





Love in the language of the heart

As you are aware by now, as a child I lived in communist Albania. I grew up in a culture that didn't allow for belief in God. I grew up in a culture that told me that God didn't exist, and to say otherwise would mean persecution. I grew up with my grandparents' generation keeping secret what they had known about God, or learning to forget about it.

And then the borders opened, and many of my people I knew moved to Greece. We lived half an hour away from the Greek border, after all.

As Greece is an orthodox country, many of the people that left joined the orthodox churches. It seemed people wanted to learn about God, there was something missing.

They needed to go somewhere, but the truth is, generally they didn't understand much of what was happening in the service.

Their Greek was non-existent when they moved there, and then they learnt some of it, but the language that they learnt was everyday language, language about food and about work.

I remember my aunt knowing by heart the creed, and she said it when she was baptised in the Orthodox church. When I asked her what it meant, she could not tell me.

They learnt the language of the church by heart. The creed, the Lord's prayer, Bible passages and other prayers.

And then one day, when I was visiting from the UK, we all gathered together to celebrate Easter, and I said the Lord's prayer in Albanian.

A cousin that was sitting there, listened in awe, and when the prayer was finished, she said: 'That was the most beautiful thing I have ever heard, it meant so much to me!'

I told her that this was the Lord's Prayer, something that she had known in Greek for a long time, but it had never made that impact to her before.

Hearing something of the beauty and love and grace of God, singing to God in your heart's language is so much more powerful than learning something by heart and using the language of another.

And I think that is the point of Pentecost.

Without a doubt, this event changed history as the church of God began.

Without a doubt, this event changed history as God's Holy Spirit came upon human beings, with all their shortcomings, and fears and doubts and joys.

But this day, God communicated his love with the world, in the language of its heart.

And God, our God talks to us, in our language, into our life's experience, not someone else's, ours, because we, you and I, are absolutely important to God.

Let us celebrate dear friends, knowing that God's Spirit was poured out on the day of Pentecost, and has never stopped since.

Let us celebrate dear friends, because God will always want to show you his love that is meant exactly for your life. Amen!



GREAT HOLLAND RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION MINUTES

Of the ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

On SATURDAY 21st May 2016 at 10.30am in the Village Hall

1. Apologies for Absence

Apologies for absence were received from Chairman Paul Fletcher-Tomenius and Birgitta Fletcher-Tomenius, John Poulten, Sylvia Nicoll, Linda O'Reilly, Sheila Watts, Jeanne Large, David Martin, David and Sue Masters, Judith and Brian Little and Frank Felton. Robert Caines, Vice Chairman, took the Chair in the Chairman's absence.

2. Election of Officers

Paul Fletcher-Tomenius (Chairman), Robert Caines (Vice-Chairman), Denys Strich (Treasurer) and John Poulten (Planning Officer) were all willing to continue in post and were duly re-elected. Louise Goodwin and Hazel Martin (Joint Secretaries) wished to stand down, and Birgitta Fletcher-Tomenius was elected as Secretary in their place.

3. Minutes of the Meeting of January 16th 2016

These had been published in the Village Voice and were accepted as a true record.

4. Matters Arising from the Minutes

There were no matters arising.

5. PCSO Report

PCSO Michele Diss was unable to attend the meeting as the meeting had been moved from 14th May to 21st May, but sent her apologies and a report which was read out by the Vice-Chairman:

On 26/1/16: a lorry went into a ditch in Little Clacton Road and the road was closed whilst awaiting recovery.

30/1/16 Male was selling aerial photographs door to door. When asked to leave it is believed that he scratched the victim's car.

6/2/16: 4 males jumped into a garden in Little Clacton Road, supposedly looking for lost dogs – they had been arrested for hare coursing the day before and said they did not know where their dogs

7/2/16: Vehicle stolen from Thorpe station found in Pork Lane. Recovered for forensic examination.

9/2/16: Batteries stolen from exterior compartment of caravan in Pork Lane.

4/3/16: Kirby Road Cemetery: handbag stolen from unlocked car.

30/3/16: Obstruction in Kirby Road: vehicles from building site parked on pavements – builders were spoken to and advised to remove vehicles.

6/4/16: Two-vehicle road traffic collision in Little Clacton Road, with one vehicle ending up on its roof. Traffic attended and dealt with the vehicle drivers.

11/5/16: Suspicious male seen trying to squeeze past caravan in front drive in Little Clacton Road. The male ran off when approached by the property owner.

With the advent of summer, residents are advised to lock doors and windows even if leaving their property unattended for a short while. If going on holiday, arrange for a neighbour to visit the house and move post, etc. Residents are also advised not to employ people who knock on doors touting for work; recently a company called Marshalls has been doing paving for local people, and they are from the travelling fraternity. It is best always to use a company recommended by friends and neighbours.

