unopposed:

Chair: Paul Fletcher-Tomenius Vice-Chair: Robert Caines

Treasurer: Denys and Lindy Strich Secretary: Birgitta Fletcher-Tomenius

Planning Officer: Eddie Forrest

It was announced that Denys & Lindy Strich would be standing down as joint Treasurers at the next AGM and that the Association could not function without a Treasurer. Nominations were requested.

The Meeting agreed with the Chair's suggestion that we record a vote of sincere thanks to John Poulton for his great service as a Planning Officer over the years.

Minutes of the Meeting of meeting 14th January 2017

The minutes were approved.

Matters Arising from the Minutes

There were no matters arising.

PCSO Report

Sergeant Peter Gerard delivered the report on this occasion, it being GHRA's turn for a visit.

Crime rates remain low. There was a report of birds being shot which was not verified, a fallen tree, a fallen electricity cable, two suspicious males (not verified), suspicious females looking around properties (not verified). An increase in vehicle thefts in Frinton was reported, possibly by cyclists arriving along the sea wall. They were targeting unlocked vehicles and residents were warned to secure them at all times. There

was a commercial burglary in Little Clacton Road involving a theft of machinery and a motor cycle had been dumped on the marshes.

Although PCSOs no longer have personal mobiles, 101 is the appropriate number to use and individual email addresses are well publicised.

Sergeant Gerard explained that the reason for non-prosecution of speeding offenders caught by the community camera was that this is insufficient evidence for court purposes. Community Speedwatch volunteers get registration numbers of speeders in Little Clacton Road and warning letters are issued but this is not suitable evidence for prosecution. It I difficult to justify speed enforcement, which is a resource issue.

Sergeant Gerrard confirmed that Trading Standards are responsible for cold calling policy, not the police.

The Sergeant was thanked for his informative report and for dealing with questions from the floor.

Planning Report

Eddie Forrest summarised recent developments. TDC now has a five year supply of land and can be expected to defend settlement boundaries robustly.

Pleasure was expressed at the refusal of the additional property at Great Holland Nursery, the development of land next to The Veldt in Little Clacton Road, the umpteenth attempt to develop next to Mon Reve and the two bungalows in Pork Lane, adjacent to Farndon. In the latter case, an application for a single bungalow was approved. Approval is being sought for an additional bungalow on an extension to the site at 21 Manor Road, adjoining Great Holland Court, and there was inconclusive discussion as to whether GHRA would object. Usually we oppose backland development, but such development has already happened with the two bungalows and Great Holland Court. Further consideration will be given to GHRA's reaction to this proposal.

Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer reported the current balance of £3,380. Income for the year was £609 and expenditure was £117. The latter figure had been greatly reduced by the kind waiver of hall fees by the Village Hall Committee.

The Treasurer provided a breakdown of membership by road and commented that a number of roads had no members at all.

The Treasurer was asked what he considered was a satisfactory reserve. His opinion was that, on past records, we have more than sufficient to cover contingencies.

Date, Time and Venue of next Meeting

The next meeting of the Great Holland Residents Association will be held on Saturday, 14th October at 10.30 am.

Any Other Business

Councillor Jack Robinson asked the meeting whether they supported his initiative to seek the installation of ANPR (Automatic Number Plate Recognition) cameras in Tendring. He considered that this number would give total coverage and all are linked to the Police National Computer. Sergeant Gerard confirmed that these cameras cannot be adapted to monitor speed and enhanced speeding fines remain the main

deterrent. The Treasurer was the only dissenting voice as he considers the system an intrusion on the privacy of citizens, but the majority present at the meeting otherwise agreed.

Liz Oakley, resident in Pork Lane, asked GHRA to support the initiative in asking Essex County Council for a vehicle weight limit to be imposed. Agreement was unanimous.

Volunteers to man the stall at the village fête were requested to contact Sue Jenkins.

The Chair reported the receipt of an e-mail from Linda O'Reilly, explaining that it would not be possible to produce a full copy of Village Voice this time, as a consequence of Sandra Mooney's recovery from an operation and her own indisposition caring for her sick father.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOUNDARY CHANGES

The following press release was issued by Tendring District Council in May of this year.....

COUNCILLORS CONSIDER PROPOSALS FROM BOUNDARY COMMISSION

A public consultation on draft recommendations for new electoral arrangements for Tendring District Council (TDC) has now closed and a response agreed by the Council at a meeting last night.

Plans to reduce the number of councillors from 60 down to 48, with new electoral ward boundaries across the District, were proposed by the Local Government Boundary Commission for England (LGBCE) and the consultation was launched in March this year.

The Council voted to agree to the reduced number of members, however they did not agree with a number of the proposed changes to ward boundaries and have set out their concerns.

It was felt that suitable warding of the District is vital to allow for an appropriate level of electoral representation across the District to ensure effective governance, decision-making and scrutiny.

Once the LGBCE has considered all the responses to the consultation it will then publish the final recommendations in July 2017.

