

Rector's article ...

This month I want to highlight Harvest, something many of us either take for granted, or simply forget about.

As a church we don't want to do that and so we'll be remembering Harvest and the wonderful ways that God provides for us at our morning services on Sunday 6 October.

My encouragement to you is to come and join with us as we do that. Our services will be for all-ages, simple and family friendly.

As usual, as part of the service, we all have the chance to give our harvest gifts.

This is a symbol and recognition that God gives to us, and a chance also to be just a bit like him, giving generously and supporting others.

This year we plan to support two different initiatives with our gifts.

The first is the Walton and District Community Foodbank.

This is a voluntary organisation originally set up by Walton Churches Together and now run by many different members of the community.

The primary mission of the Foodbank is to give Emergency Food Aid to those in financial distress. It covers the area of Frinton, Great Holland, Kirby Cross, Kirby le Soken and Walton on the Naze. Those who approach one of the partner organisations can collect a Foodbank Voucher and then exchange it for a Food Parcel.

The FoodBank looks for support from people to help and also the provision of non-perishable food to go into the parcels.

The second organisation is **Tools With A Mission**. Tools with a Mission enables people to earn a living and to support themselves.

In many countries of the world people have few skills, little education and no means of earning a living. A switch from aid dependency to self sufficiency is impossible without help.

TWAM started twenty seven years ago, and has since then provided this help by collecting and refurbishing tools and equipment no longer required in the UK and sending them overseas.

So, we're collecting hand tools in whatever condition.

We hope that we'll be able to support both organisations well this year.



Gingerbread men

Gingerbread Pre-school has now been open three weeks and all is going well. We have a fabulous group of children who are very lively and enjoy learning through play. One of their favourite activities is baking and we had great fun with these biscuits last week.

Ingredients

- 350g/12oz plain flour, plus extra for rolling out
- · 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
- · 2 tsp ground ginger
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- · 125g/4½oz butter
- 175g/6oz light soft brown sugar
- I free-range egg
 - 4 tbsp golden syrup

To decorate

Method

Sift together the flour, bicarbonate of soda, ginger and cinnamon and pour into the bowl of a food processor. Add the butter and blend until the mix looks like breadcrumbs. Stir in the sugar.

Lightly beat the egg and golden syrup together, add to the food processor and pulse until the mixture clumps together. Tip the dough out, knead briefly until smooth, wrap in clingfilm and leave to chill in the fridge for 15 minutes.

Preheat the oven to 180C/350F/Gas 4. Line two baking trays with greaseproof paper.

Roll the dough out to a 0.5cm/¼in thickness on a lightly floured surface. Using cutters, cut out the gingerbread men shapes and place on the baking tray, leaving a gap between them.

Bake for 12-15 minutes, or until lightly golden-brown. Leave on the tray for 10 minutes and then move to a wire rack to finish cooling. When cooled decorate with the icing. **ENJOY!**

Why do we rejoice at Harvest time?

Many of us are not directly linked with harvesting. The closest we come to the harvest is the fields we look at, the smell in the air, and any friends that we have that are farmers.

We like the fact that we can go to our supermarkets, or local grocers, or local butchers, and get all that we need, without having to get dirty for it. I for one am very grateful. I have tried my hand on working on the field, and didn't like it one bit. Being out on all weather conditions, getting blisters in your hands....

Harvests have been celebrated from the ancient times. I can imagine, people overwhelmed by the goodness of the earth, by the provision of God, couldn't help it but give thanks! They were happy, they were grateful, they knew that they could face the winter, so they celebrated!

There are many passages in the Bible of people being thankful, of people rejoicing because of what God had done. But we also read in the Bible that in face of difficulties, the same people that had praised God for his provision and protection, started to blame God. It seems it is the human thing to do. Where more clearly to see this then in the book of Exodus?

We humans tend to forget the beauty and the greatness of God, either because we take it for granted, or because life gets hard.

