


THE SHIP INN

Dear Friends and Neighbours,

Following the abrupt departure of Bernie Smith from the Pub on 12th September, I write to tell you what is happening.



My name is Jacqui Omer and for some time now I have been the Manageress here at The Ship Inn. I have just signed a tenancy agreement with the Brewery and by the time you receive your copy of Village Voice things will have changed here – for the better!

My background is in the Licensed Trade with over 30 years experience. In particular I know my beers and, rest assured, we will never run out of draught beer again. Although not a Chef by training, I also know how run a Pub that sells food at reasonable prices and that is consistently and well cooked.

I am very conscious of the fact that since Mike and Elaine left The Ship Inn it has not been run in a way that satisfies local residents. My intention is to re- establish the pub's reputation in the Village and the wider district, as one where everyone can visit and be welcome, sure of receiving good food and drink in the right atmosphere.

Specifically we are reverting to a cheaper, more basic menu that I feel is more to local taste. Steak Nights are back every Wednesday. Curry Nights have moved to Thursdays and Fish Nights are every Friday as before. The prices are close to what were charged by Mick and Elaine and offer great value for money.

Obviously I will carry on the tradition of supporting the Village. The Charity nights will continue, along with entertainment, darts matches and Bank Holiday BBQ's to mention but a few. In addition we are capable of looking after Wakes as well providing supper party fare such as Lasagnes and Fish Pies so that you can spend less time in the kitchen and more time with your guests.

Clearly, I will not be able to do this on my own. I am very grateful to Michaela, Megan and Lesley for staying on and agreeing to help me provide an all female front of house. Big Tim and Little Tim will be slaving in the kitchen, under my direction!

So that is for the moment. I thank the Editors of Village Voice for allowing me to write to you. I hope they will allow me space in the future should I need it.

All being well I intend to come along to the Home Made Hour on 1st November to meet as many residents as possible and answer any questions they may have.

Most important, however, is my desire to welcome back old friends and customers whose presence has been sorely missed over the past months, and to say hello to new customers. This Pub is part of the life blood of Great Holland. I am determined to make it once again the place you would want to visit and I would ask you all for your support.







To help use up the many windfall apples that you may have in the garden, here is my mother's recipe for:



Apple Chutney


3lbs cooking apples - peeled 1lb onions 1lb sultanas 1pt vinegar

Read this story for a moment with me:



Dear Residents,

There is good news on the planning front with the refusal of an application to build on what is currently a paddock in Hamilton Road. What is really important with this one is that the land falls outside the settlement boundary. This is a line on the local plan which shows the limit of land to be used for development and it is absolutely crucial to controlling the size of our village or any other community. In the case of Great Holland, the present line is the product of local consultation and the GHRA has been very vigilant to examine any changes and to resist those it considers detrimental to the future of Great Holland.

It is one of the ironies of the planning process that this does not actually prevent applications for planning permission outside the boundary! We have another one just now that is very new, to build five detached houses adjoining Large's Farm. What we want to see is a robust defence of the settlement boundary by Tendring District Council and its past record does not make us confident about this. There is no excuse for permitting development outside this boundary unless the application is truly exceptional. This boundary, I say again, is the product of public consultation and ignoring it to suit some unstated convenience is undemocratic and unacceptable. It shows bureaucratic disdain for public opinion and I find myself asking why on earth a planning authority EVER behaves in this way. So come on TDC! If it's outside the development boundary and the application is not truly exceptional, throw it out.

There are two other local issues that are of general concern, the road safety issues along Little Clacton Road between the village sign and the Lion's Den roundabout, together with unrepaired potholes, primarily in Manor and Rectory Roads. Lots of individuals have put in efforts on both these matters, but I should tell you all that GHRA has also been trying hard to achieve something. We have not succeeded yet, but we are trying.


On the road safety issue, we are simply not going to get what is really needed, average speed cameras and a proper footpath. What Essex County Council could do is paint double white lines along the whole section, which would make overtaking illegal and, visually, would make the road appear even narrower than it really is. That would not be expensive.

On the pothole issue, the position of Essex CC is tragically laughable. They have "criteria" which we have not been given, but we have to take their word for it that the gigantic holes in these two roads do not meet them! I think it is simpler than that. They will do anything to evade their responsibility to keep our roads safe and, by blanking every protest, they judge we will get fed up and go away. That is not going to happen, so please keep the complaints coming and remember, Councillor Bucke is campaigning hard on this issue and I would like to thank him for his efforts.

Great Holland Pits Nature Reserve:

At pond dipping

Bob: "Everyone get a white tray. Get some clean water in it before the pond gets stirred up."