6. Planning Report

In the Planning Officer's absence, the Vice-Chairman referred to the Great Holland Nursery Development application, which is to be discussed by the Council next month; the general feeling was that the application will be passed. A resident mentioned the path from Main Road to Pork Lane which has fallen into disrepair, and questioned why money was spent putting it in if it was not to be maintained. Cllr. Robert Bucke said he would inspect it, and also mentioned that Network Rail was considering closing the footpath from Blue House Farm to Pork Lane, which crosses the railway line. The Lion's Den was mentioned and described as an eyesore; Cllr. Bucke reported that it is to be partially demolished and replaced by a new house. The dementia home was mentioned; nothing is happening with this development and it is likely that it will be sold on at some stage. The white poles marking the gas mains in the village were mentioned by a resident; it appears that these are the result of an EU Directive and this village is not alone in having them installed. Denys Strich mentioned the proposed development at The Cottage in Church Lane: at the rear of this site are two large garages, one of which has been converted into accommodation. This has been reported to the Council, but no action has been taken. Cllr. Bucke said he thought this had not been authorised, and he will look into the matter; Denys Strich to forward to Cllr. Bucke all the information on this. A resident asked whether these matters warrant a formal letter from the GHRA, as it appears that the Council members on the Planning Committee do not support the parishes which they represent. It is understandable that the Planning Officers consider that they should implement Government guidelines, but Councillors are supposed to act for the people that elect them, and they appear not to do so. The Chairman to be approached to write a letter to the Council regarding this matter. A resident mentioned Lodge Farm and asked whether planning permission had been granted for the developments there; Cllr. Bucke said that permission had been granted some time ago for change of use but the development appears to have spilled over to the adjacent field, and he reported this to Tendring District Council three months ago; this matter is still on Cllr .Bucke's Enforcement Agenda with TDC. The Local Plan will go to a Council Meeting on 5th July and will then go out for consultation. Cllr. Bucke mentioned his concern that Turpins Farm, at the corner of Elmtree Avenue and Walton Road, Kirby-le-Soken, where it is proposed to build 250 houses, has been designated under Frinton, Walton and Kirby Cross rather than Kirby-le-Soken.

7. Treasurer's Report

Treasurer Denys Strich presented his report: income for the year to 31st December 2015 was £960.45 and expenditure was £777.02, which included a net £250 towards the Consultancy Fee for fighting the Great Holland Nursery Development. The closing balance at the bank for the year was £2,772 with a further amount of £97 held in cash, making a total of £2,869 in hand; he mentioned that he still has a stock of Christmas Cards for sale, and if these are not sold this year they will have to be scrapped, which would be a pity. Denys also mentioned membership figures: of 407 households in the village, 108 were members of GHRA at the end of last year, with 28 of those households being of single occupancy. Some roads are under-represented: for example, Little Clacton Road has 51 households with only 10 as members, and Main Road has 42 households with only 6 as members.

8. Date, Time and Venue of Next Meeting

The next meeting will be held on 15th October 2016 at 10.30am in the Village Hall.

9. Any Other Business

a) Progress at The Manor (formerly the Ship Inn)

The owners have invested a great deal of money, time, effort and enthusiasm into bringing The Manor up to a good standard. The owners want to open The Manor as soon as possible, and this will probably be at the end of June. It was mentioned that it would be good if the Village could support the pub.

b) Traffic Signs in Little Clacton Road (VAS signs)

Cllr. Bucke said that he was still waiting for the Council to install the signs as they had promised to do. Cllr. Bucke also mentioned that we now have 6 PCSOs funded by the local Council. The number of community sergeants has been reduced to 2, working 2 shifts instead of 3, working until 10pm only.

c) Volunteers for GHRA Stall at Village Fête

Volunteers are requested to help man the GHRA stall at the Village Fête. Please contact the Secretary. Sue Jenkins has asked for volunteers to help generally in setting up and clearing away at the fête.

d) Tea Party in Village Hall to celebrate the Queen's Birthday, June 12th

There will be a tea party in the Village Hall on June 12th to mark the Queen's birthday, 2pm to 5.30: there will be a cold drink on arrival and afternoon tea will be served at about 3pm and there will be a raffle at 5pm. There will also be light entertainment. Tickets will be on sale (£5) available at the Home Made Hour at the Village Hall and also the tea room at Pork Lane Fruit Farm. Tickets are also available from Sandra Mooney (telephone number 672453).

e) All Saint's Anniversary Service, 11am Sunday 22nd May

There will be an Anniversary Service to mark 150 years since the rebuilding of the Church at 11am on Sunday 22nd May. Refreshments will be served after the service.

f) Bus shelter in Main Road

A resident asked if the Association could press the Council for glass to be installed in the bus shelter in the Main Road, as it would provide more shelter from the cold for people waiting there.