Subject to parliamentary scrutiny, the new electoral arrangements are scheduled to come into effect at the District elections in 2019.

The LGBCE has now responded back to TDC and it would appear that Gt. Holland will have a district councillor representing Great Holland, Thorpe-le-Soken and Beaumont. Hopefully there should/still be a town councillor to represent Great Holland on Frinton & Walton Town Council.

As usual it would appear that the 'powers that be' have little understanding of the local area. One would assume that Great Holland would be linked to the closest areas such as either Frinton or Kirby. Unfortunately we did not have time to raise this matter with TDC before going to print. However, I understand further information is available on the TDC website should residents wish to look further into this matter.

The Tornado Is Coming To Walton



To celebrate the 150th Anniversary of the railway coming to Walton-on-the-Naze, The Tornado, the first steam locomotive to be made in over 60 years, is arriving at Walton Station on Saturday 12th August. Tornado 60163, a world class locomotive launched in 2009, has often been used by the Royal Family and has featured on BBC Top Gear as well as smashing records by achieving 100 mph on the main line.

Once the train has arrived in Walton-on-the-Naze, it will then make five return trips during the day non-stop to Colchester Town. There will be plenty of activities in the town to keep people occupied. Already organised: The Pier is offering free rides on the production on a wrist band that can be collected from one of the five information booths around the town; Walton Maritime Museum will have extended opening hours – 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.; a Treasure Hunt with a £50 prize for the lucky winner; some open gardens with home-made refreshments; a steam traction engine located in the Station Car Park. There will also be entertainment and stalls in Millennium Square and tables and bunting will line the High Street which will be closed to traffic. It is also hoped that there will be classic cars on display at the Naze and fireworks to round off the day as the last train leaves Walton around 9 p.m.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

JANE AUSTEN, THE STEVENTON SET AND GREAT HOLLAND

While researching the church history of Great Holland Dr. Herbert Eiden came across an intriguing connection between the family of an incumbent of the rectory and one of the greats of the early 19th century which he, and the V.C.H., have given me permission to share with you.

Jane Austen, the seventh child of the Reverend George Austen and his wife Cassandra (nee Leigh), was born at Steventon rectory (Hants) in December 1775. Jane spent the first 26 years of her life in the Hampshire parish, with only brief absences at boarding school and on family vacations. Even after she moved to Bath with her father, mother and sister in 1801 she returned frequently to Steventon as a visitor to her brother James, who had succeeded his father as rector there. A network of neighbourly social contacts, frequent visits from relatives and friends, and access to well-stocked libraries were highly conducive to her formative years as a budding writer.

In 1783 the Reverend George Lefroy moved with his young family to the nearby rectory of Ashe. Soon the Austen and Lefroy families befriended each other and Anne Lefroy (b. 1749), Georges wife, invited young Jane to play with her daughter Jemima Lucy, who was four years Jane's junior. Jane later described Lucy as her 'old acquaintance' with a witty and engaging personality, but it was Lucy's mother Anne who, despite the age difference, became Jane's confidant and mentor.

In 1801, at 22 years of age, Lucy married the Reverend Henry Rice, who had just graduated from Christ College, Cambridge and been offered the curacy in Deane, a short distance from Steventon and Ashe. The Austens and Lefroys were acquainted with the Rice family of Bramling in Kent. The formidable Sarah Rice (nee Samson, and, like the Lefroys, of Hougenot origin) had taken over her husband's diverse commercial interests after his premature death in 1797 and became a banker and businesswoman in her own right. Jane Austen described Henry as 'that pleasant boy', but she apparently disliked his mother Sarah, whom she described as a 'narrow-minded woman'.

The first years of Lucy's married life at Deane seemed to have been happy. Her first two children, Henry and Sarah, were born in 1802 and 1804 respectively, but things were about to change. Anne, Lucy's mother, died from a riding accident in December 1804 on the very day of Jane Austen's 29th birthday. Four years later the novelist commemorated her 'beloved friend' in a moving poem. At some point between 1805 and 1807 the Rice family must have moved away from Deane, after Henry's mother could not be persuaded to buy the rectory there for her son, a failing which added to the negative view Jane Austen had of Mrs Rice. Mrs Rice instead acquired the rectory and the advowson of Great Holland for £600 by c.1807

to provide for Henry. However, the Rices did not move to Holland for some time. For more than two decades they led a relatively unsettled life, living (amongst other places) in Cholderton(Wilts.), Maxton(Kent) and Dunkirk(France), in the latter location apparently in order to economize. Henry proved himself increasingly extravagant and spendthrift, often pursuing high-flying but badly thought-out plans beyond his means. According to family tradition he was also a habitual gambler and the family had to be bailed out more than once by Lucy's brothers.

In the meantime, the ties of the Lefroy-Rice families with the Austens had become closer. In 1814 Lucy's youngest brother Benjamin married one of Jane's nieces, Anna Austen (the daughter of her eldest brother James) and in 1819, two years after Jane Austen's death, Henry Rice's younger brother, Edward Royd Rice, became the husband of Elizabeth Knight, the daughter of Jane's third brother, Edward Austen Knight.