There is a general burst of activity as trays and pond nets are distributed and nets are dredged through the water.

Jamie: "There are things in my tray already."

One or two children watch some water fleas heaving themselves around the bottom of the tray by flexing their tiny bodies.

"There's another thing in there"

Bob looks at the tray and pokes a slightly larger creature using prominent legs to scull its way around.

"That's a water boatman"

Some twenty children from age 4 to 44 got on with the activity of the event. Does such activity have roots in the hunting practice of our ancestors and the passing on of such skills to the latest generation? There are examples of pond dippers at Great Holland Pits running to three generations of families.

Katie: "What's that?"

Bob looks at the almost round creature, a centimetre diameter, with a hint of uncertainty. "It's a type of water beetle". A number of trays were getting filled with debris and crawling with all sorts of small creatures. Damsel fly larvae, great diving beetles, water hog-lice and shrimps.

Katie to a boy: "Hello what's your name?"

Boy: "Ben"

"Hello Ben, I'm Katie, How old are you?"

"I'll be 9 in November"

"Right, 8 then, I'm 7, Will you move that beetle larva from my tray, it's eating everything"

Ben delves in, and after a little confusion the beetle larva falls to the gravelly bank. Bob recovers it and returns it to the pond, while Ben was surprised by having received a nip from the creature. His reaction quickly changed from surprise to 'no big deal', as his granddad said "Saucer bugs are quite nippy. They will soon find something to eat in the tray". Granddad was not new to pond dipping.


Saucer bug, that was new to Bob. According to the internet though, saucer bugs were not described as rare.

A date for next year's diary...?



The happy shoppers looked exhausted as they boarded one of several waiting ferries, struggling to carry their numerous purchases of the day. As the boat set off, sun reddened faces were barely visible behind the mass of flowers and foliage that was perched on laps and also lined the floor of the boat. Although everyone was tired, like-minded people chatted animatedly about the horticultural delights of the day and admired each other's finds. Passing boats resembled floating gardens, and some even had rows of passengers' brightly coloured plastic trolleys lined up precariously on the roofs, their contents appearing to wave at those on the riverbank. It was quite a sight!

After watching this year's televised coverage of The Chelsea Flower Show, I had told a gardening friend that I planned to visit the Show next year. She suggested that I visit the impending Hampton Court Flower Show - which I hadn't even considered - and I managed to book a seat on an 'Essex Readers' coach trip to the Show, which was running from Clacton.

It was raining hard when the coach left Clacton at 7.30am, but the sun was coming out by the time we eventually parked at Hampton Court Station. I then made use of the very frequent and efficient ferry service that runs along the Thames from the station to the Show entrance. As we stepped off the boat there was a massive downpour but that cleared quickly and from then on, the sun shone all day.

Having watched the Show preview on television, I had made a list of particular gardens and exhibits that I wanted to see. This year there were three themed zones designed to help visitors find their way around, with gardens and plants reflecting the themes of Grow, Escape and Inspire. I wanted to visit the Inspire zone to see the Conceptual Gardens, which were designed around the theme of the seven deadly sins - one garden for each sin, and the new feature of turf sculptures that were intended to demonstrate creative and contemporary alternatives to the garden lawn. In real life, the gardens and features in this zone were even more spectacular and inspiring than they had appeared on television, but I was taken aback by how small they actually were. It's amazing what clever camerawork and wide-angled lenses can achieve!

I enjoyed all of the show gardens, but could see why the Best in Show award went to 'The Essence of Australia' garden, presented by the The Royal Botanic Gardens, Melbourne. Its colourful, contemporary design was inspired by the Rainbow Serpent - an iconic creature from Aboriginal culture. It included native Australian plants that can grow in the UK, and really evoked the feel of the Australians' love of outdoor living. There was just something about the garden which drew me back to stand and stare several times ...

I had hoped to take refuge in the tranquility of the John Lewis 'Quiet Treehouse', but so did many others who queued patiently throughout the day. In the end, I just ran out of time and had to miss the experience.

As the sun got hotter I ventured inside some of the marquees, where I enjoyed rose displays, cookery demonstrations and the 'Grow your Own' stands. A surprising highlight was a visit to the 'Celebrity Lecture' marquee, where Gloria Hunniford spoke eloquently about her obvious passion for gardening.

As it was the Show's last day, a bell rang at 4.00pm to herald the 'sell off'. People started running in all directions and some actually tore plants out of displays to get what they wanted. I decided against joining the undignified scramble and instead negotiated a deal on a Victorian style cold frame that I had admired earlier. Although pleased with my bargain, it wasn't the easiest of objects to transport back to the coach. I didn't buy any plants at all. I'm a bit embarrassed to admit that my favourite buy of the day was actually a handbag!