g) Play Equipment for Park

Cllr. Chris Keston reported that funding is being sought from Tendring District Council for play equipment and improvements to the Park; once granted, other funding will be sought – Lottery Grant, etc. Cllr. Keston said that it is hoped to incorporate some parking facilities at the Park, to avoid people parking in Pork Lane. A resident asked whether it is intended for the hedge around the park to be cut for security purposes as originally mentioned, so that children in the Park could be seen, and hoped that if so, the hedge would be cut on the Pork Lane side only. Another resident complained that the hedge obstructed the view of drivers leaving Pork Lane and made exiting the Lane dangerous. Cllr. Bucke said that he was not aware of any intention by the Council to cut the hedge.

h) Potholes

A resident complained that nothing had been done to rectify the potholes in Pork Lane; Cllr Bucke said that 6 weeks ago he drove 2 Highways Officers around the area, including Pork Lane, pointing out the potholes that were in urgent need of repair. Nothing has been done since, and Cllr. Bucke says that he has been told by Essex County Councillor Cabinet Member Rodney Bass that highways are his responsibility, not that of Cllr. Bucke, who says he will continue to report and fight against poor highways infrastructure.

i) Hamilton Road

A resident of Hamilton Road pointed out that the PCSO Report from October 2015 to January 2016 stated that there had been criminal damage to a road sign in his road; this was incorrect.

j) Speeding

A new resident of the Village complained of the speed at which vehicles pass through the Village. It was pointed out that the Residents Association has been fighting for a way of stopping speeding since its inception. The only answer was to have some kind of physical obstruction such as speed bumps, but these were not likely to be installed and in any case were unpopular with the Villagers. GHRA have tried to get a speed camera installed with no success, but it is felt that even if one were installed, from past experience with hand held cameras motorists would not be fined for speeding. The Association was requested to send a letter to the County Council registering the continuing concerns of the residents regarding speeding, It was pointed out that as buses and bin lorries were also guilty of speeding through the Village, a letter from the Association should also be sent to the Bus Company and Veolia. Cllr. Bucke pointed out that Speedwatch members with hand held cameras had been successful in slowing motorists, and perhaps the answer was to have many more Speedwatch team members to do watches out on the main road. Another suggestion was that the present speed limit of 40mph, from the entrance to the Village near Kirby Cross to near Pork Lane, should be changed to 30mph.

A vote of thanks was given to Louise Goodwin (who was also thanked for arranging and providing prizes for the raffle) and Hazel Martin for their past service as Joint Secretaries.

The Raffle was then drawn and the Meeting closed at 11.40am.




- Keep an eye on elderly, vulnerable neighbours, friends and family members and report any doorstep activity to Trading Standards via the helpline on 08454 040506.

HELP US STOP THIS ACTIVITY IN YOUR AREA!









In 1911 an archaeologist named Hazzledine Warren discovered a deposit under the area that is now Clacton Golf course near Jaywick. Primitive flint tools were discovered along with the tip of a wooden spear and the remains of giant elephants, and hippopotamus. The deposits contained evidence that the area had been a low lying marshy area by a river channel and the type of technology in evidence has been used to date similar discoveries in Kent, Belgium and further afield. The technology is described as Clactonian, and the date of the deposits is now considered to be more than 400,000 years. The 'people' living in the area were not modern humans, they were a different species of hominin, a cousin of ourselves, known as Homo heidelbergensis, one which may eventually have evolved into Neanderthal man.

During this time the world was in a relatively warm period between ice ages, while the sea level was low, and the coast was many miles to the north and east of here. The River Thames followed a very different path then, having before this time passed over Happisburgh in Norfolk, but gradually it eased southward until at the time of Clactonian man it was close to Great Holland but was a very different sort of river from those we are familiar with. In ice ages huge amounts of ice were stored further west. When the climate warmed, melting was rapid and created a very wide Thames valley, criss-crossed with unstable shifting islands, banks, meanders and channels, depositing huge amounts of gravels. Furthermore feeding into this valley from the south, was the River Medway of the time. We know this because some of the pebbles we see here have come from Kent transported north by the Medway. I have a small round pebble of Wealden sandstone, found during some digger work at Holland Pits demonstrating this.

We have a good indication of what the landscape was like because deposits from the layer contain pollen samples and the remains of small snails, which indicate river channels in a freshwater environment. Trees present were mostly ones that are still here; alder, hazel, birch, pine, oak and elm amongst them. Such familiar plants as buttercups and rushes suggest a mixed landscape of trees glades and marshes while the sediments are evidence of both still and moving waters.

Some of the animals whose presence has been reliably detected here include straight tusked elephant, rhino of three species, lion, hyena, auroch (the giant extinct ancestor of cattle), bison, bear, beaver and so on. Small mammals were also present. Some of these species are only found in the tropics these days but that does not imply there was a particularly warm climate. The tree species are almost the same mix as we have now in the present interglacial period.

