

Rector's article ...

Friday 22 November was the 50th anniversary of the assassination of J F Kennedy. There were many programmes on TV and radio commemorating it. We hear of what might have been if it had been raining that morning and the car had its roof up, if the bodyguard had moved quicker (everyone knows he did the best he possibly could), if the gunman had missed, and so on.

If he hadn't died, how much would he have achieved? How different would America now be? How different would the world be?

Was that the most important event in the past century?

On the same day, also 50 years ago, another man died, also known by his initials. It was C S Lewis. No-one thinks of his death as the most important event in the century, and he would certainly agree. But, he did write about an event more important than JFK's death. It wasn't the most important event of the past century, but far more important than that. C S Lewis was not only a children's writer and English Professor, but a Christian and a Christian writer.

Although not always keen on everything that the Christmas festival brought, he knew how important the event at the heart of it was.

His most famous line about it comes in The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe. There in Narnia it is "always winter but never Christmas."

But the moment Aslan the Lion, his picture of Jesus, appears the snow thaws and Father Christmas arrives.

Christmas is about the arrival of Jesus, the King of the world who makes himself low for others and with it should come a message of joy and warmth.

We invite you to join us in the celebration and hear more of that message.



I am pleased to advise that the Fête committee has decided to make its charitable donation for 2013 to the Village Hall, to be used towards the refurbishments currently being undertaken.



I made this for the first time last year and it was a great success. It is perfect for health-conscious people who still like a Christmas treat, this is dairy-free and full of fruit and nuts.

Ingredients

- 200g walnuts halves
- 100g hazelnuts
- 50g blanched almonds
- 200g raisins
- 100g pitted dates, chopped
- · 200g dried apricots, chopped
- 140g glacé cherries or pineapple
- 100g plain flour
- 2 tsp mixed spice
- ½ tsp baking powder
- 175g dark muscovado sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- icing sugar, for dusting


Method

- 1. Heat oven to 150C/fan 130C/gas 2. Line the base and sides of a 1.5-litre loaf tin (a long thin one is best) with baking parchment. Mix the nuts and dried fruit thoroughly in a large bowl using your hands. Sift in the flour, spice and baking powder, then add the sugar and mix everything well. Beat the eggs with the vanilla, then add to the dry mix, turning everything together well until there is no dry mix visible.
- 2. Turn into the prepared tin and smooth the top. Bake for $1\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{3}{4}$ hrs, then cool in the tin for 15 mins. Turn out, peel off the paper and cool on a wire rack. Dust the top thickly with icing sugar, to serve.

Some of you will be aware that there is a lot of interest in the Great Holland Nurseries site in Church Lane. The site has been bought by a local developer who is moving quickly to clear the site. This is causing a lot of distress and consternation amongst the residents and yet again raises the issue of the over-development of Great Holland.

The Sladbury's Solar Farm application has also been resubmitted under ref. 13/01292/FUL.

The Local Plan is also going to be available for public consultation early next year. This redefines the settlement boundaries over which the previous consultation threw up many objections.

With these major issues going on I will be suggesting an Extraordinary Meeting to give residents the opportunity to voice any queries they may have.

2. Minutes of Previous Meeting

Approved pre-meeting by John Poulten

3. Matters Arising

None from the previous meeting.

Presentation of gift vouchers for a meal at The Ship to John Poulten and Paul Withams in recognition of their services as Chairman and Secretary of the GHRA. Cards will be delivered to them as they were both absent.

4. PCSO Report

Only minor incidents have been reported in the village including one road traffic accident. The PCSO advised that Great Holland remains a safe and relatively crime free area although it is recommended to continue to be vigilant. Officers have continued to monitor speeding in the village and, once again, asked if any members who would like to be trained to use the speed gun should contact them. They are monitoring parking issues at the Lions Den.

5. Treasurers' Report

Present bank balance is £2725.44 and cash of £173.45. There are 45 members. Thanks given to Tim Reynolds for acting as an independent examiner of GHRA accounts for the January to December 2012 accounts. Copies available from Treasurers on request. (PS: At and since the meeting a further 16 residents have joined the GHRA bringing the number to 61 households out of a total of over 400.)

