

#### Rector's article

Life is busy. For many it simply seems to get busier and busier.

2016 has been a busy year at All Saints', with a number of events put on within Great Holland to remember and commemorate 150 years since All Saints' was rebuilt. The year will continue to be busy – we looked at Christmas dates this week.

So let me say something into all the busy-ness, both yours and ours.

I want to extend an invitation to you to join us in church, not at just our events, and despite all you've got to do.

Of course if you're not a Christian believer, I don't expect you to come to church. You are always most welcome, but I could see why you might rather not. I hope you'll read on and see why you might like to join us.

But if you call yourself a Christian, why would you rather be anywhere else?

Now, of course you might choose a different church than All Saints' and that I understand.

But if you call yourself a Christian and miss out on church pretty much all of the time, let me pass on two things.

First, church is meeting with your brothers and sisters in Christ. We are family and families get together. Failing to go to church is like belonging to a family but never seeing the others. You miss out. And your family misses out. We need one another. And a big part of the purpose of church is to encourage and help one another. A famous minister was asked "why do I need to go to church?", and he responded by taking a glowing coal from the fire and leaving it on the hearth. The coal gradually cooled.

But it's not just that. Going to church is something very human, but it is also something superhuman. It is more than any mere club or mutual support society. The second, and in fact the primary, reason why we go to church is to meet with God himself. Yes, God is everywhere. God does not live in the church building, sure. But the gathering of the people of God around the Word of God is where our Lord has promised to be with us in a special way to bless us. It might not always seem the glitziest show on earth, but it is special. Or so we believe by faith, if not always by sight.

#### Dear friends



How many of you are in possession of a mobile phone? How many of you have ever stopped and reflected on what the world looks today, compared to what it used to look like when you were growing up?

Did you know for example that in a world of approximately 7 billion people, there are approximately 6 billion mobile phones. Have you stopped to think of how a teenager does not know a world without mobile phones?

Have you ever wished for the older days to come back?

This is exactly what the people of Israel were doing in Ezra 3. The people of Israel started to rebuilt the temple. When the temple was started to be rebuilt '...all the people gave a great shout of praise to the Lord, because the foundation of the house of the Lord was laid. But many of the older priests and Levites and family heads, who had seen the former temple, wept aloud when they saw the foundation of this temple being laid, while many others shouted for joy.'

Many of the older priests, Levites and family heads wept because they remembered what it looked like, and what they were seeing in front of them, looked nothing like they were used to. They wept because they wanted to old, the familiar, the known back. What they were faced with in their present, was different, new, and in their minds not as good.

Yet, at the same time, I imagine those that had not seen the former temple, the ones that are shouting for joy. This is their present, this is their reality, and in their reality they are seeing a beautiful temple being built for the Lord.

In Ezra we read that the sound of both groups, was mixed, and it was heard from a long way away. What do you make of it? What do you make of the older generation that were weeping for the old and the familiar, and of the new generation, who didn't understand what had gone on in the past, and they rejoiced with who God was for them in the here and the now?

Should any of those voices be silenced? I wonder if we could learn from each other, I wonder if we could encourage one another.

It would have been so wrong if the older generation had discouraged the younger generation from their worship, their understanding of who God was, their expression of joy.

It would have also been so wrong if the younger generation had not listed to the wisdom of the older generations. In fact, in Ezra we read that Levites twenty years old and older were appointed to supervise the building of the house of the Lord.

They needed each other in this new place, and time that they find themselves in. They need to be able to work together, to express themselves and they need to look at God with every step.

They needed to build the temple of God together, and in doing so God was giving this people that had seen hardship a new beginning in the place that once had been Jerusalem.

Today we might be feeling the same....The world is changing so rapidly, how are we to sing the Lord's song in such a strange land?

How are we going to enable a worship to a people that does not know anything different, in a way that makes sense to them?

As we try to answer those questions, this is what the Lord said of the temple that was being built just then. "The latter glory of this house will be greater than the former" (Hag. 2:9). It was to this temple that the Lord Jesus Himself would come and bring the greater glory. Take courage dear friends. The latter glory will be greater than the former. Amen!

#### Dear Friends,

You now know the worst! The ridiculous application to build 240 houses off Halstead Road was given the green light by the Inspector on appeal. Still, we can all look forward to traffic lights at the roundabout to deal with the congestion problem! We all had the 'benefit' of that method when they did the road works a few months back.

It makes interesting reading to see the decision itself, because it really does highlight the fundamental flaws in the present system. One person, appointed from a central government panel has the power to decide. This panel comprises 'industry oriented' people, surveyors, estate agents and the like, all with a predilection in favour of development and developers. The important point is that local opinion is a side issue and generally treated with the same contempt as that of our own council. The inspector in this case treated the issue of traffic congestion with contempt. Basically, he said it was no worse here than anywhere else and so it simply was not relevant!