Recently, I watched the 'About time' film in the cinema. The film was about a man and his father who could travel back in time. The man chose to travel back in time for love, and love only. He found a woman that he loved, and he created a family. And when his father died, he said to his son: Live your daily normally, with all its ups and downs, with all its routine, and frustrations, and then when you come to the end of the day, travel back to the beginning, and live it again, but now, take time to find some beauty amongst it all and be grateful. And the boy did just that to start with and then he said: I don't live one day twice now. I decide to notice the beautiful things in the ordinary the first time round.

Because the most beautiful thing for us to know is that God is with us, and considers us so important that he chose to come amongst us in Jesus, to live, die and be raised again, so that we can have life with him, and life in the fullest. Let us do just that! Live our life in the fullest, as we enjoy all that God has given us. Amen!



48,000 SOLAR PANELS TO BLIGHT THE HOLLAND BROOK VALLEY! Planning application 13/00775/FUL

This proposal was mentioned previously in the magazine when, in November of last year, the applicant, Push Energy, presented a public display of their intentions, in the village hall. It is now a live application(*) lodged with the planning department of Tendring District Council for consideration.

In a nutshell, the applicant, in conjunction with a local farmer, wants to cover 26 hectares (64 acres) of arable fields, which have hitherto been used to grow cereals and other crops, with 48,000 photo voltaic panels to produce "green" energy. The site is sloping and incapable of screening from public view. This is a bad choice and this particular site is being pursued simply because it is adjacent to the Cooks Green substation which minimizes the grid connection costs and maximizes the financial rewards to the developer. It is the government subsidies, funded by the taxpayer and from the premiums levied on our energy bills, which provide those rewards, together with the cheap imported panels from China.

Frinton & Walton Town Council and Little Clacton Parish Council strongly oppose the application and to date there have been some 50 letters of opposition lodged with TDC plus a petition of around 120 signatories. Most object on the grounds that this site is totally inappropriate and there are better locations. Also the Energy Minister has stated that whilst solar energy should be encouraged that does not mean at any cost, the views of the local communities must be considered and our best and most versatile agricultural land protected.

This siting, on the valley side adjoining the Holland Haven SSSI, would despoil the valley of the Holland Brook and would be a visual disaster, besides setting a terrible precedent contrary to local planning policy which seeks to preserve and enhance the District's landscapes.

It is not too late to add your voice to the opposition and to let our planners and councilors know that we do not want renewable energy schemes sited inappropriately.

Great Holland Pits Nature Reserve:

Summer; A time to marvel



The weather this year started in an unpromising way. The lengthy spring was cold, and for me, work was more demanding than usual. I had less time to prepare the garden, and less time to look around. Now semi-retirement is in sight, and the warm summer and easing of work pressure has delivered me more time to enjoy the natural world.

Many of the insects that I like to observe started their season scarce, unsurprisingly as the cold east winds relentlessly chilled the air. The early brooded Common Blue, Green Hairstreak, Small Copper and Brown Argus butterflies were scarce, the last two not seen in their first brood.

However spring eventually broke, heralded by a lot of bumblebees. A new species has colonised the UK recently, the Tree Bumblebee, and for a while I was seeing them widely in towns and at the pits. Unlike most bumble bees they nest in holes in trees. Look out for them next spring taking over nest boxes. They are easily identified as they have a clear three tone colour scheme. Ginger, Black and White from front to back.

I started to note rather more caterpillars of the Small Tortoiseshell butterfly. Eggs are laid near the top of suitable nettles. The tiny hatchlings first make a web around the tip of the nettle which can be seen once the observer is familiar with them. The caterpillars start quite black as they grow, and are easier to spot as they start to denude the nettles of the top leaves. Unlike the similar Peacock butterfly they develop a light cream stripe, and eventually disperse and find some sturdy shrub to pupate on. 2013 has proved to be the best year for them for years. They went on to have a second brood and they will be joining their cousins the Peacock butterflies finding Ivy, hollow trees or sheds to spend the winter in.

Two immigrant species from Europe have also done well, the Painted Lady, a species from the Atlas Mountains of Morocco, which breeds on thistles, and the wonderful golden Clouded Yellow, a species from the Mediterranean, which lays eggs on clovers. I hope as I write that there may yet be a hatching of these in October as I have observed mating behaviour in several places, though their success is likely to depend on clement weather.