6. Planning

- A. Cllr. Guglielmi was invited to come to the meeting but was unable to attend. He did agree however to answer questions via email. He further promised to keep GHRA informed regarding dates for the Local Plan development and consultation over the next few weeks.
- B. Elm Todd wind turbines given the go-ahead but Windcrop have subsequently gone bust so the project is unlikely to happen as it won't be financially beneficial.
- C. Solar Farm the application has been withdrawn for the time being but it will be back. The efforts of GHRA have not been wasted and the fight will go on when they

- reinstate the application. Thanks were given to Eddie Forrest for the huge effort, time and energy he has put into this fight.
- D. The Paddocks this development was approved because the land is now within the village envelope although the new settlement boundaries have not been finalised in the Local Plan.
- E. Dementia Home apparently the close care flats fall within the same class as a care home. Therefore there is no problem with the developers advertising them as luxury homes. Paul Fletcher will take this further.

7. Post Office

The flat above is being refurbished as a self-contained unit and negotiations are in progress for a new tenant to run the shop and local post office. It is proposed that the Post Office will offer services such as mail, banking and bill payments, but not DVLA or passport services.

8. Any Other Business

- A. Village Fete GHRA presence at the Village Fete was deemed a success. A banner was made and a Treasure Hunt organised. 50% of the funds, amounting to £50.29, were donated to the Church fund. Thanks were given to Louise Goodwin for all her help.
- B. GHRA attended the Methodist Church Fun Day.
- C. Church Lane footpath is overgrown. Mr Williams suggested getting together to clear it but Paul Fletcher has offered. The farmer has blocked access to his field both from Church Lane and The Close. Graham Hughes is looking into this with the Council. The designated footpath is still clear.
- D. Malcolm Graham is no longer joint secretary due to personal reasons (*see below). Help needed for typing duties and Sandra Mooney and Margaret Frere have offered their help.
- E. June Forrest mentioned that the benches, donated from the proceeds of the Diamond Jubilee Celebrations last year, are now in place outside the church and look very smart.
- F. Other matters mentioned were: the shortages of GPs, street lighting being turned off overnight and the hedges have finally been cut along Main Road.

*A volunteer is needed to take on the role of co-Secretary following the resignation of Malcolm Graham as indicated in the minutes- ideally someone who has access to email, is happy to take and produce minutes of meetings and organise the booking of the hall for meetings.

The Village Hall Committee is inviting a member of the Great Holland Residents' Association, as a regular user of the Hall, to join them. This is required as part of their constitution. Anyone who has an interest on taking on this role should contact Lucy Margetts (815014) in order that the relevant form can be completed and signed on behalf of the GHRA.



PROPOSED SLADBURYS SOLAR FARM - Planning Application No 13/01292/FUL

Having withdrawn the previous application, Push Energy has now submitted this new application to TDC for planning permission.

The scheme is the same as the previous one – to erect 48,000 photo voltaic panels on sloping arable fields of 64 acres at the bottom of Little Clacton Road, adjacent to the Holland Brook SSSI opposite Great Holland Common. Again the applicant claims that the development can be adequately screened and will have little visual impact on the landscape; such claims are nonsense. There is little doubt that the site has been selected because it is adjacent to the Cookes Green substation and therefore minimises grid connection costs to the developer.

There is an alternative site in the same ownership, one that would not be so visually intrusive, could be easily screened with additional low hedging, and would avoid despoiling the Holland Brook valley, but it would entail higher grid connection costs to the developer. The landowner also hopes that this alternative site might be designated for housing at some time in the future and is probably therefore reluctant to have it tied up with a solar farm! It seems clear that both developer and landowner are motivated by financial gain with no regard for our treasured landscape.

Opposition to this scheme is not about opposing renewable energy schemes in general but making a stand for siting them appropriately with due consideration for preserving our landscapes.

Such schemes are only viable because of the government subsidies and tariffs paid from our taxes and the premiums levied on our energy bills, and the use of cheap foreign manufactured and imported panels.