Although we had several hours at the Show, it wasn't until I looked at my Show Guide the next day that I realised how much I had not seen. Hopefully I will fit in more next year! My only regret was that having remembered to take my camera I had forgotten to charge it beforehand so sadly, the only pictures I have to remind me of a wonderful day out are those in my head...



Hello once again from Thorpe Surgery. It seems every time I write I have some announcement about one change or another and this month is no exception. The much anticipated take-over of the Kirby Surgery has been finalised and I am very happy to announce that the Kirby Cross Surgery will re-open on 1st December 2014. All residents of Kirby Cross currently registered at either the Walton Surgery or Caradoc Surgery will be able to register for GP services either here at Thorpe or Kirby Cross from 1st December if they so wish. Our current and new staff will be very happy to welcome these new patients from this date.

We are making excellent progress with the appointment of new staff and by the time of opening we will be ready to provide the same level of service to our new patients as we already provide to those that have been with us for some time. I can tell you that a new GP has already been appointed and her name is Doctor Hannah Roberts. Doctor Roberts has grown up and trained in the local area so is familiar with our local healthcare provisions and is very much looking forward to starting her new post. The other appointments are well in hand and we already have three new members of staff appointed with others to follow shortly.

October herald's the flu season and so the other big project is the flu clinics. After the success of last year we are planning another Saturday morning clinic which will be held on Saturday 4th October starting at 9am and another on Thursday 9th October starting at 2pm. As always we advise to book early as supplies run short!

Some of you may have noticed some changes to Emis on-line. This has had a name change to Patient Services and you can now view your medical record on-line at home on your computer. You will still be able to book appointments and order prescriptions with the added services so I hope you find this facility interesting if not useful. It is possible to send the surgery messages via this media but to use the facilities properly you need a PIN number and have your medication set up for repeat prescribing, ask the receptionist to set this service up for you next time you visit the surgery. We work very hard at Thorpe and will strive to maintain the good reputation that we have and our aim is not only to preserve our relationship with patients but to offer residents of Kirby Cross this service. FROM THE ARCHIVES.....

Part two: THE ARRIVAL OF THE EVACUEES

In this issue we continue the story of the arrival of the Evacuees to this area at the beginning of World War II.

It had been announced on the 2nd September that the first 6,000 children would be arriving on the following Friday. The Government's decision to evacuate the children had come as a bombshell to many.

From a School Log: "London schools re-opened at 9a.m. Saturday 26 August 1939. The teachers were recalled and reported for duty. Only the children to be evacuated with the school party were kept in school during the day. These were instructed to bring clothes etc. to school for an evacuation rehearsal on Monday 28.8.1939. The school was reopened on the Sunday for parents' enquiries etc. Instructions were received that school was to remain open at ordinary school hours for the evacuation party. On 2.9.1939 a party consisting of 238 children and 11 teachers and helpers left school in the morning for evacuation." Children, from Edmunton Schools, were put on trains at Liverpool Street Station over the next four days being told that they were going to Clacton - into the frontline (it was not until February 1940 the Government realised what they had done!). They arrived at Clacton Railway Station armed with belongings in small suitcases or brown paperbags, gas masks over their arms and name-labels on their coats. The teachers gave them a bar of chocolate and a tin of condensed milk each. They were lined up and marched outside where they transferred to buses which took them to Great Holland, Kirby, Frinton and Walton. The Great Holland Centre was at the Gt. Holland Council School, under the supervision of Mr. H. A. Day, the school evacuation officer. Upon arrival at their centre, the evacuees were given 30 minutes rest, a cup of tea and biscuits, and issued with two days rations. There were a lot of ladies waiting to "pick" the children they liked- some wanted young children, some wanted children of the same sex. Many families were split up, but eventually they were all billeted.

For the first few weeks 'school' consisted of going to the Gt. Holland Methodist Chapel schoolroom in the mornings only. After about three weeks there were art lessons started in a house called 'Woodhall'. Eventually school proper was started in Frinton in a house that had been taken over and went by the name of 'The Rock'.

As the Autumn and Winter came, people in the Village organised a Young People's evening at the Village Hall on a Thursday evening; many jolly evenings were had with great times dancing, singing, games and refreshments for a subscription of 6d.

At the beginning of 1940, the Government had realised that the children had been made vulnerable by evacuating them to the East Coast, especially as this area was a restricted zone and with heavy military. So they were re - evacuated to Gloucestershire along with the local children in February 1940.