In 1821 a personal tragedy struck Henry and Lucy Rice. A year earlier their oldest son Henry George had travelled to Heidelberg in Germany(probably as a teaching assistant at the university there), but fell ill and died before he could celebrate his 20th birthday. A mural tablet at All Saints in Great Holland commemorates him and his younger sister Anne, who died, aged 26, in 1832. The monument features a kneeling, mourning female figure and was made by John Ely Hinchcliffe.

After the rectory at Great Holland was refurbished the Reverend and his family finally came to reside in Great Holland in 1830. However, a few years later they moved to Devon and again left the parish in the care of a stipendiary curate. After Henry Rice's mother Sarah had died in December 1841 there were no further reports of financial hardship; presumably she had left Henry enough money to live on comfortably. In 1860 Henry Rice died, aged 83, in Bath; Lucy died, aged 82, two years later, likewise in Bath. They are both buried at the Lansdown cemetery in that city and commemorated in Great Holland church in a Gothic-style monument by William Thomas Hale. Until their deaths they maintained close familial relationships, for example, exchanging visits with Henry's younger brother and his wife Elizabeth, Jane Austen's niece.

Out and about by bus

The summer brought about a gap in the schedule of Village Voice and coincidentally I as warden of Holland Pits had to operate in a different mode. In early May I was in a particular rush to get to my other reserve at St Osyth, Colne Point. I did not know that the brakes on my cycle were so sharp. I applied them sharply and was thrown over the handlebars. I picked myself up, the bike unharmed and made to carry on to Colne Point but felt a disturbing click in my arm. With no pain I cycled home and went to our threatened Minor Injuries Unit. An X-ray demonstrated a clean break in my lower arm, the ulna. An operation was performed two days later. This went well and I expect to be discharged by the consultant on July 31st.

Now being in a plaster and later a brace, reminiscent to some observer, of Robocop; the flossing teeth and eating with a knife and fork were hindered. I couldn't drive and couldn't cycle. However, I discovered that the bus service is regular and according to my new experience reliable. Colne Point involved a bus ride to Jaywick, followed by a pleasant sea wall walk, For my regular butterfly transect at Martins Farm, I used a Colchester bus and for Great Holland, a 7 or 8 bus to Walton. The pits then required a walk from the Lions Den over the footpaths dividing fields; all very manageable.

General path maintenance was another matter. The mega strimmer I use, known as the brush cutter, was not an option for me, but friends cut the crucial paths just before our open day. The pond dipping event, which I have led over the years, was ably covered by other regular supporters, and this enabled me to flit around to other events, such as the walk where one of our young supporters pointed out some Adders to a group of visitors.

I have for many years carried a compact camera with me, so though the plaster cast and sling were a handicap for photography, I managed to observe and take pictures of things while I was unable to hack at burgeoning undergrowth. One new observation was of the charismatic wasp species called the Beewolf. These could be seen buzzing around the entrances of the nest holes of the numerous solitary mining bees on one of our sandy areas. They catch a bee as it emerges, inject it with a narcotic to paralyse it and then grasp it underneath them and carry it off to their own burrow. They will supply a number of these bees to their nest and lay an egg there, to hatch the following year.

Surgery Newsletter August 2017

News hot of the press this week is that the minor injury units at Clacton and Harwich will remain open but that patients will be diverted from A&E and the Walk in Centre at Colchester back to surgeries and pharmacies for minor ailments that could and should have been treated at home. This will affect those patients that attend the walk in centre and A&E for their own convenience rather than self-treat or wait for an appropriate surgery appointment. Of course appointment demand is always going to out-strip supply and this will be where our 150 wasted surgery appointments plays a big part.

The reality is that there are not enough resources to meet patient demand and so patients not turning up for booked appointments has a huge effect, not only that but patients really need to consider if they need an appointment in the first place. The North East Clinical Commissioning group (CCG) has plans in place to try to manage patient demand; this will mean surgeries linking up (federating) to reduce the cost and spread the load of caring for patients.

There are a regular PPG Forum meetings organised by the CCG held locally where these matters are brought to the attention of patients and opinions sought on how to deliver care closer to home. The CCG favour a 'hub and spoke model'. This is where a central hub will handle calls from patients and direct them to various surgeries (spokes) for their appointments, the minimum suggested patient list size for this kind of operation is 55,000-100,000 and the surgeries can be quite widespread where the appointments may be offered. The partners at Thorpe-le-Soken surgery have opted not to become either a hub or spoke and to continue to provide the best care we can for our own patients within the two sites that we already have. We don't envisage any change for our 7000 patients and having spoken to our PPG about the local plans they are quite clear that they want to keep their care within their own surgery where they live.

More than ever it is important to use the services wisely in order to protect our NHS. As you may already know there is a national shortage of doctors and nurses so creative ways need to be found to manage the need for services, until there is massive investment in the service there will always be demoralised staff leaving due to pressure from patients and directives from government.