In his speech to the Large Scale Solar Conference in April this year, Greg Barker MP, the Minister for Energy and Climate Change said, "where solar farms are not on brownfield land, you must be looking at low grade agricultural land..". The proposed site is not "low grade" but "good" quality arable land, (Agricultural Land Classification 3a), which has grown food crops for years. If you are familiar with the previous application you will know that Push Energy inferred that it was poor quality and "unsuited to arable farming", a blatant misrepresentation. There is a national policy of protecting our good quality agricultural land but this tends to go unenforced when alternative uses are said to be temporary. 25 years will see a lot of us gone!

The Minister also said that the Government wanted to see a lot more solar "but not at any cost.....not in any place.....not it if rides roughshod over the views of local communities"....we must be thoughtful, sensitive to public opinion, and mindful of the wider environmental and visual impacts".

The Rt Hon Eric Pickles MP, Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government has also expressed concern that in regard to, "wind turbines and solar farms insufficient weight is being given to local environmental considerations like landscape, heritage and local amenity", and "the views of local communities should be listened to"

Tendring District planning policies seek to protect and enhance the distinctive local character of our landscapes and such preservation was also the expressed wish of Great Holland residents as recorded in the Parish Plan & Village Design Statement, a copy of which was distributed to every household.

You are urged to lodge your objection to this proposal with Tendring District Council and to that end a letter is included with this magazine for your use. Simply add your address, sign and date it and

post or deliver to the TDC office in Weeley. If you can, a letter of your own is preferable but the "standard" letter is better than no letter at all.

The application can be viewed by following the planning portal link on the TDC website. Simply put the application number, 13/01292/FUL, into the search pane. It is also possible to lodge your objections on line. You can also visit the TDC Weeley office and view the application.



Great Holland Pits Nature Reserve:

Trees: Old and new



Trees have a natural life span. Birches have an expected lifespan comparable to humans. Some trees especially if managed as pollards, that is regularly lopped in a traditional manner, can live for up to a millennium. We have one healthy oak which may be around 200.

However not all trees reach their expected life span. When small trees become shaded by bigger ones they tend to be weak. The storms of 1987 notably removed the two weaker oaks out of a cluster of three, and after a season's growth the storms chaos was difficult to see.


Dead trees have always been a feature of the landscape. They figure commonly in the paintings of John Constable, though it is likely that such a resource would have speedily been removed for firewood. In the 1970's the deadly Dutch Elm disease fundamentally changed the appearance of the countryside around Great Holland. Elm trees tend to reproduce from suckers, so whole stands of trees around the country were effectively clones, like identical twins. They had no resistance to the disease fungus, which spread along the interconnected roots, so nearly all died, including a line of about eighty, which marked the spine of the pits. Nowadays new suckers still emerge, grow with promise until they succumb again after about twelve years.

Now among several new tree diseases brought in to the country with foreign timber products, is the lethal Ash Dieback Disease, or Chalara. Ash has never been a common tree at Great Holland, but a considerable number were planted in Holland Mill Wood behind the original reserve. This year the signs of the disease are obvious in a small proportion of the trees, the growing tips withering and the branching points have taken on a damp stained look. It is likely that the great majority of ash trees here will die as they have in much of Denmark and other parts of Europe. This is a particular shame because Ash casts very light shade and thus encourages woodland flowers and shrubs .

There is hope that a proportion of ash trees will have resistance to the disease, unlike the elms, as they seed prolifically, have more genetic diversity and their offspring will fill in the gaps.

In the Holland Mill plantation we have already seen a natural cull of two of the original species. The Wild Cherry, and the Alder were the two species that got away quickest, growing to seed bearing maturity in about five years. However they started to look stressed, the Alders having weak leaf but proliferating in the number of seed bearing cones, and the cherries dying back. Where these originals died the alders germinated very thickly and formed dense thickets while some of the cherries spread their branches into the spaces left by their neighbours. The result is that the strictly marked grid in which the plantation was laid out has taken on a more natural look, and the age structure of the site is more diverse and robust. In winter much of our life goes into dormancy but we know that the daylight hours start to lengthen at Christmas and new life and vibrancy will follow in the new season.