Holland Pits is a former quarry from which the gravels deposited by this ancient proto-Thames river were extracted. Geologists name it the Lower Holland beds. The patchy mix of different sediments laid by this tangle of ever shifting 'braided' channels, made it problematic for ballast extraction. If it had been easier to extract, the parish may have become a series of quarries such as you can see outside Colchester.

YOGA: an ancient science of wellbeing

Yoga has gained tremendous popularity in recent years. So much so that last year marked the launch of the inaugural international yoga day (21st June 2015). The day was celebrated with events held in towns and cities across the globe, bringing the message of yoga to a wider audience.

But what is yoga, exactly? Perhaps an image of someone stretching themselves into strange postures comes to mind! Yoga can be thought of as a 'toolkit' to help us find balance within our lives. Suitable for everyone regardless of religious belief, age, gender, etc. it is a truly universal practice. For those who adopt principals of yoga it becomes integral to daily life. Broadly categorized into four paths:

Why practice yoga? The multiple health and wellness benefits in themselves are surely a good enough reason to try yoga, even if we're not looking for enlightenment! Findings of modern science are now supporting many of these powerful claims. Here are just a few great reasons to try yoga:

- Strengthens the heart. Like any aerobic exercise, yoga helps to give the heart a good workout.
 In addition, the inverted postures allow gravity to supply the heart with a rich supply of blood.
 The heart muscle is then stretched, allowing it to pump blood more efficiently with each beat.
- 2. Yoga is a holistic exercise. While many exercises may only focus on the muscles or the heart, yoga is designed to strengthen the entire body. The postures work on balancing internal systems such as the digestive system, nervous system, and endocrine system.
- 3. **Promotes self-healing.** Yoga helps us to control stress, a risk factor in many major diseases. By working on difficult emotions, yoga also targets the root cause of many health issues. Balanced emotions lead to healthier lifestyle choices which in turn reduce our risk of disease.
- 4. **Exercises the spine and supporting back muscles.** This helps to strengthen the back against injury, correct misalignments from poor posture, as well as maintain overall flexibility.
- 5. **Muscles and joints.** Postures use the body's own weight to help condition and strengthen the muscles. Keeps the joints mobile and promotes fluid circulation in the joints.



FROM THE ARCHIVES

THORPE AND KIRBY SURGERY NEWSLETTER-JUNE 2016

Hello again from everyone here at the surgery, finally we is seeing some warmer weather which unfortunately will mean more traffic on the local roads. Traffic and parking has always been a concern at both sites and we continue to receive complaints about parking from our neighbours, there is not much we can do to improve car parking facilities so I hope our patients will park sensibly.

Another problem that we continue to battle is missed appointments at both surgeries, there were 139 missed appointments in April-55 of which were for a doctor, 22 booked less than 24 hours ahead to see a matron, 27 for the practice nurses and 35 to see a healthcare assistant. Most patients are shocked by these statistics and I am continually asked what we do about it as a surgery. Unfortunately we are not allowed to charge as has so often been suggested by patients but I do write to repeat offenders and we are able to ask people to leave the list. At a time when NHS resources are so stretched this is an almost criminal waste and could be totally avoided if folk rang to let us know they are not able to attend.

At the recent PPG meeting there was concern raised about our lack of appointments and the fact that patients are attending the walk-in-centre if they feel that their matter cannot wait until the next available appointment at the surgery. We do now have our new Practice Matron Zoe Evans working alongside Amy Sutherwood and both are now offering same day appointments and home visits for our very sick patients, so we are back to full strength. Dr Carla has reduced her working week to 2 days, this does mean that she is booked up a considerable amount of time in advance and this alone can lead to patients forgetting to attend their appointments. Of course with 77 appointments for either a GP or same-day treatment wasted this means that were effectively wasting 75% of a full-time doctor and around 50% of a full-time nurse.

We also had a speaker at the PPG meeting, Trevor Norris, Director from Tendring Community Transport. He is making a case for funding for a hospital hopper bus to run from Walton through Kirby, Thorpe and Weeley to Colchester General. The service would be available to anyone who has an appointment or is visiting a friend or relative at the hospital, the cost is £7 per journey. The service already runs from Clacton and the hope is it could be extended, the buses are already available but funding is needed for the drivers. Trevor has asked us to collate a petition for funding from Essex County Council, next time you are in the surgery add your name to the list if you feel this would be of benefit to the villages.

We have expanded the services for on-line access to patient records in accordance with new guidelines, if you would like access to your medical record ask at reception for a PIN. The PPG plays an important part in helping us shape our services to patients, if you would like to join this friendly team contact ppg.thorpesurgery@nhs.net
