







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

On June 14th there are celebrations in Kerala, South West India to celebrate the 195th birthday of Henry Baker.

100g caster sugar 3 tbsp plain flour 50g hazelnuts 100g dried fruit mix

150g milk chocolate

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°c
- 2. Heat butter and sugar until dissolved
- 3. Mix in flour, nuts and dried fruit
- 4. Put teaspoonfuls of mixture on to lined baking sheet (widely spaced)
- 5. Bake 10 mins. Allow to cool on tray
- 6. Spread melted chocolate on flat side
- 7. Leave to harden


The monthly activities up to the summer are:

Great Holland Pits Nature Reserve:



All A Buzz

The weather is bright, some of my favourite flowers are blooming, summer birds have arrived and butterflies are emerging. I hesitate to write therefore about the following issue.

As a person thrilled with nature, I originally became interested in plants, because they remained still long enough to be looked up. Through a succession of other interests I recently resolved to try to identify and study bumblebees. I made some faltering progress last year, and became familiar with their steep decline, and the similar situation for honey bees.

The recent news is that the European Union has banned for two years the use of neonicotinoid pesticides, (neonicos), on certain crops, against the votes of the UK government.

This class of insecticide, similar to nicotine in some respects has been developed since the 1980's and increasingly used in the last 15. Tests identified that neonics were safer than alternatives for mammals, and particularly effective against insects, disrupting their nervous system. Standard testing was applied and passed the tests for not **directly** killing honey bees by normal use. Neonics are often applied to seeds before drilling, and the chemicals are taken in to the plant where they provide protection from insect attack. What was not tested were sub-lethal effects on honey bees, or effects on other pollinating insects.

The use of neonics coincides with a steep decline in pollinating insects, though of course many other factors may have been the cause. Several countries in the world have installed partial bans on the use of neonics, and a coalition of parties in America are suing their Environmental Protection Agency for not conducting adequate tests. The EU 2 year ban, which will start next year, is partial, as it will only concern crops which are insect pollinated, and which are spring sown.

In my view the British government who opposed the EU ban gave incorrect reasons for their opposition. While it is true that the tests that connected problems for bees was done in the laboratory, and therefore may not apply to the open field, it is not relevant to say that the outdoor tests were inconclusive. This is because the tests conducted were compromised by the fact that control groups were demonstrated to have picked up neonics from nearby fields. In the UK it is said that the use of neonics was so universal on rape seeds for example that untreated seed could only be found for one trial in the survey, but this was also to close to treated fields. This in my view is not a legitimate reason to continue with the status quo.

Apparently the two year ban is not long enough to conduct all of the necessary study on this matter. Clearly tests were done on these chemicals according to a protocol which seemed adequate twenty years ago, but it is this protocol which has to be refined.

Meanwhile for the second year I am growing a section of red clover on my allotment which last year encouraged a nearby nest of bumblebees. I still puzzled over identification.

Item 4 - Treasurers Report:

Denys Strich advised that following the decision in May 2012 for the GHRA to become dormant whilst new Officers were found, little activity had taken place in the account and subscriptions had not been collected from residents.

Notwithstanding this, 5 residents had failed to cancel their Bank Standing Order payment and had therefore contributed for 2013.

£2,716.54


PostScript:

Item 6 - Election of Officers:

Lucy Margetts offered her services as Chair of GHRA.

Lucy stressed that her day to day commitments are such that the residents would need to agree to share the load of investigating / acting on more in depth matters arising. It was generally agreed that this was an appropriate expectation and that the role of the Chair would be to co-ordinate responses of a sub-group and act as the focal point.



David Masters offered his and Malcolm Graham's joint services as Secretary. Sandra Mooney offered her services in typing should that be of assistance.

Deny & Lindy Strich offered their services as Joint Treasurer.

All nominations were put to the members and the appointments confirmed.

It was confirmed that the Officers formed the Committee, together with the Street distributors / representatives.

Various votes of thanks were given to:

Item 8 - AOB:

Dementia home:

John Poulten and Robert Bucke provided a review of the visit made to the care home and covered:

- The quality of the build / finish.
- The parking & transport arrangements of staff and residents.
- Work undertaken to address the flooding of the road (installation of two 'balancing ponds')
- Installation of a bus stop.
- The opening date

John finished by reminding residents that the development was open to visitors most weekends – and anyone was able to take a similar tour of the facilities.

Tree Pruning:

David Masters provided details of a firm who have been appointed to prune trees from power lines. UK Power Networks appear to have been reducing trees to ground level in preference to repeated pruning. David and Robert Bucke have escalated the matter with the relevant authorities and believe the firm have amended their working practices.

David reminded members that unless the work relates to an immediate safety matter, residents have the right to refuse access to anyone seeking to prune trees.

Sandra Mooney requested David write an article for the Village Voice magazine, to highlight both the problem and solution.

Village Shop:

It is understood that negotiations are continuing with the Post Office on whether they will support the re-installing of a full, fortress post office at the site of the Village Store. The outcome will influence the re-opening of the Village Store as it has a direct effect on its viability as a business.

Broadband:

Paul Withams reminded residents that Super fast broadband is now available in Great Holland for residents on the Frinton Telephone Exchange. Details on how to benefit from the service (up to 40 times faster than standard broadband) are available on the village website www.greatholland.com

Marie Curie Donation

John Ratcliffe thanked residents for their kind donations to the Marie Curie appeal. The sum of £150 had been raised from his annual door to door collection, an amount which Marie Curie noted was five times higher than would be expected from a road of that size.