The argument runs, of course, that local opinion will never agree to anything. First of all, that is not true and most people want sensible development in sensible places. Secondly, there is no reason for government not to set legally binding requirements for development land in each area, but then leave it entirely to the locality how that target is met. That would work. It would produce good results too. We would all insist that brown field sites were used first. We would all insist that congestion was treated as a priority and that large developments were built near roads with sufficient capacity. None of this is difficult and it would not be difficult to find general agreement. The system is rotten, because it rides rough shod over local opinion.

Did any of you get to the local plan consultation at Weeley? We did. We immediately went to the plan for Great Holland and noted no changes, or nothing radical, anyway. Settlement boundary and conservation area all where they should be, so nothing to worry about, eh? Good old TDC! Thank you for listening to us! Hang on a minute! Was it just a nasty dream that TDC has waved through back land building on two sites outside the settlement boundary and inside the conservation area in the last few months? Is it an illusion that three large houses have just gone up along a busy, noisy road, creating ribbon development and filling in the gaps between us and Kirby Cross? Is it not so that a new cul de sac will be built at the end of Rectory Road?

This is the problem when you have a council like TDC. There is nothing wrong with the plan, but TDC just ignore it in practice whenever it suits them and they won't be any different this time. The problem does not just apply to planning matters.

There is a developing problem of highway sales of motor vehicles, here in Great Holland and on the main road though Kirby Cross. Councillor Bucke has repeatedly demanded action and been repeatedly fobbed off, saying there is insufficient evidence. I don't think we want businesses operating on the highway. There are rules about it, but this culture of arrogance seemingly pervades every aspect of TDC responsibility.

There is one thing you could help me with. I think it would be a good idea to have someone give a SHORT talk about a matter of local concern at GHRA regular meetings. I do mean short, a maximum of 15 minutes. Any suggestions, please?

Active Citizen will incorporate a number of existing volunteer programmes such as Special Constables, Dog Watch and Volunteer Police Cadets but goes much further. Opportunities will be tailored according to availability, capacity and capability of the volunteer and imagination is key to success.







## CEREMONY TO MARK THE 150TH ANNIVERSARY OF KIRBY CROSS STATION

Frinton and Walton mayor, Jack Robertson, unveiled a copy of a plaque that will be put up once the future of the station has been settled. Mark Platt, Chairman of Tendring Transport Liaison Group, said that despite talk of the station being demolished he hopes it could be used again in the future. Frinton and Walton Town Council have indicated an interest in leasing the building if the terms are suitable.

#### Surgery Newsletter-October

The end of the month has come again-rather too quickly for me but at the time of writing (beginning of September) this is a time of preparation in schools and in medicine. Schools and universities are preparing to receive an influx of new pupils as are universities and the NHS is preparing for winter and the forthcoming junior doctor strikes.

Here at Thorpe our main focus at this time of year is making sure all our vulnerable patients are protected against flu, by carrying out an effective campaign we will hopefully prevent hospital admissions over the winter period by vaccinating children, older people and those with asthma and diabetes. This should mean that there will be less flu in circulation for the rest of the population. Our first clinics are 26<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> September and we will be running more at both Thorpe and Kirby at a variety of times for the convenience of our patients-see the surgery website and signs in the waiting rooms for more details. Jabs are on offer in the community but we hope that our patients will support us by choosing to be immunised at the surgery.

We have appointed a new receptionist to our team, Clare started in September and is looking forward to 'learning the ropes'. The recording service for repeat prescriptions continues to be monitored, for those patients choosing to order by telephone we ask that the recording service is used, in the future the receptionists will cease taking requests over the telephone in line with other surgeries. Whilst there are some patients that do not like leaving recorded messages this service is another option for patients needing to order medication along with on-line, by post or using the surgery prescription request post box.

More and more patients are requesting access to their records, this is easy to do but a form must be completed first and identity proved to ensure that patient records are secure. Once set up online access will give patients the opportunity to order medication, view test results, problems, immunisations and book appointments. On line ordering of medication means that the patient has control of what is ordered, this request passes electronically to the doctor who in turn authorises the request and then sends the prescription electronically to 'the spine'. Patients that have nominated a pharmacy are then able to collect their medication directly from the pharmacy a couple of days later. This is the system preferred by the surgery as it reduces the risk of errors but we will continue to take recorded messages, patient letters and repeat slips.