Hot years tend to make species get restless and 'leave home', they fly off to new sites. There have been reports of two rare butterflies this year doing this, the Silver Washed Fritillary, and the White Admiral, one of which was reported at Holland Pits. I hope that it and perhaps one or two others will have laid eggs on some of the honeysuckle at the pits. One insect the Long Winged Cone-head, a bush cricket, displayed this wander urge at the pits. The warm conditions caused some of them to develop longer wings than usual, possibly influenced by the extra numbers hatching. I observed some with a colour change from the usual green to a straw colour, readily flying.

The summer will give way to autumn with the arrival of a different set of birds and the season of work at the pits.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

Guy Fawkes on the Green

As this issue covers November what could be more apt than relating an incident that arose in October/November 1937.

It was stated in the paper of 16 October 1937 that the young people would have their bonfire as usual. When the bonfire material was cleared from the village green on the instructions of the surveyor of Frinton and Walton Council, in preparation for the planting of Coronation trees, much indignation was expressed by the children. Councillor Peachey of Great Holland, however, said that the bonfire would take place as usual but on some nearby site.



At the Frinton and Walton Council meeting the following week, the surveyor reported the circumstances surrounding the removal of rubbish from the green and the instructions that had been given to him. The Coronation Tree Planting Committee were suggesting to the Council that the hedges surrounding the green should be grubbed up and the green kept in a more tidy condition than in the past. It was recommended the hedges should be grubbed up and that in the future no fairs should be allowed on the green.

Referring to the green, Councillor J.W.Eagle, chairman of the committee, said it would be within the recollection of the Council that the removal of what was indeed to have been a bonfire had caused a certain amount of heart-burning in that ward. The surveyor had seen what he thought to be a heap of rubbish and had it removed, forgetting that the anniversary of Guy Fawkes and the gunpowder plot was coming along.

Since the meeting of the committee he had been to the site with Councillor Peachey and, having regard to a point he raised, he thought it would be better if the recommendation were referred back, particularly to the grubbing of the hedges.

The Council rectified their mistake and stated that the children's annual bonfire, about which considerable public feeling had been aroused, would go ahead on November 5th on the green as usual. They also sent along some further fuel as a substitute for what they had removed which much pleased the children.

Most people who call at your home will be genuine but it's important to be on your guard and remember there are bogus callers about. These are people who turn up unannounced with the intention of tricking their way into your home to steal. Too many people have been fooled into letting callers through the front door only to discover their valuables have been stolen while they were distracted.

Identification

Always be sure the caller is who they say they are before letting them in. All genuine callers will have identification and won't mind you asking to see it.

44 Don't let anybody in your home that you don't want there. It's about common sense. If you don't like the look of them, don't let them in. 39

Representatives from water, gas and electric companies are unlikely to call at your home without an appointment and police are likely to be present if there is a real emergency.

If you don't want callers in your home, tell them. If they fail to listen you should contact us.

Advice


Most people who call at your home will have a genuine reason for doing so but by a few simple precautions you can protect yourself and your home. Follow our advice to stay safe:

- Don't be frightened to ask for identification and always check it carefully. If you're not sure, ask them to come back another day.
- Think about installing a door chain and use it. Keep the door on the chain until you've seen identification.
- If you need your glasses to read the identification, close the door before going to find them. Don't leave the door open and unattended.
- · Remember to lock the back door before opening the front.
- Don't be pressured into letting someone into your home if you have suspicions.
- Don't keep large amounts of cash in the house.
- Don't believe scare stories. Not all callers are genuine.




COOKERY CORNER WITH THE FAT GOOSE

Spiced Pear Chutney

Ingredients

750g pears, peeled and diced
1 large onion, peeled and chopped small
120g peeled weight bramley apples, grated
80g root ginger, grated
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon nutmeg
500g tomato passata
300ml cider vinegar
30g caster sugar
80g sultanas
Juice and zest of two oranges



Method


Put sugar, onion, zest, spices, vinegar, ginger, apple and pears into a preserving pan or large saucepan and simmer for about 30-40 minutes until soft. Then add the passata and sultanas and simmer for another 30 minutes. Pot into jars or store in the fridge for immediate use.