A MESSAGE FROM THE NEW CHAIRMAN

I moved from Wivenhoe to Great Holland in 2004. We needed a larger house and, with 4 young children, a garden (we only had a strip of cobbles where we were). I hadn't really anticipated a small holding! Still, here we are, nearly 9 years on, with cows, horses, chickens, geese, etc. I used to be the Chair of Governors at a Junior school in Wivenhoe and believe that I have something to offer. Little Clacton Road has stunning views across the valley but it is quite isolated in that it is impossible to walk/cycle/ride along it with any modicum of safety and so it's been a slow process meeting people in the village.

When I saw that GHRA could disband, because no one was prepared to take on the roles of Chair and Secretary, it seemed a shame that the only central thing left would mean any battles to save the unique landscape of our locality would become even (more) lonely. I have only ever attended one or two of the meetings but the thought that there would be no "collated" information in the village magazine was a sad one. I read every issue and often refer back to them, either for contact names, activities, or news.

The pressure is mounting to build more homes and install more renewable energy sources without proper consideration for the impact on neighbourhoods and the ever shrinking countryside. Therefore I am happy to do what I can to keep GHRA going. It shouldn't just be about battles though; it should be about bringing the whole village together so everyone has a voice on matters that are important to them. I hope this will inspire you to join GHRA and if there is anything you would like to discuss at the meetings, please don't hesitate to contact me.

LOCAL NEWS

TREES AT RISK IN GREAT HOLLAND

In late April, contractors were engaged in tree clearance close to overhead power cables in our local area.

The power networks company and their contractors have the authority to overrule local councils and pro-actively clear vegetation from overhead power cables or remove trees, even in conservation areas or where trees are protected. The balance of priority between the contractors' objectives and the appearance of trees and the effect on birds seems clearly biased towards clearing as much vegetation as possible.

Cllr. Robert Bucke has reported several important mature trees have recently been <u>removed</u> from the churchyard in Lower Kirby by this policy. Many mature trees in Great Holland also appeared to be threatened and, when Malcolm Graham contacted U.K. Power Networks, he believed several complaints had already been made against the contractors.

We have now been assured by U.K. Power Networks that future tree clearance will only be authorised where overhead power cables are damaged. Any "Tree and Vegetation Clearance Consent Forms" issued by U.K. Power Networks may now not be actioned. Please consult Great Holland Resident's Association (G.H.R.A.) if you have any concerns.

Ironically in a report commissioned by Tendring District Council in 2008 to support the Great Holland Village Design Statement, the authors, "the Conservation Studio", highlighted the quality and variety of trees in the village and recommended that overhead cables should be routed underground.

UPDATE ON VILLAGE STORES AND POST OFFICE

The Post Office (PO) are insisting on changing it to a "Post Office Local" which briefly means it would be run from the shop counter rather than behind a fortress. Unfortunately they pay on commission only. Their estimation of the income from past records would be circa £5000 per year. This would just about pay the business rates. We need an established Village Shop for it to work alongside. We have tried very hard to get them to change their mind or to give us 2/3 years as it used to be, enabling a new tenant to re-establish the shop.

We do have a Postmaster very keen to take on the tenancy and have had, even before we took possession, but as you can see from the above figures, we are struggling at the moment. We are not giving up and are as determined as ever to re-establish the PO.





FROM THE GT. HOLLAND LOCAL HISTORY RECORDER

In this issue we are looking at one of the 'gems' from Charles Hicks' diary.

It seems appropriate to look at his report concerning the weather and how it really has changed very little over the last two hundred or so years. Charles Hicks recorded in 1802 that there had been frost and snow from the 13th to 18th of May. In 1814 frost set in on Christmas Eve and lasted 14 weeks. The Thames was frozen over and a bullock roasted on the ice. Wild fowl were so numerous along the shore they were frequently heard up at the Hall, the noise much like a pack of hounds at a distance. "The harvest of 1824 was principally a wet one; the barleys were badly got up. I sold some at Manningtree of a bad colour and out of condition (he records) at 47s per qr. in Nov" This price would not have been obtained but for the existing Corn Laws.

In 1837 he states, "Violent colds and influenza generally prevailed throughout the Kingdom during January. Nearly half the inhabitants of London from illness could not attend business. Many mercantile houses experienced great inconvenience in consequence of the non-attendance of principals and assistants. One hundred and thirty clerks at the Bank of England absent one day. On the 20th of January ten men and two boys were absent from their work at Gt. Holland Hall from influenza. March the 25th was the coldest day experienced this winter. Very cold weather from 3rd to the 9th of April. On the 4th the frost was so severe the pumps were frozen. The ground was covered with snow on the morning of the 6th, 9th and 12th April. Great demand for all kinds of food for cattle and sheep from the backwardness of the season. The bark would not run and timber could not be felled in Hall Wood before the 1st of June. The wheat ears just began to show themselves on the 1st of July."



The year 1840, on the 15th October, "It rained in torrents all night and continued without intermission up to Saturday night ... On the Sunday morning there was never known so large a flood. The top of the posts and back of gates were seen just above the water."

Again, in 1860 he describes, "An unusual quantity of rain fell, both winter and summer. The land was so wet, even in summer the horses could not get on the land to plough or cart sometimes for days. The corn grown was never known of so bad a quality, it told seriously on all heavy lands. The quantity per acre and the price both bad; some farmers were entirely ruined and others so bent they never got straight again. The following year was nearly as bad, the quality better. The heavy land farmers had cause to remember the years 1860 and 1861."

Maybe our weather now is not so bad after all!