There was a PPG meeting in August, a number of Kirby and Great Holland residents attended with concerns about the reduction in opening hours at the Kirby Branch. I was able to reassure patients that there was no reduction in the number of appointments on offer but that surgeries were compressed into the mornings meaning that we are able to use our resources more effectively, the addition of a midwife holding weekly clinics was also reported. #### **Predators and prey**

A petition to parliament has just closed. 123,075 people signed to support a ban on the sport of 'Driven Grouse Shooting'. While I have no general objection to shooting or some of the activities that shooting requires, I supported it.

Traditionally grouse shooting consisted of walking up the hill, sometimes with dogs and shooting the flushed grouse. More recently a lucrative industry grew up where the shooters were taken up to shooting points, while others were employed to drive the grouse over their guns. The problem is that this form of the sport required moors grossly over populated with grouse. This was achieved by among other measures stringent control of predators. So far so good, but in practice the control has also illegally targeted protected species, including eagles, peregrine falcons and principally Hen Harriers. While the industry denies involvement in illegal activity, a series of compelling events provide evidence that some do. Moreover a scientific study on Langholm grouse moor demonstrated that Harriers really do make driven grouse shooting uneconomic to run, hence the petition to ban this form of the sport. RSPB have promoted a half way set up where grouse moor businesses would have to be licenced, and moor owners would risk losing their licence if criminal activity was proven.

Hen harriers are down to 3 pairs in England with rather more in Scotland, the English habitat ought to support around 300 if they were not persecuted. In Essex we still see occasional Hen harriers in the winter, and what a sight they are. The male is a beautiful light grey with dark wing tips and the female more dappled with a notable ringed effect to the tail feathers.

A number of people nationally are stating their view that predators in the country are causing all sorts of problems. While I have no argument with legal control of predators I reject the notion that humans should control everything to maintain a 'balance'. Populations of everything from Wrens to Grouse will be healthier if the sick and unfit are taken out of the population. Predator numbers are also controlled by the availability of their prey. The natural world has balanced itself since long before people came along with guns, traps and poisons.

This summer we have been undertaking a Dormouse survey, which I will describe after we finish it in December. Anyway there are healthy numbers at Great Holland Pits, and we have a pair of one of their chief predators the Tawny Owl present. So there is a food chain which starts with plants. Food items for Dormice include flowers, seeds, accessible invertebrates such as caterpillars, and later fruits and nuts. At least one of our Dormice had 5 kits. Overall the population builds up in the autumn, but it is balanced in the year by predation, mishap and perhaps disease and starvation. Sometimes the winter is too warm and they wake out of hibernation too early before food is plentiful. The presence of the owl taking a proportion stabilises the population.

The Tawny Owls also had their problems this year. In April there were four eggs in the box. During a visit a few weeks later we expected to ring the owlets, but in the meantime Jackdaws had covered the eggs with twigs for their own nest. Should this be a cue to attempt to control Jackdaws? I don't think so. Of the scores of Owl boxes several in this area have been taken over by Jackdaws but Tawny Owls also raise a surplus from time to time.

I have continued to monitor Holland Brook. People have expressed to me their wish to 'control' Otters. While there are still signs of them along the river, there are also signs of a lot of fish. It does the fish no favours to free them from predation. Sick fish are the first to be caught by an Otter, Heron or Kingfisher.







#### FROM THE ARCHIVES .....

#### The Local Home Guard

Since the war had begun the Government had received countless enquiries from men of all ages who, for one reason or another not engaged in the military, wanted to do something for the defence of the country. In 1940, because the Germans we rapidly advancing in France, a call went out to all men 'not presently engaged in military service between the ages of 17 and 65' to volunteer to fight off an invasion within a new force that was to be named 'THE LOCAL DEFENCE VOLUNTEERS'. It was the brainchild of General Sir Walter Kirke and Brigadier W. Garden-Roe.

From the start it proved a success, especially in the undefended East Anglian areas. In the first week a quarter of a million had volunteered and women also joined up. In Essex alone there numbered some 40,000 men by 1942. In the early days they lacked uniforms, but wore black armbands with LDV on them hastily made by the WVS.



In August 1940 the name 'HOME GUARD' was introduced. They patrolled the coastal and backwater areas and guarded railway bridges and electrical substations; built defences and road blocks; and removed sign posts and street names.

In the beginning the organisation was run with chaos but, by the time of the great stand-down in Autumn 1944, the Home Guard soldiers who manned A.A. guns and searchlight batteries could be counted alongside the rest of Great Britain's fighting forces.

I am currently researching the local Home Guard and have many unanswered questions – e.g. was there a 'Spigot' gun in the Tendring area and, if so, where was it allocated? etc.

My grandfather was in the local platoon but is no longer with us as he was of the older men at the time and would be 120 years old – but a young boy or girl who may have joined could still be around albeit in their 90s. If you have a relative, friend or neighbour who was in the Home Guard and would be willing to speak to me please contact me on 01255 676960.