A CHRISTMAS STORY - 'CAROLS FOR FORTY'

A short seasonal story from "A Village School" by Miss Read:



I shall take you myself for signing this afternoon children as Miss Twigg is at home with a sore throat.

Can I go and open the piano? Can I give out the carol books? Can we sing the new carol Miss Twigg is learning us?

I don't want bedlam either here or in the hall. I am looking for two conscientious and light-footed children who can lead this class at a rational pace from here to the hall door. John, we'll see if you can take responsibility today. And Anna.

Miss Twigg always lets someone go first and open the piano. Are we going to have carols?

Breathing exercises first, dear. All breathe in! Hold it! Out! *Much too much* noise on the 'Out'! — Miss Twigg says that's old-fashioned. She lets us do paper bags. We blow and blow at pretend bags, and then we *do* them, with a bang. Very well. Blow! And again! Bigger still! Now pop! *One pop*, children, is more than sufficient. Miss Twigg's nerves must be in better shape than mine, I can see. All on the floor, sit. There is no need, Michael, to roll about all over everyone else.

Can we have carols now? Miss Twigg always lets us boys give out the books.

All hush! What is this squeaking that is going on? – It's our crepe soles, Miss, Sideways on, Miss, to the floor, Miss. – Then sit still. I shall give the books out from here. Pass them along to the end, child. Brian, don't hold us all up by peering inside each book. We seem to be six books short. Some of you must share. And that doesn't mean a wrenching match, John. You will be left with the nether half of that book if that's the way you handle it. We'll start with 'Good King Wenceslas' if it's in C. All listen quietly.

Miss Twigg doesn't play like that. She always uses two hands.

That will do. Off you go, and anyone scooping 'Fu-oo-el' like a siren stands by me. Stop a minute. Is someone singing bass? – It's Eric, Miss. He always honks like that. Well, Eric dear, it isn't that you aren't trying, but your voice is rather strong, so sing rather more softly, will you?

Do let's have our new carol, Miss. Number ten. – One of those mid-European ones, I see; and unfortunately in five flats. I think it might be better to practise that a little longer with Miss Twigg.

Miss, there's someone hollering outside. – It's Miss Judd, Miss. – Open the door for her then. Perhaps Miss Judd would like to hear us sing a carol? There is just time for one more.

Please can it be our new one? – Would you like to hear it, Miss Judd? I think it would sound better unaccompanied. When I can see faces and not backs of heads, John, and Michael has stopped that silly giggling, and Brian has pulled his carol book down from the front of his jersey, and Richard has quite finished looking at his tongue – I will give you the note.

That was lovely. While you were signing Miss Judd gave me some good news for you. Miss Twigg is much better and will take your next singing lesson. Isn't that wonderful? For all of us.

Carol Singing Pepper Cake

These spicy cakes were traditionally given to carol singers at Christmas. Cakes such as these were known as 'pepper cakes' not because they contained pepper, but because the spices were imported from the East where lands were known collectively as the 'pepper countries'.

1½ lbs flour	
1½ lbs black treacle	
1 teaspoon ground cloves	

½ teaspoon ground cinnamon 8 oz dark soft brown sugar 4 eggs, beaten 4 tablespoons milk

1 teaspoon ground cloves

1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

½ teaspoon ground ginger 8 oz butter

Set oven to 325 F or Mark 3

Rub the butter into the flour in a mixing bowl until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs, then add the sugar and spices. Put the treacle in a small pan and heat gently until melted, but not hot or the eggs will curdle. Mix into the dry ingredients with the beaten eggs. Mix the bicarbonate of soda with the milk until dissolved and stir into the mixture, beating well. Put the mixture into a greased and lined roasting tin, about 10 inches x 14 inches, spread out evenly and bake for 1¾ hours. Cool in the tin for 15 minutes then turn out onto a wire rack to cool. Cut into slices when serving. Store in an airtight tin for a few days before eating to allow the flavour to develop.






